

INDICTMENTS ARE ARRAYED AGAINST ALLEGED BANDITS

Richard Berg and David Miller,
Who Were With Man Shot
During Robbery, Face Charges

MANY CHARGED WITH THEFT

County Grand Jury Finds Several
True Bills on Cases Arising
From Purloined Automobiles.

Indictments charging assault with a dangerous weapon, larceny, burglary and robbery were returned this morning by the Multnomah county grand jury against Richard Berg and David Miller, two alleged hold-up men, who were with John Lutti on the evening of June 30, when he was shot and killed by Patrolman John Finn. Berg and Miller were arrested during an attempt to loot a tire shop on the east side.

The two men are indicted jointly for the larceny of an automobile from John L. Schafer and for the alleged burglary of the tire shop of C. G. North, 260 Williams avenue. A separate indictment was returned against Berg charging him with, on June 14, assaulting R. L. Whiteside, a special officer. Berg was also indicted on a charge of having held up and robbed C. P. Small, June 29. In the latter two cases the accused is averred to have used weapons in the commission of the crimes charged.

TIRES ARE STOLEN

Garland Rose and Broda Sublette were indicted jointly, charged with the theft of four auto tires from the delivery truck of A. Tuttle Dove.

Captain William Hanson of the Sunnyside fire station was indicted on an assault and battery charge. L. W. Gilliland is complainant.

Willis W. Ireland is named in an indictment alleging larceny of an automobile belonging to Addison Knapp.

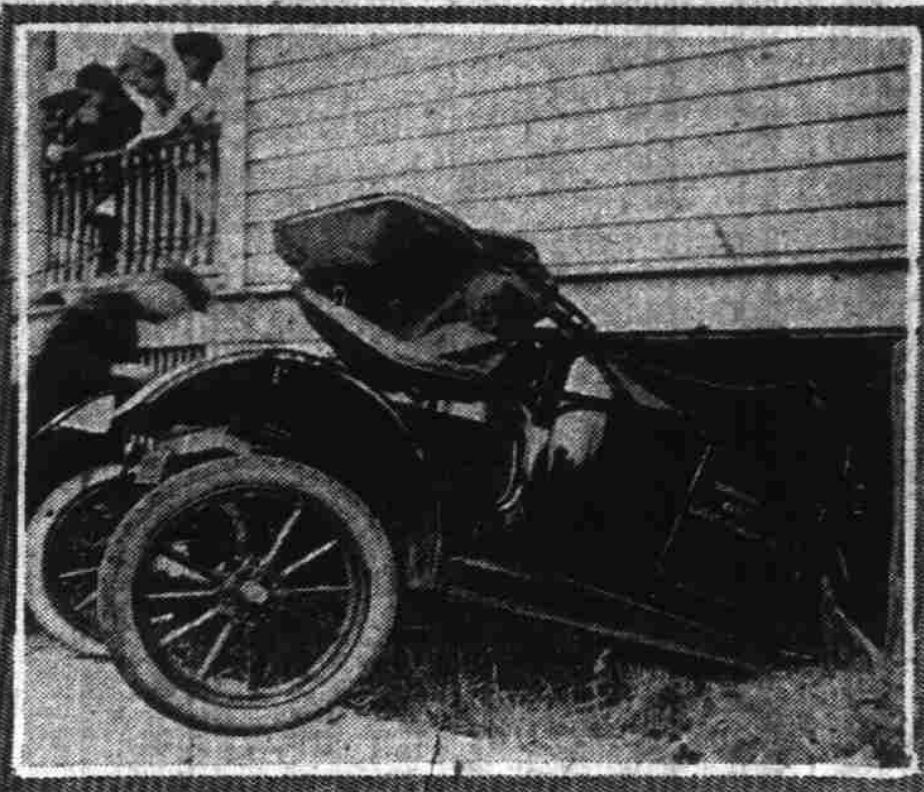
Forgery of a number of checks alleged to have been stolen from the Fulton Wood company is charged in the indictment returned against Leonard Coffman and Clinton Grier.

J. P. Kellier and Edward Farrell were both indicted on robbery charges. They are accused of taking money from Thomas Cleonetti and William Poggi after representing themselves as officers searching for contraband liquor. Kellier is said to have collected \$150 from Cleonetti on June 15, after accusing the Italian of having wine on his premises.

AUTO LARCENY CHARGED
Larceny of an automobile belonging to Mable McBride from the Hellig theatre on July 5, is charged in the indictment returned against Hal Strauch.

Ray Carpenter is charged with the theft of a police star, revolver and holster from V. C. Rippen.

AUTO HEADS INTO BASEMENT



Driverless automobile that threw man off running board, crossed three street intersections, narrowly missed telephone pole, jumped over curb and darted into basement doorway, where it stuck fast.

**ENFORCED SMALLPOX
VACCINATION WANTED
BY HEALTH OFFICER**

Dr. Parrish Says It Is Only Hope
of Successfully Combating
Spread of Disease.

