

CHARLES CONLEY IS ORDERED HELD

Man Arrested in Los Angeles
Denies Having Robbed Bank
at Beaverton.

Los Angeles, Cal., June 26.—(L. N. S.)—Charles Conley, 24, of Camas, Wash., arrested here on suspicion of having robbed a bank at Beaverton, Or., June 10 last of \$8800, will be taken north to face the charge. Local police received a wire from the sheriff at Beaverton today to hold the man.

In a room in a local hotel where Conley was arrested \$1700 was found secreted in the mattress of his bed. Six hundred dollars more was found in his clothing. Conley denies ever having been in Beaverton. He insists he saved the money working at his trade as an electrician. His wife, formerly Leta Henny of Camas, corroborates his statement. Both say they came here for a vacation. According to the police Conley, working at his trade as an electrician, gained entrance to the bank as a repairman, and was able to rifle the depositary at his leisure.

Charles Conley was arrested as the result of efforts of his father-in-law, W. A. Hennie, of Washougal. Hennie became suspicious as the result of a letter and took Conley's picture to Beaverton, where it was positively identified by Miss Lillian H. Evans, assistant cashier of the bank, who was alone in the bank at the time of the holdup, according to Cashier Doy Gray. The bank, Mr. Gray said, lost \$8800.50, but was fully insured.

He was arrested by Pinkerton operatives following the telegraphing of complete details as to his appearance by James M. Riley, manager of the local office. Mr. Riley had such a complete trace of the movements of the man and his wife, he said this morning, that he was able to tell the Los Angeles operatives the color of the dress Mrs. Conley might be wearing, which, he said, was either a rose latta or a grey dress. Mr. Riley had obtained a picture of Conley, he said, which had been identified by Miss Evans and Mr. Barthold at the bank, the owner of the Lewis feed store who said they saw him in the road near the bank, and Mr. and Miss Kelly, who own a store near the top of the hill going down into Beaverton, and who said Conley stopped there for gasoline about a half hour before the robbery occurred.

"Conley and his wife were staying at the Baltimore hotel," said Mr. Riley this morning. "He was formerly employed by the Northwest Steel company and he stole the Chevrolet car belonging to a man by the name of Murphy on the morning of June 10. He left the car in Vancouver on the morning of June 12 and went by stage to Camas where he got his wife and took her back to Vancouver. The two then went by train to Seattle, from where they went by boat to San Francisco and stayed 48 hours, then going on to Los Angeles."

"They were living a pretty high life on their trip and spending lots of the small change which they took."

"I wired the Los Angeles office about midnight June 24, and received the reply Wednesday night about 10:40 saying

that Conley had been taken into custody. He had on him at the time \$600 and in the safe at the hotel were eight \$100 bills, 200 American Brokers' association travelers' cheques and 700 American Express company's cheques.

"We were retained by the American Surety company to protect their interests and that is why we were interested in this robbery."

"The sheriff at Hillsboro has the warrant for Conley's arrest and will find out today whether he will come without extradition. Otherwise he will go down and get Conley."

JENKINS CHOSEN CHIEF'S ASSISTANT

Captain Jenkins was appointed a patrolman October 5, 1908. He was made a sergeant, April 30, 1912; a lieutenant, December 1, 1915; captain, May 4, 1917, and assistant to the chief of police, June 26, 1919. For two years he has charge of the substation at St. Johns, and for three months temporarily assumed charge of the traffic department.

When the news spread about police headquarters this morning that Captain Jenkins was to be placed in charge of the detail work, words of rejoicing were heard from many lips. The officers have felt for some time that an experienced officer should be in charge. No reflection was cast on the executive ability of Chief Johnson, or on his honesty. The chief will probably have more dealings with the business men of the city, while Captain Jenkins will handle the criminal end of the work.

WADE SUCCEEDS JENKINS
The second night relief will be placed in charge of Sergeant Ben Wade. The chief said this morning that Sergeant Wade would not be promoted to a lieutenant at present. Chief of Inspectors John Clark will remain as assistant chief under the city ordinances and will be in command of the department when Chief Johnson is out of the city. Captain Jenkins expects to be on duty from about 8 o'clock in the morning until about 5 o'clock in the afternoon. He will work in uniform.

Doughnuts Turned Into Dollars for the Salvation Army

Doughnuts lured a dollar each from pockets of Ad Clubbers Wednesday afternoon when Julian Ellings, aided by young women of his company, sold them in aid of the Salvation Army drive. Joseph E. Dunne and Frank W. Smith arranged the stunt, which netted several hundred dollars.

Dr. Edward T. Devine, professor of political economy at Columbia university and editor of the Survey magazine, proposed the appointment of a secretary of public health, during an address before the Ad club. "If the president is unwilling to add a leaf or two to the cabinet table then there ought to be readjustment in the relation of departments and bureaus," said the educator. Dr. Devine asserted that one reason there were so many hitches in the operations in the bureau of war risk insurance was because it was made a subordinate division of the treasury department, the most heavily loaded department of national administration.

