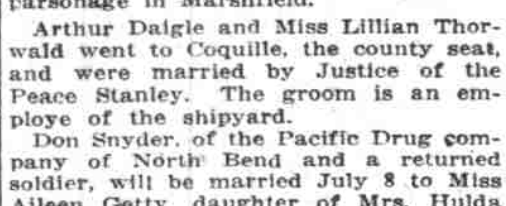
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Garden Hints

The wheel hoe is the greatest labor saving device that the gardener can own. The device for cutting weeds just below the surface will also give the shallow cultivation necessary after the first deep working of the soil.

Raffia is excellent for tying such plants as tomatoes or dahlias to the stake. Twine will often cut the stalks if they whip about in the wind. Tie loosely so as to allow room for growth.

In transplanting seedlings, pour water into the hole before the plant is set and then cover with surface soil. If the watering is done after the plant is set, the surface tends to bake and harden. A dust mulch keeps the moisture about the roots.

Lantanas, or shrubby verbenas, may be transplanted at any time. They are excellent for porch boxes or hanging baskets, as they withstand dry soil and hot weather and yet bloom profusely. Some of the yellows and browns are particularly charming.

Corn planted in a well prepared seed bed begins to outstrip that which was carelessly planted as soon as the growing season gets well under way. First preparation of soil is really the determining factor in gardening success. No amount of after cultivation will make up for slovenly work in preparing the soil to receive the seed.

SOMEONE is evidently fighting for the life of the sweater.

It has developed so rapidly from a commonplace garment into one that suggests the high cost of living that one feels sure it has a host of followers behind it.

It is no longer a knitted wool saque put on for comfort after a game of tennis or during a chill morning in the house. Today it accentuates the fact that women have worn it socially, in the afternoon, against the criticism of a public that did not believe in such apparel outside of the open fields.

It is too expensive in its present form to be kept for sports; it is too ornamental to be worn in the house; it seems to say that if it is discarded as an ordinary garment it will become an extraordinary one. Truly, those who like sweaters must have been sitting up nights or putting their dreams into fabric, for there has never been anything to equal this new development.

It is difficult to find out why they are called by the old clumsy name, unless it is the fact that they are knitted.

FIRST THE FILET LACE
When it became apparent to those who sell sports garments that the ordinary woolen sweater had had its day as a fashionable garment there was a strong attempt to introduce something eccentric.

This was achieved in the sweater which followed the genuine filet lace patterns in wool, not in cotton thread.

The idea was well received. The sweater had a good sale. The seed sown then has blossomed into rare and colorful fruit. The filet foundation is considered necessary for the new types of sweaters and upon it are worked out various schemes of design and coloring.

Perhaps the entire foundation of the new type of garment rests upon the desire to loosen the stitches of the knitted wool and drop into a filet design.

This was the beginning of the end of the old sweater and the chance for a new garment; one that will probably sweep the country and become established in our costumery.

One might know the costume is French by the length of the skirt; and yet there are many women in this country who are accepting the five-inches-below-the-knee skirt and doing their best to make their public accept it without criticism.
