

EFFECTIVE POLICE WORK CALLS FOR HELP OF PUBLIC

Call Station at Once in Case of
Burglary; Don't Stop to Talk
It Over, Says Chief Inspector.

COURT LENIENCY CRITICISED

Clark Says Many Reach Adult
Age as Full Fledged Criminals
Because Not Punished.

Householders can best protect themselves against burglars: By advising the police department when they leave their homes for any length of time. By using Yale style locks on their front doors. By bolting as well as locking their back doors. By bolting and locking doors leading from basements upstairs. By bolting and locking outside entrances to basements. By locking wood elevators and dumb waiter shafts. By locking windows. In case of burglary, notify the police department at once.

In case of accident or sudden illness, call a doctor at once.

In case of burglary call the police department at once.

Don't get all excited about it, and talk it over with the neighbors before giving the police department an opportunity to get on the job. The quicker they are called the quicker they can respond and the quicker they respond the more likely they are to catch the burglar and to recover your stolen property.

So in case of burglary call the police first.

This is the advice of John Clark, chief of inspectors and assistant chief of the Portland police department. Chief Clark has been in the police force for 50-odd years. He can tell at a glance a burglar as he can see one, and his vision is clear.

NO "WAVE OF CRIME"

Chief Clark gives it as his opinion that there is no real "wave of crime" in Portland at this time, but that because of the prominence given some recent "jobs" many minor infractions of the statutes that usually pass unnoticed are also being called to the attention of the public.

"It is true," says Chief Clark, "that war-work in the shipyards and elsewhere brought many undesirable residents to the city. Some of them were really bad men, too, old criminals with prison records. The Portland police department was powerless, because of the laws governing parolees and ex-convicts, to take any action towards preventing their coming, or to keep them under surveillance."

"Naturally enough, with the lessening of shipyard activities, many of these fellows are being released by their employers and some of them are drifting back into their old ways of living. This class of men, and the juvenile offenders, are responsible for most of the crime in Portland at this time."

COURT LENIENCY CRITICISED

"The police department, unfortunately, has no jurisdiction over the juvenile, so-called, criminal element. Could the department deal with these young offenders more of them would be saved from lives of crime. The leniency shown them by the juvenile court is really their undoing. They get by with it once, and try it again and again, so that by the time they have reached the age of 18 the police can take a hand in the game they are confirmed criminals and the department is held accountable for them."

"I am satisfied that the police could handle them more satisfactorily at the beginning. Give them one chance, certainly. Then, a good stiff jail, is more likely to straighten them up than leniency."

Chief Clark says that householders and citizens generally can help the department materially by reporting quickly any case of burglary or other crime that comes within their notice.

MOTORCYCLE MEN AVAILABLE

"We have motorcycle men who can get anywhere within the city limits within a few moments and they are put on the job as soon as a call is received at headquarters. Usually when they respond they find that the call has been delayed for one reason or another, and delay in this game is fatal."

"The department wants to cooperate with the public, and wants the public to cooperate with the department. Together we can do the most good for the community."

"The department is ready to do its part at any and all times. Help it to help."

Anti-Leaguers Infest Britain Deceit Their High Trump Card

Portland Lawyer Completes Tour
of British Isles Under Auspices
of International Rosarians.

Great Britain is afflicted with anti-League of Nations propaganda, as America is, says Estes Snedecor, Portland lawyer, who has just completed a tour of the British Isles under the auspices of the International Association of Rotary Clubs. Mr. Snedecor was elected vice-president of this association at its recent convention in Salt Lake City.

"It is a propaganda," explained Mr. Snedecor, "that seeks to take advantage of the tendency among the peoples of one nation to misinterpret the spirit of the peoples of another nation and to look with suspicion upon their motives. In this country we hear that the League of Nations will be subservient to the will of the British empire, while over there we hear that it is a creation for the benefit of American finance and commercialism. In the face of these conflicting claims we must not lose sight of the fact that the allied and associated powers have made united sacrifices to establish a new order that might insure permanent peace."

MUTUAL UNDERSTANDING NEEDED

"Permanent peace will come only through the ability of the peoples of the nations of the world to understand each other."

