CRATER LAKE, July 8.—A record number of tourists marked the first week of the season at Crater lake, which opened July 1. Three hundred guests have already registered at Crater Lake lodge, at the rim, and campers' tents are being pitched in places where the snow has sufficiently melted. Stages between Medford and the lake run daily, covering the 75 mile stretch in approximately six hours. With the exception of a short distance near Union creek, where construction is going on, the road is in good condition.

Among the pre-season visitors, who stopped at the lower camp at Anna Springs, making the trip to the rim on foot through the snow, was Zane Grey, whose tales of the West are familiar to the American reading public. In Mr. Grey's party was his wife, his brother, R. C. Grey, director of a movie company in Los Angeles, and Miss Ackermann, his secretary. Zane Grey is touring Oregon collecting local color for a new book. Meantime R. C. Grey is keeping an eye primed for promising moving-picture material. The party expect to return to the lake during the coming week and then will drive north stopping in Portland.

Oregon Snow Peaks Are Attractive to Former Easterners
Oregon's snow peaks are most attractive to D. Vincent Stroop, new assistant to District Engineer P. H. Dater of the forest service, who has just arrived in Portland from Washington, D. C.

For nine years Mr. Stroop has been connected with the war department as assistant to the superintendent of parks in the eastern states but the yearning for the West led him to be transferred from the war to the agricultural department, of which the forest service is a branch.

Mr. Stroop is delighted with the Northwest, and its cool climate after sweating in the eastern city. In Washington the houses are all built up close to each other, leaving no space for lawns.

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
