

GREETERS HIGHLY ENTHUSIASTIC AT RECEPTION HERE

"Never Before Have We Been So Royally Entertained," Is Unanimous Verdict of Visitors
HIGHWAY TRIP CLINCHES

Visit to Eagle Creek and Salmon Bake Make All Wish to Stay Here Always.

Greeters of America were captivated by Portland. "Never before have we been entertained so royally," was the unanimous verdict rendered by the hotelmen attending the national convention before departing for California Saturday morning.

Oregon's roses, her cherries, her scenery and her hospitality had its effect and prospective tourists in Chicago, New York, Kansas City, Des Moines, Philadelphia and all the other cities in the East which were represented at the Greeters' convocation will be told by the hotelmen that they mustn't miss visiting Portland.

"Let the boys come to Portland and we'll show them the time of their lives," declared eight local Greeters at the Boston convention two years ago. And they did. Charles Schreiter of the Hotel Portland, president of the Oregon Greeters, and his cohorts have for months been working out the details of the convention just closed. From the moment of their arrival, when they were met at the station with a band, to the hour of their departure, when they were brought in from the Columbia river highway in time for their train, every hour of the visiting Greeters' time was filled. Business sessions took up a large part of the days, but between were interspersed luncheons and drives and entertainments of one kind and another.

SALMON BAKE BIGGEST TRIP.—The biggest thing of all the thing that almost took the Greeters' breath away, was the salmon bake. Nearly 200 Greeters and their families Friday were whisked up the highway to Eagle creek and fed on scenery and salmon and other good things. The weather was threatening in the morning and some Chicagoans turned over on their pillows, said it was going to rain and went to sleep again. But the most were game.

Charles Schreiter, chairman of all the convention arrangements, and Al Holcomb of the Imperial and A. N. Pierce of the Seward directed Friday's event. It was worked out well. Giant fire-crackers were tossed into the cars, but these proved to be filled with cookies. Headed by two traffic officers who cleared the highway ahead, the long procession started out. At the Summit house just west of Crown Point, the cars were stopped and the inmates served to punch and cherries brought to the machines. They were served scenery at the Vista house, and allowed to gaze for several minutes at Multnomah Falls.

FLEET OF SUNSHINE

Before reaching Eagle creek the Greeters were flooded with sunshine and clear skies were theirs for the rest of the day. At Eagle creek all was in readiness, for Albert Weisendanger, the forest ranger, and Emil Altofer, the Portland hotel chef, had not been idle. Mr. Weisendanger helped them park their cars. The occasion and place were thronged down the gravelled road to the long, curved table made for their special use by Mr. Weisendanger.

Such eats! Chef Altofer, assisted by C. J. Van Dyne of the Carlton, G. O. Madison of the Nortonia, Ray Clark of the Multnomah, and others, had arrived at 6 o'clock that morning in order that the feed might be served on time and in the proper manner. There were 17 Royal Chinook salmon-roses, potatoes, radishes, eggs, greenery and other garnishments, besides enormous platters of butter, cream, salads, buns, coffee and big bowls of raspberry shortcake and cream. Then there were candy and cigars and several large boxes of Royal Ann cherries for everyone to help themselves to.

ASBESTOS WAS POPULAR

A burro named Asbestos that makes his home around the camp was adopted immediately upon the arrival of the Greeters and with the official banner, "Duke" Pohl, the plump and affable sergeant at arms from St. Louis, took him in charge and gave him a seat of honor at the table, feeding him lettuce and other delicacies between bites, and after dinner giving all the children a ride upon his back. After dinner they all had to take everybody's pictures and discuss what a wonderful feed it was, what wonderful service they had and how wonderful everything was, while a few of the more athletic inclined strolled up the trail to the Punch Bowl. Not being accustomed to walking, however, the 2½ miles seemed like 14 to them, and they puffed up the trail they wanted to know where the lake was. But they were well pleased with the canyon and the Punch Bowl and even clambered down the steep bank to the creek bed.

OFFICIAL PICTURES TAKEN

At the camp grounds several official pictures were taken, "Asbestos" occupying a prominent place, and C. F. Lucas, the Seattle member with eight children, surrounded by all the little ones so that he might feel at home. Charles Schreiter and his assistants strolled around and saw that everyone was happy.

The visiting Greeters were then taken to Cascade Locks; they were shown a fish wheel and how the salmon are caught. Then the Easterners all had to take each other's picture again, holding a 40 pound salmon. They were shown the fish hatcheries at Bonville and returned to Chanticleer for lunch and dancing.

Watching the sunset upon the Columbia from the porch of the Inn John T. Faxon, Henry J. Bohn of Chicago, R. D. McFadden of Nebraska and other hotel secretaries discussed the advisability of actually moving to Oregon and how they regretted leaving it, even for a time. "Not one thing was lacking," said R. W. Eyster of Des Moines, "to make our convention just closed the best we have ever had."

"Oh that I could bottle up some of this air and take back some of this scenery to Chicago," said V. S. Warriner, national secretary, who motored through with his family. "The West is simply wonderful," echoed President Leonard Hicks of Chicago. "It has exceeded my greatest anticipations," said Jack Ball of New York. "I want my wife to see it next year."

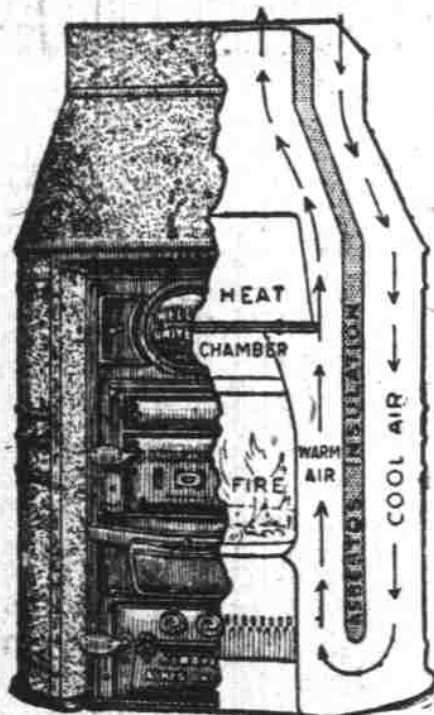