"We must develop common ideals of government and common aspirations for liberty and humanity. The League of Nations will furnish the organization through which such common ideals and aspirations may be developed. Those who are acquainted with the remarkable growth, both in organization and influence, of the International Association of Rotary Clubs believe that this great movement, which is now entering upon its world-wide development, can perform a great international service by bringing the representative business and professional men of the world together upon a common basis of friendship and service. President Wilson spoke truly in an address recently delivered at Turin when he said: 'The men who do the business of the world, and peace or war is now in a large measure in the hands of those who conduct the commerce of the world.'"

BUSINESS WORLD CHALLENGED

This is a challenge to the business men of the world to see to it that the warfare of arms shall not be succeeded by an economic warfare of chicanery, intrigue and destructive competition; that the commerce of the world shall be heretofore conducted upon high ethical standards, and that its competition shall be one based upon efficiency and quality and service; that all men shall be taught to realize that there is an honor in business that is the fine gold of it, that reckons with every man justly, that loves light and that regards fair dealing more highly than goods or prices or profits."

ENGLISH WOULD BE CORDIAL

"We found among the English a sincere desire to maintain cordial and friendly relations with the peoples of this country. The great majority of a people of that country are pinning their faith and hope upon the League of Nations. In support of this assertion, permit me to quote from the editorial of a representative newspaper of England, dated May 22:

"Lord Robert Cecil claims, not without reason, that the League of Nations has at its back the support and even the enthusiasm, of the great mass of the peoples of Europe. No British statesman is better entitled than Lord Robert Cecil to speak concerning the League of Nations, for none has shown more enthusiasm for the league or labored more earnestly for its establishment, and as Mr. Asquith said the other day, the empire owes him an enormous debt of gratitude for his share in the practical elaboration of a great and beneficent conception. In his speech in London last night Lord Robert replied in some detail to the critics of the league, whose hostility has increased rather than diminished of late—a circumstance in

which there is the element of encouragement, since men do not as a rule waste their energy in attacking a movement that is moribund. He claims, not without reason, that the league has at its back the support and even the enthusiasm of the great mass of the peoples of Europe."

"How could it be otherwise, since it opens to him the door of hope? They have witnessed and suffered through the tragic failure of the old world order. A system which could not save them from the catastrophe of the last five years stands self-condemned, and they cannot rest content with any settlement that merely means its revival with certain peace is to be something more than a state of suspended hostilities, if it is to possess the stability without which victory is of little value, it must rest on foundations more secure than any yet devised. They have fought in this war for an inspiring ideal and they are not willing to be robbed of its realization. They know that unless there is a drastic change in our international system as a sequel to the war, the fruits of victory can never be fully reaped and the world will not have been made safe for democracy. That is why the idea of the League of Nations has made such a strong appeal to the popular imagination, and why those who are devoting themselves to the task of getting its machinery into working order have behind them the good will of the peoples—certainly in the allied and neutral lands, and probably also in enemy countries."

"The league, Lord Roberts reminds us, is mere machinery, and has no life in it save what is put into it by the energies and convictions of the populations concerned. The project has got beyond the stage of theorizing; the covenant of the league has been drafted and incorporated in the treaty of peace, and it now remains for public opinion to supply the requisite driving force."

GET ANOTHER VIEWPOINT

Last April Arch C. Klumph of Cleveland, Ohio, and I were commissioned by the International Association of Rotary Clubs to attend the annual convention of the British Association of Rotary Clubs to be held in Bristol, England, the second week in May. Every one of the 25 rotary clubs of Great Britain and Ireland was represented at this convention. After the convention we were privileged to visit and address 20 of these rotary clubs. We found Rotary entering upon a new era of development and extension in Britain. Eight new clubs are in the process of organization at this time. The Rotary club of Edinburgh has extended an invitation to the International Association of Rotary Clubs to hold its annual convention in that beautiful city in 1921.

MANN ACQUITTED OF MAKING FALSE ENTRY IN REPORT

Jury in Federal Court Out Three
Hours Considering Charge
Against Former Bank Cashier

OTHER INDICTMENTS PEND

Next Trial Will Be on Accusation
of Misappropriating Funds of
National Bank.

A jury in Federal Judge Bean's court this afternoon found Jerome S. Mann, former cashier of the First National bank of Linton, not guilty of falsifying an entry on a report of the bank's condition to the comptroller of the currency. The jury was out three hours. Three ballots were necessary before the jurors could agree.

Mann, indicted on several counts for his reputed acceptance on behalf of the bank of worthless securities from J. Al Pattison, head of the lumber company of that name, will be tried on another count misappropriating funds of a national bank, in the near future, according to the statement of United States Attorney Bert Haney.

