

BOARD OF CONTROL IS FRIGHTENED WHEN BONDS HELD ILLEGAL

But Assistant Attorney General Van Winkle Digs Up Old Act Which Had Been Overlooked.

Salem, July 17.—A timely discovery made by Assistant Attorney General I. H. Van Winkle at the time the lawmakers of Oregon were in session here last September saved the state considerable embarrassment in connection with the sale of \$800,000 worth of highway bonds under the Bean-Barrett act, Tuesday, it developed today.

The \$800,000 issue was sold to Henry Teal of Portland conditioned upon their approval by Teal's bonding attorneys in Boston. In reply to a request for an opinion on this matter the state board of control Wednesday received a message from the Boston attorneys to the effect that the \$10,000,000 bond bill passed by the recent legislature had completely nullified the Bean-Barrett act.

Consternation reigned in the camp of the state board of control, as including the issue just sold, there remained unused under this act \$1,400,000 worth of highway bonds. If the Bostonians were correct the state was without authority to issue any bonds for post road purposes and all prospect of federal aid in road construction in this state was gone until another legislature could meet and remedy the apparent defect.

Van Winkle admitted that the Bostonians were correct, in part, but cited a subsequent act of the same legislature which he had framed after discovering the defect, which corrected the defect. He assured the board that all was well so far as the authority for issuing the bonds was concerned.

INCORPORATION ARTICLES ARE FILED AT SALEM

Salem, July 17.—Articles of incorporation were filed with Corporation Commissioner Schulerman, Wednesday, by "Broadacres Farm" corporation, capitalized at \$75,000, with headquarters in Wasco, Sherman county. The incorporators are Elwood Stott, W. W. Banks and E. J. Brown.

Two lumber companies filing articles of incorporation Wednesday were: International Lumber company, of Portland; \$50,000; R. C. King Jr., J. C. Smith, George E. Towle and W. F. Honey. Warrenton Lumber company, Portland; \$50,000; W. D. Plus, John Patterson and V. L. Plus.

FEE OF \$40 A MONTH FOR SOLDIER DECIDED UPON
Salem, July 17.—In anticipation of the commitment of men from the United States army, navy and marine corps to the Oregon State hospital under the provisions of the federal war risk insurance act, a maintenance cost of \$40 per month has been agreed upon by the state board of control as a reasonable fee to be paid by the government in return for the care which the state will give to these men. One soldier has already been received at the state hospital under this act.

MILLION DOLLARS IN HIGHWAY BONDS OFFERED
Salem, July 17.—Another million dollars' worth of 4 1/2 per cent state highway bonds will be disposed of at the meeting of the state highway commission in Portland, August 5. These bonds will be in denominations of \$1000 each and will mature serially, \$25,000 October 1, 1924, and a like amount each April 1 and October 1 thereafter.

Gasoline Tax Check Received
Salem, July 17.—A check for \$1738.62 was received by the secretary of state's office Wednesday from the Shell company of California in payment of the state tax of one cent per gallon on 170,783 gallons of gasoline and one-half cent per gallon on 197 gallons of distillate sold in Oregon during June.

