MARINE RECRUITS MUST GO TO SEA ON SHORE FIRST

They Must Sail Imaginary Ocean
On Sandy, Palm-Treed Island
Before They Tread Real Deck,
ALL GO TO TRAINING SCHOOL

Regular Routine of Instruction Is
Followed, After Which Aspirants
Become Real Sea Dogs.

Marine recruits of the present and future, must go to sea on dry land before they can ever aspire to go to sea on real water. They must sail miles and miles of imaginary ocean on a sandy, palm-treed island in the safety of their wooden, double-decked bunkhouses before being assigned to real ship duty, according to new orders of the authorities of the marine corps.

Originally the men serving under the eagle, globe and anchor were intended for ship duty. The little unpleasantness with Germany deflected them from their original purpose, while the exigencies of war sent into their ranks and their Hall of Heroes many men who didn't know their starboard bow from their wrist watch. Now with the war over, the soldiers of the sea are coming back to their first love—the battleship, and they must be thoroughly trained before they can step out in their nifty blue uniforms and take their place aboard the great leviathans.

So a dry land school for seagoing marines was opened at Paris Island, S. C., and already has turned out a number of finished products, who have sailed away to foreign shores.

SLEEP IN HAMMOCKS
The 200 or more men in the training school actually sleep in hammocks, and their first lesson in ship's routine is to lash up their hammocks with a rope so they may be out of the way during the day.

Here's the way the average day runs for the recruit:

Reveille at 5:30 a. m. A brisk period of exercises is followed by breakfast, assembly for school at 7:30, 45 minutes is then devoted to orderly duty or a lesson in signaling with wig-wag, semaphore or heliograph. Inspection of quarters follows at 8:30, with 40 minutes of close order drill thereafter.

At 9:45 school again, with practical work as members of a gun's crew (marines man the secondary batteries aboard battleships), or perhaps a study of rank and rating insignia. At 11:30 a. m. a listed men of all branches of the service. It is more or less easy, let it be remarked, for the young recruit to learn the insignia of his own service, but it keeps his brain buzzing to distinguish the different ratings of the navy.

School again at 10:45, this time perhaps for a lecture on shipboard life, its afloat or in packing regulation lockers. Emergency drills such as in case of fire, collision or "bandit ship" or in the event of an engagement with the enemy also enliven the recruit's time and especially his imagination.

NOT ALL DRY LAND

Following is the noon meal, but it is served just like on shipboard, and if the chow-house would only rock a bit once in awhile, making the novice conduct his fork into his ear instead of his mouth, he would have the full effect of being at sea. There is an hour's rest after chow.

But it is not all dry-land sailing for the embryo soldier of the sea. Paris Island, as its name indicates, is on or in the ocean and the average recruit breathes, drinks and swims in salt water. So in the afternoon the 300 recruits put to sea in seven cutters, equipped with oars and sails. The crews will together under the command of experienced coxswain or, with sails set, tack in the breeze.

Soon they are maneuvering under direction of their flagships. The recruit, in management and control of their own "ships." Sails in the air are furled and the boat crews, with the school's stroke, race for the dock where school is held in the nomenclature of small boats, boat courtesy, handling an oar and tiller.

ISLAND IS LIGHTED

The island is kept lighted at night by signals being flashed by the division on, watch at the three masts. The messages are sent from masts atop the bunkhouses to men in the "fighting top" of a palm tree or on the "quarter deck" of the K. of C. building and relayed to all parts of the island.

When the recruit gets to talk like a seagoer, when he calls out "batten that port-hole" instead of close the window, and speaks in no mild manner of the "bo's'n" and the "C. P. O." when he knows the main mission from the bridge and the keelson from the "fo'castle," he is ready to receive his new blue uniform. There's the secret of his choosing the life afloat instead of duty on land or in the tropic—it's the lure of the navy, neat blue uniform that keeps that little land school on Paris Island full at all times.

The marine on ship duty wears the navy blue jacket with bright brass buttons and on dress inspections, white gloves and a white belt with a brass buckle. His trousers are of sky blue, his cap of dark blue with a bronze marine corps emblem and black lace shoes.

After all these lessons, when he knows the battleship from stern to stern, when he can salute like a veteran and carry out orders like a Paul Revere, the marine is no longer a recruit. He is a full-fledged seagoer and he is transferred to a real battleship for duty.
