

Approach of Harvest Season and Scarcity of Men Causes Increase in Wages.

Albany, July 11 .- Owing to the approach of the harvest season and the scarcity of labor generally, the paving contractors on the Pacific highway are paying as high as \$4.50 per day for common labor and are experiencing difficulty in getting men at that price.

The hay crop in this section is exceptionally good and many of the farm boys who were working on the highway and elsewhere between seeding and harvest are giving up their jobs to help the folks at home harvest.

The paving plant of the Kern Construction company at Jefferson is rapidly nearing completion and the work of paving the highway between there and Albany will begin soon. The grading and bridge work is virtually completed and the spreading of the crushed rock began Thursday.

Big Forest Fires Feared

Albany, July 11 .- Starting on the Fourth, the first fire of the season in the Santiam forest burned about 50 acres of standing timber and over nearly half section of land about seven miles south of Fish lake, before being brought under control. Supervisor Hall says the timber is unusually dry for this early in the season and that large fires may be expected unless rain comes soon.

New Traffic Law Passed




