Dr. W. T. McElveen of Manhattan Congregational, to Speak Sunday at 1st Congregational.

Dr. W. T. McElveen, pastor of the Manhattan Congregational church of New York city, will preach twice Sunday at the First Congregational church here. Dr. McElveen will discuss the subject of patience in his morning address. Before entering the ministry Dr. McElveen was a newspaper man, having spent several years as a reporter and space writer on the New York Herald. He has held two pastorates in New York city, each 20 years apart. After graduating from the University of New York and the Union Theological seminary, he stayed at the latter institution until a more suitable building was constructed, after which he was asked by leaders of the denomination to combine two Congregational churches in Brooklyn. This United Congregational church was the church from which Dr. Luther R. Dyott came to Portland.

He was next called to the pastorate of the Shawmut church in Boston. At the time he assumed this pastorate the church was accustomed to close two months each summer, but he insisted that it should always be open, so it came to be an every-day church. Dr. McElveen stayed in Boston 10 years. He was the teacher of the teachers' training class, which had an average attendance of 900 every Sunday afternoon.

Dr. McElveen next responded to a call from Evanston, Ill., where he built up a church of 1000 members. There he was president of the board of education president of the Congregational School for Women, and president of the Congregational State conference of Illia wo years ago he went to the Manhattan church. This church has the distinction of having the largest and mos successful sailors' and soldiers' club the state. In the first year of its life it ministered to over 60,000 service men. It bathed them and canteened them, furnished rooms for 100 every night, held two dances a week and maintained classes in French, first aid and European history. Dr. MqElveen ilso conducted a weekly current events class in which the soldiers and sallors were instructed as to the significance of contemporaneous events.

FOR \$6,000,000 Half Million Dollars Necessary to Complete Amount Which Denomination Set Out to Raise, OREGON'S SHARE IS \$5000

Necessity for Obtaining Full Amount Is to Secure Gift o \$2,000,000 From Rockefeller.

A final effort to raise \$500,000 the balance needed to make the nutional \$6,000,000 Victory compaign complete, will be made Sunday in the Baptist churches of the nation. Oregon's share in this final drive in about \$5000, of which Portland is to raise one-half.

The reason the denomination is so determined to reach the \$6,000,000 figure is that John D. Rockefeller has stipulated that he will give the church \$1,000,000 for foreign mission work and a similar amount for l mission work if they can collect the fund in cash by the end of this year.
