

MAYOR PREPARES SALARY ORDINANCE OF FLAT INCREASE

Measure Intended to Supersede One Adopted Granting Higher Wages on Departmental Basis.

PIER TO HOLD WHIP HAND

A salary schedule for all city employees, intended to supersede the Mann, Barber and Perkins estimates, has been worked out and will be presented to the council in the form of an ordinance...

Day workers would be allowed a flat increase of 55 cents daily, or approximately 315 per month under the new schedule. Additional monthly increases are allowed for other city employees...

Heads of departments would receive raises on the same basis as other employees. Fifteen monthly increases would be given those who have not received advances of \$25 since June 1, 1918...

Figures in the new plan are widely divergent from those in ordinances passed last week. Under the Mann, Barber, Perkins schedule, employees were advanced \$100 to \$150 monthly...

FORMER POLICEMAN INDICTED BY JURY IN FEDERAL COURT

On charges of impersonating a United States marshal and thus interfering with L. L. Adcox, A. L. Long was indicted this morning by the federal grand jury on four counts.

A separate indictment was returned against L. L. Adcox and others on charges of violation of the Reed amendment covering the shipment of intoxicants in dry territory. The indictments hark back to the arrest of Adcox and his automobile party at Madras...

On charges of impersonating a United States marshal and thus interfering with L. L. Adcox, A. L. Long was indicted this morning by the federal grand jury on four counts.

Among the important indictments returned is one against Isaac F. Sedell, charged with embezzling funds from the United States postoffice at Walton, Ore. in which he acted as assistant postmaster. Sedell is accused of Long was formerly a member of the Portland police department.

Most of the indictments cover violations of the Reed amendment against the importation of intoxicants. Ah Kim, Chinese, was indicted for a violation of the Harrison narcotic law and Lee Man Chung will be tried for possessing opium. Several alleged operators of illicit distilleries are called to account in the indictment.

Ralph Belinger is accused of altering a government security. Marcus Herrera is held to account for his alleged robbery of a postoffice. William Lotches, Indian, is accused of having assaulted a fellow tribesman with a dangerous weapon and James A. Billings was indicted for the alleged check as evidence of good faith...

Antonio Venziani is charged with a violation of the federal immigration laws. J. J. Brown is accused of having interfered with telegraph lines under government control and Charles Wabb is held on three counts to answer for alleged fraud.

As many teachers as are available up to 50 will be elected to the Portland schools next week, according to Superintendent D. A. Groat, who has just returned from Eugene, where he has been holding personal consultations and talking with city superintendents regarding the ability of certain applicants.

Extrema care must be taken in the election of teachers, Mr. Groat said, because of the tenure of office law which makes it difficult to remove undesirable, and the list of suitable applicants was not large enough in the spring to supply the needs. Many of those elected declined.

FATE OF EX-CASHIER OF LINNTON BANK IS NOW JURY QUESTION

Closing Arguments Made and Jurors Retire to Deliberate Shortly After Noon.

The jury in the government's first case against Jerome S. Mann, former cashier of the First National bank at Linnton, retired shortly after noon today, after spending the entire morning hearing the closing arguments of Wallace McCamant in behalf of Mann and the argument for the prosecution delivered by Bert E. Haney, United States attorney.

With the jury went files of letters written by Mann when he was cashier of the Linnton bank to J. Al Pattison, head of the lumber concern of that name. Mr. Haney referred to them as of prime importance in reaching a verdict.

Throughout the trial Mann's young wife sat at his side in the court room and during Mr. McCamant's closing argument she gave way to tears repeatedly. He put special emphasis upon the fact that Mann and his father had sacrificed their entire personal fortunes to make good the losses faced by the bank, of which the elder Mann was the heaviest stockholder at the time his son became involved in the alleged worthless paper transactions of J. Al Pattison.

Referring to Pattison, who testified against Mann during the prosecution of the case, District Attorney Haney said: "Judge McCamant declared Pattison is a crook and I agree with him. When the time comes Al Pattison will be taken care of."

SIEVERS DENIES EXTORTING FEES IN TRANSACTIONS

Attorney Says He Merely Retained \$5000 in Stock as Result of Agreement With Wm. Tyler.

PLAINTIFF IS CONTRADICTED

Flat Denial Made of Charge That He 'Hounded' Clients to Get Fees in Domestic Tangle Suit.

John N. Sievers, codefendant with George A. Hall, in the Henderson and Harry Henderson in the \$24,000 action charging them with conspiracy and extortion, brought by Mrs. Farnelia Tyler, protested his innocence this morning on the witness stand with a denial that he acted in bad faith in any of his transactions.

He gave his version of the dealings out of which the suit has arisen. Sievers, in the first witness so far to be called by the defense and he spent the entire morning under examination.

Sievers stated that his first acquaintance with the whole transaction came when Captain William Tyler, son of Mrs. Farnelia Tyler, brought to him papers of a \$100,000 suit for alienation filed against him and his mother by attorney George A. Hall on behalf of Harry Henderson and Ethel Henderson. He says he advised Captain Tyler to forget the matter, that it was probably a threat to get some money out of him. In any event, he says he told him if he did anything he should get a first class criminal lawyer.

PERJURED, HE SAYS Captain Tyler, however, the witness averred, was not willing to let the matter drop and insisted upon his accompanying him to Attorney Hall's office, where, said Sievers, the matter of settlement came up. Mr. Hall offered to settle for \$50,000 and Captain Tyler for \$10,000, according to the witness, who stated that he was protesting meanwhile against any settlement or anything being done in the matter at all.

Finally, stated Sievers, Captain Tyler offered \$20,000 and the attorney for the other side agreed upon it. Unable to pay in cash, Mr. Sievers said that Captain Tyler was about to offer stock to that amount when he intervened and said he would hold the stock for a while, that matters had progressed too rapidly and that sufficient receipts had not been given.

Called DAMN FOOL Next day Sievers testified he met Captain Tyler on the street and told him he was a "damn fool" for settling for so much. He says that the captain then told him if he could settle for any more than \$20,000 he would keep the difference as his fee. This, he said, in his settling with Hall for \$15,000 and retaining \$5000 of the stock which is being sought to be recovered.

The witness affirmed that Mrs. Tyler knew of the last transaction and that

she advised him to keep the stock as a good investment and not to sell it. He denied at all times the testimony of the other side that he had urged any settlement or that he hounded Mrs. Tyler and Captain Tyler to pay up and clear up the case.

This testimony was directly contradictory of the testimony of Mrs. Tyler, venerable mother of Captain Tyler, who occupied the witness chair Friday.
