

BRYAN'S LECTURE AT CHAUTAUQUA TO BE GIVEN TONIGHT

Great Throng Expected to Attend to Hear Celebrated Speaker; Accommodations Are Provided

CONCERTS TO BE FEATURE

Chorus of Local Talent to Appear for First Time; Earl Hippie Company Is on Both Programs

Gladstone Park, Willamette Valley Chautauqua, July 12.—W. J. Bryan, who is considered the one big "bet" of the twenty-sixth assembly, and is to speak Sunday evening only, at 7:30 o'clock, is expected to draw a crowd that will exceed anything ever before seen on the grounds, and this crowd is not expected to all come during the afternoon or early evening, but will be attracted early in the morning by reason of the splendid picnic accommodations and the cool, delightful atmosphere of the park. The association has made every plan for giving proper care and comfort to the immense gathering.

Not a minor attraction by any means will be the Earl Hippie Concert company, which will give a program this afternoon at 1:30 o'clock, and again in the evening preceding the address by Mr. Bryan. Dr. W. B. Hinson of Portland will have an intellectual treat in his sermon-lecture on "Four Men Under One Hat," at 3:30 p. m.

LOCAL CHORUS TO APPEAR

The Chautauqua gathering will have for the first time the opportunity of hearing the Chautauqua chorus, which has been drilling for the past week or two under the direction of Jasper Dean MacFall of Portland and is composed of the best musical talent of Oregon and vicinity, and comprises more than 100 voices. They appear at 8 o'clock, following the concert company.

Because an attraction comprises but two performers is no criterion that the attraction is not one of high order or merit, as was proven today when the Parnells, man and woman, gave a program afternoon and evening that will stand out as one of the pleasing numbers of the assembly. It mattered not whether it was in song, recitation, impersonation or instrumental music, the Parnells won from the audience generous applause.

OLD BATTLES REFOUGHT

Many a battle is being fought around the army recruiting station on the Chautauqua grounds. The 37-millimeter mountain howitzer that stands in front of the tent creates great interest among the members of the G. A. R. who daily attend the assembly sessions and who have one of the permanent cottages on the grounds. The soldiers gather around the gun and, after listening to the sergeant's explanation of its mechanism, compare it with the cannon of '61.

Then the battle of Gettysburg, Shiloh, Missionary Ridge—all are fought over again. Grant is compared with Pershing, the battles of America are contrasted with the shell-torn fields of Europe and, last but not least, the ever-present subject of rationing comes in for its share of attention. The soldiers gather around the table of food, green vegetables, pie and ice cream of the army today, and after the sergeant's diatribe upon the army fare of today there is a rush of G. A. R. veterans to the restaurant on the grounds.

SPIRIT LAKE Y. M. C. A. CAMP POPULATION



Portland boys combine pleasures of outing with physical and mental improvement in mountain woods near Mount St. Helens. The Spirit Lake camp, opened annually, started its summer season this year on June 30 and will close on August 30.

Spirit lake is again calling to the boys of Portland. The Y. M. C. A. camp located there has reopened for the eleventh season to 26 boys eager to spend as much time as possible in the woods and mountains near Mount St. Helens. The camp is in charge of J. C. Meehan, city boys' work director of the Portland Y. M. C. A., and the first trip was made under the direction of six leaders.

The season at Spirit lake extends from June 30 to August 30 and during that time five more parties are due to leave. The next party goes Monday and the others leave July 21, August 4, 11 and 18. A special trip will be made on August 18 for 10 days. This will be especially for employed boys and the trip will be made to and from camp by auto in one day to permit as long a stay at the camp as possible.

The Y. M. C. A. camp is run on the self government plan and the surrounding district offers wonderful opportunities for hikes and swimming. Spirit lake is on the north side of Mount St. Helens and is admirably situated on a site of unparalleled scenic beauty.

Medford Aviators Form Company to Operate Airplane

Medford, July 12.—The last remaining share of the \$5000 stock in the local company promoted this week by three Medford aviators was subscribed late this afternoon, and tonight a meeting was held to organize the corporation. The company was organized to purchase and operate a Curtiss airplane in the city and valley in passenger service. It will begin operation next week and will fly flights at the Elks' state convention at Klamath Falls in August and at the Pendleton roundup. The promoters are Lieutenant Floyd H. Hart, pilot, who was officially cited for bringing down a hostile plane in France; Lieutenant Frank P. Farrell, naval aviation pilot and instructor, and Sergeant Mel Hall, who two years aviation motor expert at Rockwell field, San Diego.

WORK STARTED ON BUILDING FOR NEW SALEM PAPER MILL

Capitalized at \$800,000, Concern Is Strictly an Oregon Institution; Controlled Here.

FLOUR MILL PLANT UTILIZED

Enterprise Closely Associated With Spaulding Logging Interests, Assuring Raw Materials.

Work on the buildings for the new Oregon Pulp & Paper company, in Salem, is under way. Organization of the company has been completed. The concern is an actual Oregon institution and is capitalized for \$800,000. Other Oregon paper companies are mostly Maine corporations.

