

BATTLESHIPS TO BE SENT TO RIVER

Admiral Rodman Promises to Dispatch 16,000-Ton Vessels to the Columbia.

Washington, July 16.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL.)—The situation concerning the Pacific fleet visit to the Columbia river has been fully covered over the last few days with Admiral Rodman and Secretary of the Navy Daniels. Admiral Rodman is still uncertain how many ships he will take north from San Francisco. A review by the president of the entire fleet at that point has been definitely fixed.

Admiral Rodman declines to take the dreadnaught type of battleship into the Columbia, but will send in at least one battleship of the Vermont type, 16,000 tons, probably two or three of the Rhode Island type, 12,000 tons; half a dozen cruisers and half a dozen destroyers. The cruisers and destroyers probably will be sent on up to Portland.

FLEET WILL SAIL FOR CANAL NEXT SATURDAY

Washington, July 16.—(U. S. S.)—The Pacific fleet, under command of Admiral Rodman, will sail for its destination next Saturday from Hampton Roads, Va., and after cruising down the east coast of the United States, through the Panama canal, thence along the west coast, and then a visit to the Hawaiian islands, will arrive at Bremerton, Wash., September 15. It was announced today by the president of the fleet in making public the fleet's schedule of the voyage. The fleet's base in the West will be at Puget sound.

Body of Clackamas Man Found in River

The badly decomposed body of a man, in whose clothes was found a government war service registration card bearing the name Ivar Masewood, Route 2, Oregon City, Clackamas county, was taken from the Willamette river this morning by Hugh Brady, city grapple, who saw the body floating between the Burnside and Morrison street bridges. The registration card was dated September 12, 1918, which would indicate that the man was over 31 years old. The man's clothes apparently had been of good texture. He wore a three-quarter overcoat. The body is at the morgue.

National Policemen Called Red Antidote

Los Angeles, July 15.—A federal police force to combat radical propaganda and to curb the activities of extremists, is advocated by Chief of Police John L. Butler, who has just returned from a conference of Pacific coast chiefs where plans were discussed for coping with the growing anarchistic menace in the West. The proposed police body should be free of politics, Butler said.

Fake Oil Promoter Will Go to Prison

Salt Lake, Utah, July 15.—John Francis Barratt, alias George W. Walker, and John J. Armstrong, alias C. P. Doherty, who maintained luxurious offices here and promoted an oil proposition, have been sentenced to three years' imprisonment at Fort Leavenworth, according to advices reaching here today.

Drunken Autoist Sentenced and Fined

Fred A. Pick was fined \$100 and sentenced to seven days in jail Tuesday afternoon on his plea of guilty to the charge of driving an automobile while intoxicated Monday night. Pick's delivery truck collided with an automobile driven by T. F. Anderson at Fifth and Couch streets. The arrest was made by Officers Scott and Norne.

Dr. Wheeler Retires

Berkeley, Cal., July 15.—(U. S. S.)—After having completed a service as head of the institution just three days less than 20 years, Dr. Benjamin Ide Wheeler today retired as president of the University of California. The affairs of the university will be governed by the committee of deans until a new president is named by the board of regents.

ENORMOUS STILL SEIZED BY SLEUTHS

Charged with engaging in and carrying on the business of a distiller, Sam Blach was taken into custody by federal officials late Tuesday night following a raid on his house near Eighty-second and Clover streets. He is charged with having a still in the basement of his house, with a capacity estimated at 50 gallons, and also a large quantity of beer and malt. The hearing of the case will be held Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock by United States Commissioner Drake.

According to the reports of the federal investigators, the still was in the basement of the house, and the entrance was through a trapdoor in the floor. A windlass lowered supplies to the basement. It is said that from appearances the still had been in operation several months. The liquor-making apparatus, officials said, is the most elaborate of the moon-shine outfits so far unearthed in this vicinity, a huge copper boiler, 6 feet tall, being the chief feature. A new still, apparently never used,

was seized by Deputy Sheriff George Hurlburt in the bushes back of the home of John Ukovich, 351 Amherst street, St. Johns, late Tuesday night and removed to the police station. Possession of the still is said not to be sufficient to warrant arrest.

The house is owned by L. G. Weidurich of Corvallis and carries no insurance. The fire marshal is conducting an investigation into the cause of the fire, not being satisfied with the cause assigned.

Medford Publisher Alibis His Town Out Of High Heat Record

"Medford may be hot, but it is not humid."

Thus explains George Putnam, who is here from the Rogue river metropolis, in attempting to alibi his home town for having been the hottest place in the United States on Monday.

"Everybody knows by this time," he continued, "that temperature alone is not the criterion of hot weather comfort or discomfort. As a matter of fact, it is cooler in Medford at 100 degrees than it is in Portland at 80. The difference is in the humidity."

"When reports get out about Medford being the hottest place, they should also say what the percentage of humidity is."

However, Mr. Putnam asserts that the 104 degree point is not often attained in Medford. It will not be great disadvantage to the Rogue river valley, though the growing fruits thrive better under cooler conditions.

Safeguards Needed In League, Declares Republican Leader

New York, July 16.—(U. S. S.)—Speaking of the League of Nations covenant and the attitude of the Republican party toward it, Will H. Hays, national chairman, declared in a statement issued here Tuesday night that:

"There must be effective reservations to safeguard the sovereignty of the United States in every particular; the pact must guarantee the Monroe doctrine beyond the shadow of a doubt; must either eliminate article 10 entirely or so modify it that congress shall be morally as well as legally free from a specified period to decide when, where and to what extent our soldiers shall be employed and must provide full right to withdraw from the league at any time, without hindrance or conditions of any kind."

Bandits Kill Deputy Cleveland, Ohio, July 15.—(U. S. S.)—Deputy Marshal Ernest Gray was killed and two other deputies were wounded in a battle this afternoon with alleged bandits wanted in connection with the attempted robbery Tuesday of an east end bank.

PLANT OF WOOD EWING IRON COMPANY RAZED BY SWEEPING FLAMES

Spreading Fire Partially Destroys Residence Located Next to Foundry.

A fire that is supposed to have started from hot slag, about 5:45 o'clock Tuesday night, destroyed the building and contents of the Wood Ewing iron works, 1371 Macadam road, and badly damaged an adjoining residence, causing a loss estimated at \$8000. The flames were well under way before the first fire company could reach the scene. The foundry building, which was very old, was constructed of wood and proved ready prey for the flames.

A house next door to the foundry, occupied by the J. G. Miller family, was also badly burned, damage being about \$1000. When neighbors realized that firemen could not prevent the house from burning they rushed in and succeeded in taking everything out of the house except the bath tub, a small oil stove and a bed.