Compulsory vaccination for all persons exposed to smallpox will be recommended to the city council by City Health Officer George Parrish at Wednesday's meeting, he announced this morning. Dr. Parrish declares that it is practically impossible to totally stamp out the disease in the city without the vaccination weapon.

"The floating population which came to Oregon with shipbuilding and other industrial activities included all classes

and kinds of people. Many of them had smallpox and other forms of communicable diseases. The health bureau asked for assistance from the government, which was only partially given," said Dr. Parrish. "Although no deaths have occurred from smallpox, to date, I feel that we should by all means be empowered to make compulsory vaccination if we are to be expected to prevent spread of the disease."

Burn Healer Recommended
Fire Chief Dowell will recommend to Commissioner Bigelow that Ambrine, a French creation for healing burns and cuts, be adopted by the Portland fire department. It is claimed that Ambrine gives instant relief, leaves no scars, seals the wound from outside infection and is removed without disturbing the mending tissue.

Municipal Fish Market Sold
The municipal fish market has been sold to G. E. Weiss of the Sanitary market for \$1299. The fixtures brought \$719, stock \$276, and 7028 pounds of black cod in storage changed hands for \$213. Although the market has caused an actual loss to the city, estimated at \$3000, it is argued that it served its purpose in decreasing the market price of fish.

MRS. MARGARET HART, 38 YEARS RESIDENT OF PORTLAND, DIES

Widow of Patrick Hart Was Born
in Ireland; Survived by Two
Sons and Five Daughters.

Mrs. Margaret Hart died Friday at her home, 377 East First street north, following an illness of 18 months, at the age of 58. Mrs. Hart was born in Ireland and had resided in Portland for the past 38 years. Her husband, Patrick Hart, died in 1913.

Woman Suspect in Robbery Connection Is Given 60 Days

Sixty days in the county jail was the sentence imposed by Judge Rossmann this morning upon Mrs. Katherine Hammer, arrested on a state vagrancy charge as a result of an investigation following the shooting of John Lutti by Officer Finn, and the subsequent capture of Dick Berg and Dave Miller, alleged burglars and ex-convicts, companions of Lutti.

Mrs. Hammer was found in the room supposed to have been used as the headquarters of the gang. Some of the property identified as part of the loot is alleged to have been found in her possession.

More Teachers Are Needed in Clatsop

Astoria, July 12.—School teachers are badly needed in Clatsop county. No less than 25 teachers are wanted in 20 districts outside the city, and not a single application is on file. The minimum salary offered is \$90 a month and at one single room the monthly salary is \$115. The term is to open in September and continue for nine months.

Indications are that some of the schools will not open this fall, owing to lack of teachers.

Four Charged With Storing of Gasoline

Warrants for the arrest of J. G. Mitchell, F. B. Jones, B. W. Gage and C. E. Bicknell, charged with storing gasoline on docks for more than 24 hours, were sworn to by First Marshal Grenfell Saturday morning. Mitchell is alleged to have stored 50 gallons near the Burnside bridge for several days, and Jones is charged with leaving 2000 gallons on the Ash street dock for two weeks. Chicago Streetcar Men Demand Raise

Chicago, July 12.—(U. P.)—Pay of \$7 cents an hour, an increase of 77 per cent, was demanded by streetcar men here today. Employees of elevated lines joined in a strike threat, demanding 37 per cent raises to 87 cents for motor-men and 82 cents for conductors. Employers said granting these requests will mean fares of 9 or 10 cents.

Lumber in Barracks to Be Sold
Salt Lake, July 12.—Three million feet of lumber, used in the building at the cantonment barracks at Fort Douglas, is to be sold to home builders. It was learned today. The sale is to be made through the "own your home" committee of the Salt Lake Commercial club.

STRUGGLE CLOUDS BRITAIN'S FUTURE

Conflict Between Labor and Capital
Over Control of Coal
Presages Evil Times.

London, July 12.—The public views with alarm the threatening clouds darkening the horizon and presaging the fiercest economic struggle in the history of the empire, revolving around coal.

The most intense speculation centers around the stand Premier Lloyd George will take. The miners stand pat, backed by the full-hearted support of labor in Britain and that of the equally united and well prepared proponents of nationalization.

Stanley MacLain, president of the London chamber of commerce, said today: "Our power for export will be seriously weakened, and in many cases destroyed, if the 6 shillings advance is imposed. American ships will bring coal to Newcastle and the balance of trade against us will be further increased."

George Terrell, chairman of the National Union of Manufacturers, said: "We will lose every neutral market, the price of every manufactured article will advance, the cost of living will increase and the vicious circle will be complete when labor asks more wages."

Tax Evaders Nabbed By a Woman's Wiles

New York, July 12.—Through the instrumentality of Rita Kilein, a strikingly beautiful woman, who is examining officer in the treasury department, a number of Wall street brokers are to be prosecuted by the federal authorities for evading payment of income taxes. Miss Kilein is examining books and papers of a number of brokers, which were seized by District Attorney Swann in his investigation of oil stock swindles.
