

MULTNOMAH FAIR AT GRESHAM IS SET FOR SEPTEMBER 15

Farm, Orchard and Stock Products Will Be Displayed and Program of Interest Arranged.

CHILDREN TO TAKE PART

Five Days of Entertainment With Not a Dull Moment in All Its Endeavor of the Management.

For the thirteenth annual time, Multnomah county will display products of farms, orchards and stock at the combined Multnomah county fair and Manufacturers' and Land Products show at Gresham, September 15 to 20. Premiums have been donated and listed and booklets are now being sent out over the state by C. D. Minton, manager of the fair.

Special days have been arranged by the directors of the fair association and something is guaranteed for every hour. Monday is children's day. All children under 16 years will be admitted to the grounds without charge and the school club members will form a big industrial pageant.

INDIAN WAR DANCE

Gresham day, with a campfire and an Indian war dance at night, will be observed Tuesday. Wednesday will be Pioneer, Women's and Groceries' day. All of these promise to have a numerous representation and the pioneers and grocers are arranging special programs of their own.

Not a dull minute is foreseen Thursday because it is not only Portland day, but Oregon Manufacturers' day, Business Men's and Automobile day. All civic organizations will participate in Business Men's day and the manufacturers of Portland people will journey to the fair that day.

Friday is Fraternal, Woodmen of the World, Elks, Grange and School Children's day. Fraternal organizations will compete for a prize for the largest percentage attendance. Patriotic day will come Saturday and state societies will join in making this day a success. The last evening of the week will be exhibition night also.

Thousands of dollars in prize money has been placed for the livestock exhibition.

Cattle and horses will come in for the most of the interest displayed in the livestock and then there will be sheep and goats, which the school children will be specially interested in, and swine and poultry. Special prizes by various firms in Oregon have been placed on the livestock exhibits in addition to the prize money offered by the fair association.

Other features of the exhibits will be: the milk and butter test, grange contests, county exhibits, agricultural exhibits, horticultural exhibits, Oregon manufacturers' displays, domestic science shows, art exhibits, herb and mineral displays and floral contests.

BABY SHOW SCHEDULED

A baby show will be held under competent supervision at 3 o'clock on the afternoon of the last day. Industrial clubs of the state will make an extensive display of various projects including corn and potato growing, poultry raising, pork production, sheep and calf raising, cooking, sewing and school exhibits.

Horse races, chariot and automobile races will be featured as entertainment attractions on the various days, and numerous amusement concessions are being made.

H. A. Lewis is president of the fair, Rufus Holman is vice president, A. F. Miller, secretary, and Theodore Brugger treasurer. Superintendents have been appointed for the various exhibits.

Union of Tomato And Potato Gives A Unique Product

Many cross-bred vegetables have come to light as the product of some plant wizard's ingenuity and skill, but A. Dixon, of 1243 Concord street, has a combination, which, came about purely by accident.

Adjacent to Mr. Dixon's potato patch are several tomato plants. One of these plants, not content to pollinate plants of its own kind, cast its influence over a potato vine, just coming into blossom. The result, while not unique, proved curious.

Instead of having real potatoes as a normal plant would, this vine developed "potatoes" on its branches. Mr. Dixon did not wait to allow the "potatoes" to reach maturity, but cut down the vine. The "potatoes" are eyeless, have a smooth skin like the tomato and have the inner pulp of the potato, with a suggestion of the tomato structure. Several of the branches are bearing to-mato leaves.

Mr. Dixon has shown his freak plant to many of his neighbors. Inasmuch as the globeles were attached to the vine by slender stems, most of them fell off before reaching any considerable size.
