

LOYD GEORGE TO INTRODUCE TREATY

Premier Will Place Bill for Ratification Before Commons; Clemenceau Acts.

London, June 30.—(I. N. S.)—Premier Lloyd George will introduce a bill in the house of commons Thursday providing for ratification of the treaty of peace.

After offering the bill, he will explain some of its provisions and the methods of executing the treaty.

Premier Lloyd George received a tremendous ovation when he appeared in the house of commons this afternoon for the first time since the treaty was signed. The cheering lasted a minute. Afterwards an anthem of thanksgiving was sung.

"The treaty is the most comprehensive and most far reaching ever concluded," declared Mr. Lloyd-George. "It gives new terms for the destiny of mankind."

CLEMENCEAU SUBMITS TREATY TO CHAMBER OF DEPUTIES

Paris, June 30.—(I. N. S.)—A general police will only be an illusion unless we are capable of interior peace," declared Premier Clemenceau in laying the treaty of peace with Germany before the chamber of deputies this afternoon.

"Too long we have dispersed our interior strength. Our fields have been ravaged of the elite of our youth who lie in glorious shrouds but France stands erect. Now let us get back to work."

The whole chamber rose and applauded enthusiastically as the premier concluded. Members warmed about him and wrung his hand when he regained his seat.

Farm Bureau Adopts Cooperative Market Project in Jackson

Medford, June 30.—The Jackson county farm bureau has decided to market livestock and farm produce on a cooperative basis, and to this end the executive committee has elected Roland J. Flaherty, the bureau secretary-treasurer, as manager and he will be in charge of all shipping on a purely cooperative basis.

The lack of an adequate marketing system for farm produce and livestock has long been realized by the farmers of the county, and the more progressive ones have always longed for the time when they would have a county organization which could support an agent in the field.

The wide awake farmers and citizens of the county will watch with much interest the success of this movement. Under the present system of marketing there was little encouragement for increased production.

Fast Driving Brings Fines

Six speeders appeared this morning before District Attorney Judge Dayton and paid fines ranging from \$12.50 to \$25. P. C. Pierce, who got the highest assessment, was caught making 38 miles an hour on the Powell valley road.

C. J. Christensen was going somewhere near the same speed on the same stretch, but because he had a sick woman in his car his fine was lessened to \$20. Other fined were Dean Fritland, \$15; E. L. Adams, \$16; L. B. Newman, \$15; and E. Newman, \$12.50.

Holland Must Act on Kaiser

Amsterdam, June 30.—(U. P.)—The Paris correspondent of the Telegraaf said today that Holland, as a member of the League of Nations, will be asked to inform the ex-kaiser that he must appear for trial before an international court or leave Dutch territory.

STATE IS ADVISED TO PAY TAZWELL

Ruling Made That Law Must Be Considered Constitutional Until Courts Decide Otherwise.

Salem, June 30.—Holding that it is not within the province of an administrative office to pass upon the validity or constitutionality of laws enacted by the legislature, the secretary of state's office is advised, in an opinion by Assistant Attorney General Van Winkle, to issue the warrants in payment of the salary of George Tazwell as circuit judge of Multnomah county.

The law provides methods for testing the validity of legislative acts, the opinion states, and until such action is taken and the law nullified by the supreme court the law is presumed to be valid and the secretary of state is advised to comply with its provisions.

On June 27, as secretary of state, a letter to Olegst, as secretary of state, had declared that he and his fellow bondsmen would be held liable if any further warrants were issued to Tazwell who, he declared, was usurping the duties of circuit judge, which office he declares to be unconstitutional.

GOVERNOR POINTS GAINS OF SERVICE

Proclamation Tells of Advantages Obtainable by Enlistment in Army of U. S.

Salem, June 30.—The educational opportunities offered enlisted men in the United States army and the benefits to be derived from a year of military training are pointed out in a proclamation issued by Governor Oleott, in encouragement of the recruiting campaign now under way for securing men to fill the ranks of existing units of the army. The proclamation, which was issued upon the request of Major General William H. Johnston, who commanded the Ninety-first division in France, but who is now stationed at Camp Lewis, reads as follows:

"Whereas, Many of the citizens of this state rendered patriotic and valuable service to the country during the great war for civilization. Such men, whether commissioned or enlisted, have returned to their homes better qualified for the duties of citizens as a result of the training and experience in the army; and

"Whereas, The war department, because of the discharge of a large number of men called to service for the emergency, is desirous of securing recruits to fill the ranks of existing units of the army; and

"Whereas, Camp Lewis, American Lake, Wash., at which many citizens of this state were trained, still possesses the facilities for military training, and in addition thereto it is the policy of the war department to enable men serving in the army to undertake studies, or the practice of various trades, which will improve their academic standing at college, or increase their earning capacity, after their discharge. Not only are the men who have served in the army assured of the benefits to be obtained through further service, but many young men not yet carried nor established in life can well improve their citizenship by voluntarily enlisting for service in the army, either at Camp Lewis or elsewhere;

"Now, therefore, for the benefit of the citizens of this state I call attention to the educational opportunities afforded through service in the army, and believe that young men not yet committed to any profession or trade can well spend a year undergoing military training."
