

SPOKANE WOMAN IS ELECTED PRESIDENT OF NURSERY SOCIETY

Meeting Next Year Will Be Held In Home City of New Executive of Association.

A precedent in the history of the Pacific Coast Association of Nurserymen was established this morning when Mrs. R. Day of Spokane was elected president. Mrs. Day is the first woman to be elected to this office. The meeting next year will be held in the home city of the new president.

Other officers elected: Vice presidents, Washington, Fred May, Yakima; Oregon, A. Brownell, Portland; California, M. H. Jackson, Fresno; British Columbia, C. A. S. Atwood, Idaho; C. T. Hawkes, Caldwell; Utah, B. H. Bower, Provo.

V. H. Snyder of Wenatchee, C. J. Atwood of Toppenish and S. A. Miller of Milton, were elected members of the executive committee. C. A. Thompson of Burton, Wash., was re-elected secretary.

Resolutions opposing the selling of trees and shrubs at cost or at a profit by city park departments, agricultural colleges or others not strictly nurserymen, and favoring uniform prices at a fair margin of profit were adopted.

It was decided to appoint a publicity campaign committee to work with the various agricultural colleges in education along ornamental or landscape gardening lines.

NEW WORK WILL BE TAKEN UP BY RELIEF COMMITTEE IN STATE

Red Cross Turns Activity Over To Armenia Organization For Foreign Aid.

New obligations have been placed on the Oregon committee for Armenian relief since the Red Cross turned its work in Palestine and Syria over to the American committee for Armenian relief, says J. J. Handsaker, formerly secretary of the Oregon committee and now regional director of relief work for Alaska, California, Oregon and Nevada. Including a remittance this week of \$10,000 from Ben Selling, state treasurer, Oregon has sent in \$165,000 of its \$184,000 quota, with a number of counties yet to send in their reports.

C. A. Slaver, president of the Multnomah County Sunday School association, reports an unexpectedly hearty response to the appeal made on June 10 to the Sunday schools. Forty schools have reported with pledges and cash aggregating \$4500, and an appeal is being sent to the remaining schools to send in their pledges at once.

\$755,657.16 Balance

In County Treasury; Receipts \$6,241,178

The semi-annual report of County Auditor Sam Martin issued Wednesday shows that the treasury of Multnomah county has a balance on hand July 1, 1914, of \$755,657.16. Receipts since the first of the year total \$6,241,178.13, while the disbursements were \$5,485,521.13. Outstanding bonded indebtedness of the county is \$2,400,000. Of this amount \$1,250,000 represents road bonds and \$1,150,000 interstate bridge bonds. Road bonds are paid off at the rate of \$125,000 a year and the bridge bonds at the rate of \$50,000 a year.

Loganberry Juice

Manufacturers in Tax Removal Plea

Manufacturers of loganberry juice in Oregon have appealed to the Portland and State Chambers of Commerce asking them to use their influence with the Oregon delegates in Washington in obtaining the removal of the 10 per cent tax on value of the product imposed at the last session of congress.

A 50 per cent tax proposed before the last session of congress for fruit juices was eliminated but later substituted by the conference committee on taxation.

Effort to Deprive Woman of Property Denied By Attorneys

Attorneys for George A. Thompson denied today that the suit their client brought against Jane Stearns, former Washington high school teacher, for the relinquishment of her equity in the five-room bungalow in Rose City Park was in any way an unjust attempt to deprive Miss Stearns of her property.

They assert that Miss Stearns purchased the property from Mr. Thompson in 1912 and that she has made no payments since 1915. There is \$225 due on the purchase price and in addition a first mortgage amounting to \$1400. The bungalow on the property is 10 years old and is assessed at \$300. The highest

possible value of the property, say the attorneys, is \$2500. They state that they have endeavored to protect Miss Stearns' rights for a number of years, but the fact that she left Oregon has made it difficult. According to their statement Miss Stearns was adjudged incompetent in Wisconsin and a guardian was appointed for her. It was because of her refusal to follow any instructions issued by H. H. Herdman, principal of the Washington high school, that led to her dismissal as teacher here, it is asserted.

Girl Hurt in Collision

In a collision on East Sixty-second and Stark streets, about 3 o'clock Wednesday night, between a "bug" driven by J. Thompson, 2154 East Main street, and another machine driven by H. H. Thompson, 84 East Twenty-second street north, Miss Young, an occupant of J. Thompson's car, was thrown to the ground, causing severe bruises and cuts about the head.

Roosevelt Highway To Have Hearing in Congress Friday

Members of the Oregon delegation at Washington and the special committee of three headed by Charles Hall, president of the State Chamber of Commerce, who are at the national capital in the interest of obtaining a federal appropriation for the construction of the Roosevelt coast highway, will go before the committee on roads Friday, according to a message received by George Quayle, secretary of the State Chamber, this morning.

Mr. Hall says that the Oregon delegation is giving splendid support to the highway and efforts are being made to obtain aid from the delegations of Washington and California.

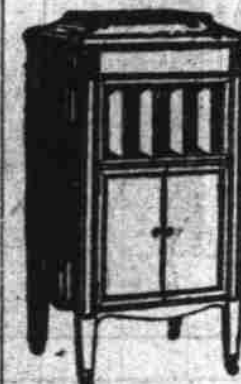

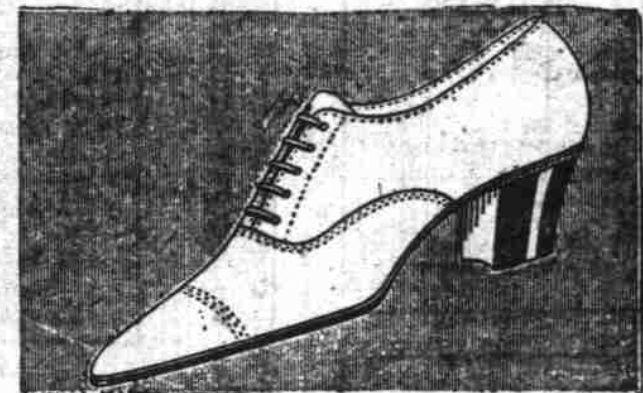