Ben Selling introduced Dr. Devine. "Advertising is the basis of my success as a merchant," he said. "Once I wrote my own advertising, then I found it necessary to employ some one who could do it better than I. The Ad club's motto, 'Truth in Advertising' is the essential of any permanently successful advertising policy."

Jury Disagrees in Coach Dietz Case And Is Dismissed

Spokane, June 26.—(U. P.)—The jury in the trial of "Lone Star" Dietz, famous Indian football coach and film star, accused by the government of falsifying his draft papers, disagreed at 10:30 today by a 6 to 6 vote, and was dismissed after 14 hours' deliberation. A grand jury sitting here today will, it is said, indict Dietz on the same or another charge.

BANK BOARD HELD NO JUDGE OF NEED

Circuit Court Decision Upholds
Plea of St. Johns Men for
Bank Charter.

Salmon, June 26.—Holding that the statutes do not confer discretion on the superintendent of banks or the state banking board to inquire into business conditions and decide from that standpoint whether the organization of an additional bank in a community is justified, Judge George G. Bingham of the Marion county circuit court today upheld the alternative writ of mandamus issued in behalf of S. A. Mulkey and others interested in the organization of a new bank at St. Johns and ordered the state superintendent of banks to grant the charter as asked for.

Assistant Attorney General Van Winkle announced this morning that the state banking board would continue to stand on its armor to the writ on the ground that the circuit court has no jurisdiction in the matter, and will appeal the case to the supreme court as soon as the judgment is issued by Judge Bingham.

Mulkey and a number of others were refused a charter for a new bank in St. Johns by Superintendent of Banks Will H. Bennett, on the ground that the field was already thoroughly covered and the organization of another bank was not justified. An appeal was taken to the state banking board, which upheld Bennett in his decision. Then the case was taken into the Marion county circuit court in order to compel the issuance of a charter.

EX-KAISER'S SON MAKES GETAWAY

Immediate demand upon the new German government for the surrender of the crown prince as a matter of principle, regardless of whether he was brought to trial or not. It was considered possible that the receipt of such a demand by the new government would precipitate a crisis in Germany with the military party threatening revolution if the government acceded to the allies' request.

It was believed possible here that the crown prince's reported escape is part of a dramatic coup by which the reactionary party in Germany hopes to overthrow the republic and restore the monarchy. Several reports have reached the peace conference, since Germany announced acceptance of the treaty, that German military leaders of the old monarchistic regime have threatened revolt if the government accepted the treaty including the cause providing for the surrender for trial of the ex-kaiser and others held responsible for the war.

WOLFE'S FLEE MUSIC
It was considered certain that the crown prince, the leader of the military party would be among those sought for trial by the allies and it is believed that he fled to Germany, hoping to escape falling into the hands of the allies. While ostensibly under "internment" by the Dutch authorities, the heir of the Hohenzollerns has been allowed great freedom in his movements. It is known that he was kept constantly informed of the state of affairs in Germany through friendly couriers. Visitors have constantly visited the cottage in which he makes his home.

Recent reports from Germany indicate the royalist faction is gaining strength. A note was recently sent to the Dutch government by the German Officers' association, demanding that Holland refuse the allies' request for extradition of the former Kaiser. Several incipient movements for restoration of the monarchy have been reported in the Rhine provinces, which have always been particularly loyal to the Hohenzollerns.

RETURN ACCEPTED IN U. S. AS POLITICAL MOVE

Washington, June 26.—(U. P.)—Reports that the former crown prince had fled from the island of Wieringen into Germany, while unconfirmed at the state department, caused little surprise in official circles this afternoon. Accepting the report as true, diplomatic and government officials declared the move was replete with political significance and frankly admitted it was not unanticipated. They pointed out that the return of the crown prince to "face the music," as it were, would be likely to give him considerable political strength, especially in view of the fact that the ministry

signing the peace treaty is likely to fall into public disfavor.

Taking advantage of this sentiment, it was pointed out, the crown prince, who always has been reputed a favorite in military circles, would be in a strategic position to start a reactionary movement.

Officials Not Informed
London, June 26, 3 p. m.—(U. N. S.)—No news of the escape of the former German crown prince other than a press report from Paris had reached Downing street, the official residence of Premier Lloyd George, this afternoon. Officials there said that if the report was true they believed they would have received some news.

Premier Comedian Of Minstrel Show Passes at Albany

Albany, June 26.—Clarence Powell, colored, a member of the Harvey's minstrel company, died here this morning about the company's car. He had been in the business for many years, and was about 55 years old. His wife lives at San Antonio, Texas. The body is being held here awaiting instructions from Albany.

Clarence Powell will be remembered by Portlanders who saw Harvey's minstrel at the Hellig last week as the premier comedian, the big fellow who sang "Never," a parody on local affairs.

Petrified Peach Found in Colorado

Montrose, Colo., June 26.—(U. N. S.)—A petrified peach was found by workmen while digging in a ditch near this place. Local authorities say that it is a relic of the prehistoric days when this valley was a vast wilderness of tropical fruit trees.