Officers of the new company are: F. W. Leadbetter, president; Charles K. Spaulding, vice-president; A. Bush of Ladd & Bush, Salem, treasurer; Roy Mills, Salem, secretary. Other directors are: Walter Spaulding, Louis Leadbetter, general manager and superintendent; Joseph Kaster, and Major Frank G. Andrew, son-in-law of Mr. Leadbetter, who is expected to return in September from overseas, where he has been with the Royal Air Service of England, since the beginning of the war. All of the officers and directors, except President Leadbetter, will live in Salem.

EMPLOYEES TO HAVE STOCK

Employees who show an interest in the business will be given opportunity to secure stock. Other Salem men, including Mr. Waldron of the Ladd & Bush bank, and the Spaulding holdings comprise more than 30,000 acres of the choicest timber in the valley.

Much of the old Salem flour mill plant is being utilized for the new paper mill, as the Spaulding department will be used for storing the sawdust for the power plant. The warehouse will be used for the wood preparation department and a large part of the foundations of the old mill will be used. The new concrete building will be 300x80 at the base and 130 feet high. The machinery for the new mill is being manufactured and should be ready when the buildings are completed.

RAW MATERIALS ASSURED

The new enterprise is closely associated with the Spaulding Logging company, assuring it an adequate supply of raw material, as the Spaulding holdings comprise more than 30,000 acres of the choicest timber in the valley. The logging company owns and operates three logging roads and steamers on the Willamette river.

Destroyer Will Be Named in Honor of Aberdeen's Record

Aberdeen, Wash., July 12.—The name Aberdeen has been accepted by the United States shipping board for the naval vessel to be christened in honor of Aberdeen's record showing in the fourth Liberty loan drive, according to a letter received this morning. The name combines syllables from Aberdeen and the investment of outside money in oil lands is swelling accounts.

Bank Deposits File Up

Aberdeen, July 12.—Hogland bank deposits are expected to exceed \$10,000,000. On July 1 deposits had reached a total of \$2,683,303.44, despite the closing of shipyards, and are continuing to pile up. Prosperity in the lumber business and the investment of outside money in oil lands is swelling accounts.

New Building to Rise

Aberdeen, July 12.—A building is to be erected here by Charles Veysey, a California capitalist, formerly in the dry goods business in Aberdeen and who still retains an interest in a large store in Montezuma.

Major Willis Is Sought

Salem, July 12.—Upon recommendation of Adjutant General Conrad Stratton, Governor Olcott today requested the war department to designate Major Percy A. Willis as inspector-instructor for the Third Oregon Infantry, national guard. Willis, who is now on the active list of the United States army, served with the Oregon guard for eight years previous to his entry into the United States army.

Berridge on Board

Salem, July 12.—Arthur Berridge of Portland was today named by Governor Olcott as a member of the state board of accountancy to succeed W. R. McKenzie, also of Portland, who has resigned.

BRITISH DECORATE OREGON CITY MAN



Captain Eldon C. Blanchard

Gladstone, July 12.—Honors from the British government have come to Captain Eldon C. Blanchard, a well known Oregon City boy, who was a lieutenant in the old Oregon City Company G, Oregon National Guard, and who has been in overseas duty two years. In a letter received by his wife of Oak Grove Captain Blanchard states that he has received notice that he has been awarded the British military cross for efficient work at Liverpool, in the United States embarkation office. In the letter, written June 18, Captain Blanchard said he expected to be cited to appear in London within a few days and have the cross conferred upon him by King George.

Captain Blanchard, at the time of enlisting for foreign service, was in the railroad express business in Portland. He served with his company on the Mexican border as second lieutenant under his brother, Captain Lowell E. Blanchard, now in Russia with the American army. Since going overseas he has advanced to a captaincy. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Blanchard, reside in Oregon City.

Rupert Is Turned Over to Esch for Return to Oregon

Salem, July 12.—William Esch, who was sent south to bring back Clyde J. (Red) Rupert, escaped Oregon convict, who was captured in Brainerd, Cal., last week, will leave San Diego tonight with his prisoner for Salem. This information is contained in a telegram, received by state prison authorities here today. Some difficulty was encountered by Esch upon his arrival in San Diego, when federal authorities refused to deliver Rupert. Governor Olcott immediately communicated with Bert Haney, United States district attorney at Portland, who instructed the federal authorities to release Rupert to the state authorities. Esch is expected to arrive here Tuesday with Rupert.

Prison Trustee Escapes

Salem, July 12.—Fred Sparks, alias Walter Raleigh, who was serving a sentence of from two to four years for burglary, made his escape from state prison guards while at work with the trusty gang in a berry field near the institution today. Sparks was sent up from Baker county June 8, 1915. He had served a former sentence in the Idaho penitentiary.

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Castlerock Plant Recently Installed

Castlerock, Wash., July 12.—The plant of the Washington Box & Manufacturing company, recently established here, has made sufficient progress in its work to begin milling orders, although all the machinery is not yet in. Several carloads of crates will be completed in 10 days. The company has sufficient orders ahead to assure a steady run and when all equipment is installed, a double shift will be required. When in capacity running order, more than 40 men will be employed. The following board of directors and officers has been elected: H. Williamson, president; J. A. Clark, vice president; D. C. Marston, treasurer and general manager; C. W. Smith, secretary.
