

PEOPLE OF FRANCE MUCH ADMIRER BY PORTLAND DOCTOR

Their Fortitude Under Continued Trials and Tribulations Basis of Extremely Laudatory Views.

'C'EST LA GUERRE,' ATTITUDE

Criticism of Y. M. C. A. Ascribed to Hysteria; Organized Propaganda Against League Is Seen.

"France is the only country in which the war could have been won," declared Dr. R. B. Dillehunt, at the University club, this morning. Dr. Dillehunt has just arrived in Portland after being discharged from the army on July 2, in Washington, D. C. after a year in France as one of the surgeons of Base Hospital 46, the Portland unit which returned in May with a splendid record.

"I saw no sobbing women in France," he said. "Plenty of them were in mourning, but they were not sobbing. It is the only country in the world that would have stood for a bunch of foreign soldiers coming in and forcing up the prices of commodities beyond the means of the ordinary citizen. It is the only country in the world that would have stood for all that, along with the suffering, and then, spreading out the hands in that French way, say, 'C'est la guerre.'"

INURED TO MISERY
"The woman who kept the house where I was billeted was gone for several days at one time and when she returned I asked her where she had been. Just up near Verdun, she said, to get the body of her son."

"But, madame," I exclaimed, "you don't mean to say you have lost a son in the war?"
"Oh, Monsieur, one son? I have lost three sons and my husband. And then, after speaking of them for just a few moments, she gave that delightful French shrug and finished with, 'C'est la guerre.'"

"She was typical of the French fortitude. France felt, but France stood. It is a great place for a young man to go. It is not industrially rich and the people there are not all the time putting their feet on some one else's neck in order to get hold of another dollar. They are a happy people."

Y. M. C. A. IS DEFENDED

"One of the peculiar things about the war was the hysteria developed in the criticism of the Y. M. C. A. The Y. M. C. A. was all right and did very good work. About 80 per cent of the things said against it were not true, and about 40 per cent of the things said for it were not true. The general criticism of it just seems to be a nonsensical hysteria with about as much reason for carrying it as there is behind the fact for carrying on the League of Nations. I saw some soldiers sitting in a Y. M. C. A. hut one day, when they didn't have any place else to go, and they were just roasting the Y. M. C. A. for all they were worth. It was the same thing about high prices in France. When I got home I found prices more exorbitant than anyone ever dared to make them in France. That also got to be just a sort of hysteria."

STUDIED MOVE AGAINST LEAGUE

"That isn't like this talk against the League of Nations. That seems to be more or less of an organized propaganda, and the people who are doing most of the blowing against the league will probably be found to be the ones who know the least about it. It seems to me that there is an organized, studied move against it, and I cannot make out who is backing the move."

"I don't know whether or not France favors the league, any more than I know whether or not this country favors it. I asked lots of people in France, and they thought it was all right. I've asked lots of people in this country what they thought of it, but there seems to be no real crystallized opinion. I place about it. Personally, I favor it."

Four Troopships on Way With Soldiers

Washington, July 14.—(U. S. N. S.)—Four troopships, carrying 11,418 returning officers and men, sailed on July 9 from French ports for New York, the war department announced this afternoon. The ships are the cruisers South Dakota, with 1896 troops and due July 19; the Kaiserin Augusta Victoria, with 5635 due July 17; the Panama, with 2068 due July 19, and Dakotan, with 1681 due July 19.

Truck Driver Who Met With Accident Is Still Missing

Thomas May, truck driver for the Williamette Valley Transfer company, remains mysteriously out of sight of his employers and the police, although there seems to be no concerted effort on the part of either to find the missing man. May figured in an accident at Pulaski, south of Oregon City, early Friday morning, when a heavy truck he was driving rolled over a 10-foot embankment. He got out of the minor wreck, apparently in a dazed condition and had been seen since. A brother, Jack May of Salem, who sought his brother in Portland Friday afternoon, has not reported to relieve the interest of Portland police.

Manager Bishop declared today that May was not a competent driver but he knows of no cause other than that suggested by the disappearance. May's home is at Salem.

Skating Doughboys Fall in Love With Duchess Charlotte
"Royalty doesn't worry the doughboys of the United States," said Lieutenant "T. Slade," a Portland boy, this morning. "Over in Luxembourg last winter they went up and skated with Grand Duchess Charlotte, the ruler of that wonderful little country. They all fell in love with her. She is only 23, and quite handsome, with big dark eyes." Lieutenant Slade has just returned from Luxembourg where he was sent at the time of the signing of the armistice, to help administer the roads of the country. When the war broke out, he was a student in the University of Utah, but enlisted in the 51st engineers at Vancouver, Wash.

WASTE IN SPRUCE IS CHARGE MADE

Accusation Made That Government Paid \$650 Per M. for Stock; Other Waste.

Washington, July 14.—(U. P.)—Charges of waste and profiteering in the production of spruce from Pacific forests for army airplanes were ready for presentation to the house committee investigating war department expenditures by the Providence (R. I.) Journal today.

Affidavits were prepared purporting to show that under the government's cost-plus plan, the government paid \$650 a thousand feet for spruce which private concerns could buy for \$150 to \$175 a thousand.