In the case which ended with this afternoon's verdict Mann was accused of declaring to the comptroller that there were no excess loans on the books of the First National bank of Linton, whereas an excessive sum had been loaned to J. Al Pattison, and on worthless paper, and that Mann was not only aware of the illegality of the excessive loans, but of the worthlessness of the paper held by the bank as collateral.

MRS. MANN COLLAPSES

When the verdict of the jurors was read, Mrs. Mann, who has been at her husband's side throughout the trial, collapsed. The young banker dropped his head upon his arms and sobbed.

The case against Mann was carried into the federal court under several indictments. On the second of these, trial has been set for July 7. J. Al Pattison will be jointly tried with Mann. Pattison, whose alleged worthless invoices and trade acceptances involved the young banker, turned state's evidence against Jerome Mann in the first trial. Pattison declared that Mann knew all the time that the paper he was buying from Pattison was worthless, and that he had declined to call the transactions to the attention of his father and other directors of the bank.

GAVE UP MOST OF MONEY

Mann, on the other hand, testified that he reported his discovery of the worthlessness of his securities to the bank examiners immediately. He testified that he had sacrificed his personal fortune and his father had given up most of his money to repay the funds the bank might otherwise have lost. The connection of the Manns with the Linton bank has ceased, it was declared in court, and the institution has suffered no financial embarrassment because of the alleged activities of Pattison.

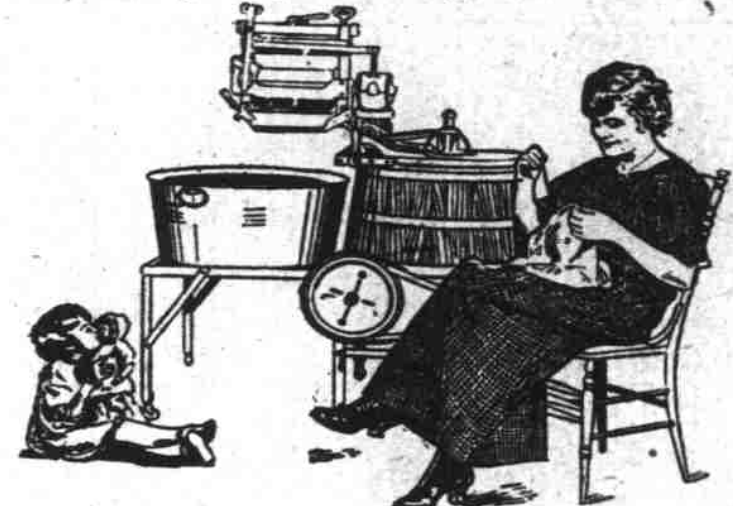

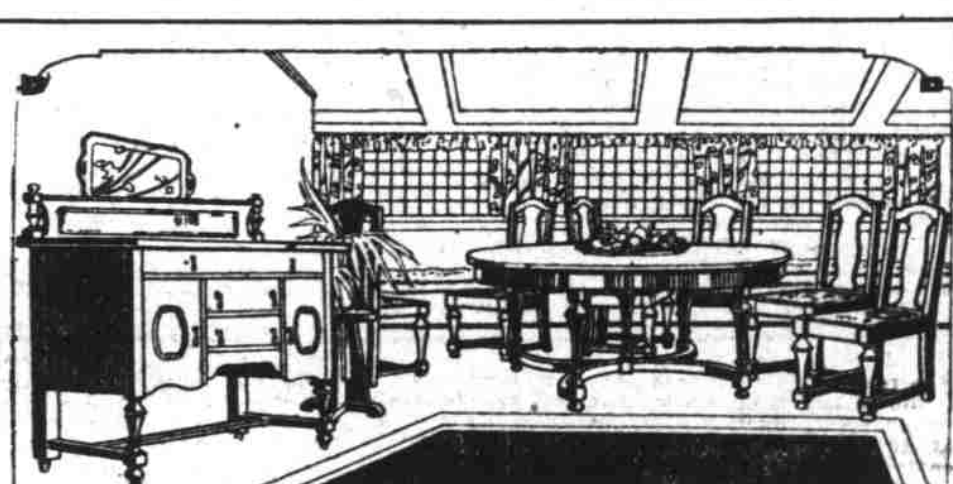