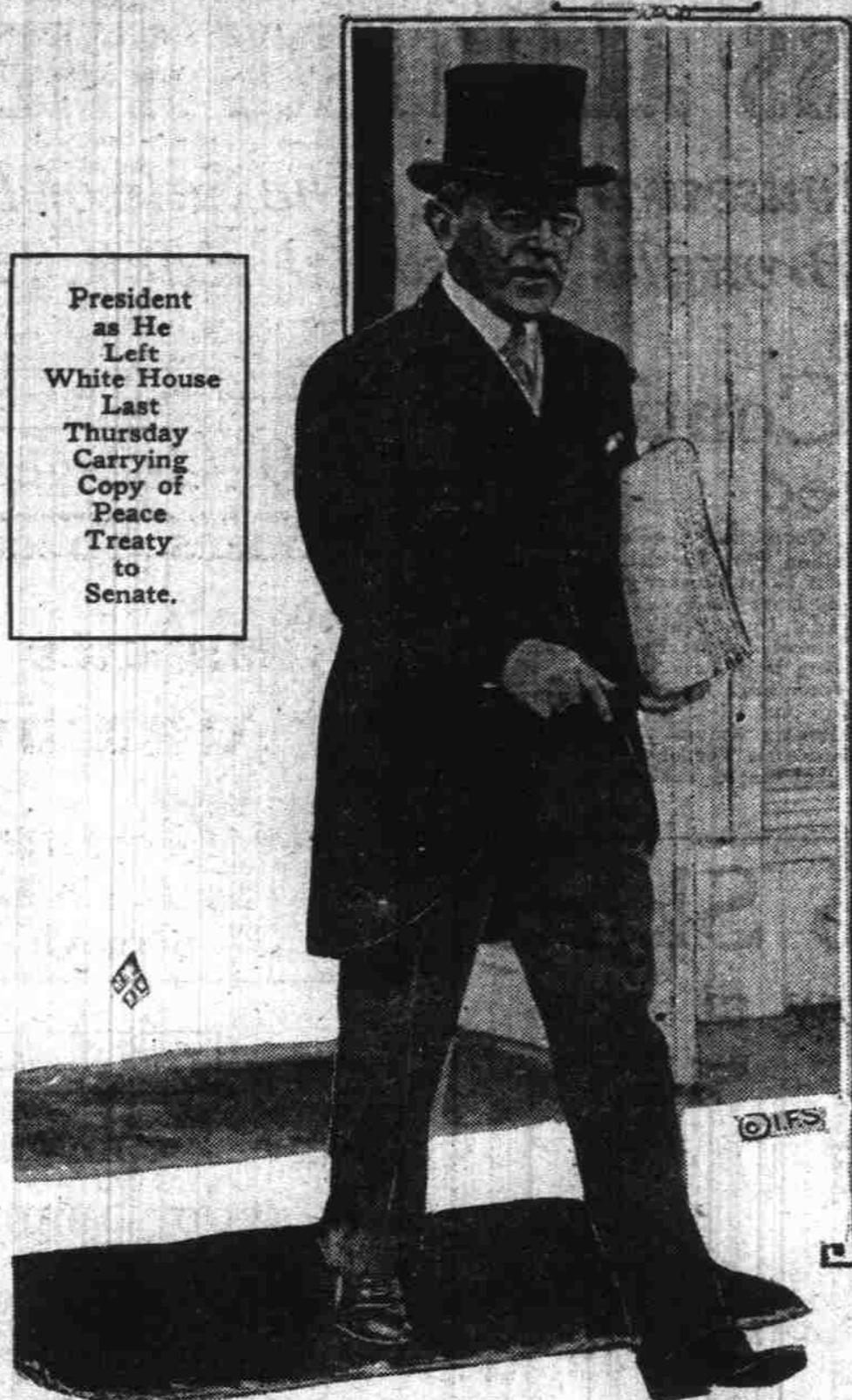
Rights to Be Adjudicated

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Wilson, Back in National Capital, Paralyzes Critics



President as He Left White House Last Thursday Carrying Copy of Peace Treaty to Senate.

Offer of President to Supply Senate With All Information on Peace Treaty and League Outwits Their Plans; Soldiers' Rehabilitation Bill Allows Men Little and He Vetoes It.

Washington, July 17.—There may be some Republican senators who regard President Wilson as a hopeless idealist but none of them who is a politician as well as a statesman any longer entertains that opinion, even though his view of the president's foreign policy remains unchanged. On the contrary the politician members of the senate on the Re-

publican side are greatly worried over the successful practical politics the president has played since his return from abroad. While they publicly deplore the idealism which leads him to thrust foreign complications on the United States primarily they are devoting a lot of thought and discussion to the best means of offsetting the political effect of three masterful moves they admit he has made since his homecoming. The first of these moves was the man-

ner in which he met the criticism that he had ignored the senate in the matter of the treaty. The constitution prescribes that treaties are to be made by the president by and with the consent of the senate. While the president was in Paris the charge was made that he was proceeding without the advice of the senate and in contempt of its expressed opinions.

There may have been justification for that charge and unquestionably the impression was growing in the country that in the peace negotiations the president was shaping the treaty according to his own views entirely regardless of the views of the senate. The Republicans were making now before the political with that charge. They expected to make a lot more. But the president blasted the hopes of further gains by his declaration in the address he made to the senate in presenting the peace treaty. He said:

"My services and all the information I possess will be at your disposal and at the disposal of your committee on foreign relations at any time, either formally or in session as you may prefer, and I hope that you will not hesitate to make use of them."

Since this cordial offer of cooperation, nothing further has been heard from the president's critics regarding his indisposition to consult with the senate. The only question now before the political house, so to speak, is how the president's offer can be refused without justification.

The second political move made by the president was when he vetoed the sundry civil bill because in its the Republicans had limited to \$4,000,000 the amount made available for the vocational rehabilitation of disabled soldiers.

The administration had advocated an appropriation of \$12,000,000 for rehabilitation purposes. The president in his veto focused the attention of the country to the fact that the Republicans were willing to do only half as much for the disabled soldiers as his administration thought ought to be done. The Republicans could not muster enough votes to pass the bill over the president's veto, and so the Democrats are now in position to make the claim to the soldier element that the additional \$8,000,000 appropriation to aid the disabled soldiers must be credited to Democratic determination. The president scored in the same way politically with his veto of the agricultural bill, because of the provision in that bill repealing the daylight saving law. There was tremendous sentiment against the repeal of that law in all of the big centers of population. The Republicans, having failed to pass the bill over the president's veto, the Democratic party claims credit for saving the law.

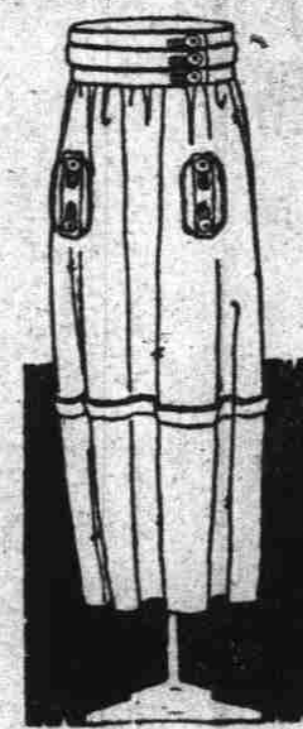
