

The administration had advocated an appropriation of \$12,000,000 for rehabilitation purposes. The president in his veto focussed the attention of the coun-try to the fact that the Republicans were willing to do only half as much for the disabled soldiers as his administration thought ought to be done.

The Republicans could not muster enough votes to pass the bill over the president's yeto, and so the Democrats are now in position to make the claim to the soldier element that the additional \$6,000,000 appropriation to aid the disabled soldiers must be credited to Democratic determination. The president scored in the same way politically with his veto of the agricultural bill.