Other charges prepared by the Journal were:

Hundreds of miles of two-inch plank road were built into isolated forests and never used.

Food supplies were carelessly thrown into a mud hole and stoves were left in the open and ruined.

Lumber interests influenced army officers by "wild parties."

Out of 21,000 feet of spruce delivered to a Massachusetts factory, inspectors passed only 400 feet.

Several camps were started with large numbers of men and then suddenly abandoned.

GOVERNMENT SELLS 36 MILLION FEET OF LOGS

The entire amount was sold Major Lenihan, head of the sales department, agreed to let the fir go at cedar classification prices.

Officers of the sales department of the Spruce division express themselves as being highly pleased at the prices for which the timber was sold. When war activities ceased negotiations were made by several coast interests for the entire quantity at prices ranging from \$10 to \$14 per thousand feet. The officials decided to withhold the sale and the results have proven advantageous to the government.

This sale included over half of the

entire timber available from the government. There is approximately 40,000,000 feet in various bodies of water in the Northwest, but part of this is sold and under contract.

BIG LOT AT WILLAPA

At Willapa harbor 14,500,000 feet of logs, of which 85 per cent is spruce, is yet to be sold. A portion of this is under contract to mills at South Bend, which have already purchased a large amount of the timber. The Spruce corporation expects little difficulty in selling the majority of the Willapa harbor stock to mills in that district.

About 10,000,000 feet of timber, 90 per cent spruce, is in Grays harbor near Aberdeen and Hoquiam. None of this is sold. There is no market for either this stock at present nor for about 47,000,000 feet of logs which are located at Yaquina bay. The Yaquina bay timber is about 85 per cent spruce.

Sale of lumber, engines, boilers and other marine equipment belonging to the Fir Production corporation is progressing satisfactorily according to J. S. Hamilton, who was recently appointed to handle sales of the corporation's property on the Pacific Coast. The property is valued at several million dollars and is located at shipyards in Oregon, Washington and California.

OFFER GOOD INDUCEMENT

All of the materials and equipment offered for sale is of the best quality and has never been used, states Mr. Hamilton, having been left in the yards after the cancellation of orders for wood and steel ships by the Emergency Fleet corporation.

C. O. Yokum, with headquarters at San Francisco, has charge of the division of sales and supplies of the Fir Production corporation, and Mr. Hamilton, with supervision over the sales department, has opened headquarters on the fifth floor of the Northwestern Bank building.

Low Speed Prevents Bad Accident When Car Truck Breaks

Breaking of a truck on one of the baggage cars of O. W. R. & N. train No. 13, caused derailment of the car at 6:30 o'clock Sunday morning 12 miles east of Pendleton, according to information received by Federal Manager J. P. O'Brien. Train No. 19 arrives in Portland from the east at 3:30 p. m.

Low speed at which the train was traveling allowed it to be brought under control before more cars were derailed.

The baggage car on which the truck broke was the first one ahead of the passenger coaches and the break occurred after the car had gone 50 feet west of a bridge. Ties and ballast were torn up but no other damage was mentioned.

EXCUSE OF UNIQUE SPEEDOMETER FAILS TO IMPRESS COURT

Altogether Too Complicated, Judge Dayton Opines, and C. L. Weaver Is Assessed \$10.

By strict adherence to a mathematical formula, C. L. Weaver avowed in District Judge Dayton's court this morning that he could accurately determine the speed of his machine from a reading of his unique speedometer.

His instrument, unlike most of its kind, did not, he said, record the true rate of travel owing to a peculiar adjustment. Mr. Weaver was charged by Traffic Officer Rexford with making 36 miles an hour on the Sandy road Sunday. The autist stated that at the time of his arrest his indicator needle pointed to the figure 20. With the aid of his formula, he explained, this represented a speed of 20 miles an hour.

Judge Dayton advised against such a complicated method of determining speed, especially on Sunday when the roads are crowded, and fined Mr. Weaver \$10.

A. E. Oglebee was fined \$50. Judge Dayton ordered a motorcycle belonging to H. Larson locked up as security for a \$25 fine. M. C. Mills, up for speeding the second time within the month, was fined \$40. His previous fine was \$15. C. Stephens paid \$30.

Their daughter, 6 years old, who was riding with them, was not injured. They were taken to the Good Samaritan hospital by the Ambulance Service company.

ANTI-PROHIBITION FIGHT IS STARTED

Amendment Repealing Wartime Measure Introduced in House by Rep. Igoe of Missouri.

Washington, July 14.—(U. P.)—Anti-prohibitionists began their fight to repeal wartime prohibition as soon as the house began consideration of

the prohibition enforcement bill today. Representative Igoe of Missouri introduced an amendment repealing the wartime act and eliminating all definitions of intoxicating liquor as a beverage that contains more than 3 1/2 per cent of alcohol.

Indications that President Wilson may soon take a hand in the prohibition enforcement question were seen today in a visit of Internal Revenue Commissioner Roper to the White House.

Roper favors the plan of a prohibition commissioner, but does not want enforcement to be part of the duties of his bureau.

Another prohibition development was a statement by Wayne Wheeler, general counsel for the Anti-Saloon league, that unless congress defines intoxicating liquor the enforcement code would be useless in making the eighteenth amendment effective.
