

EVEN PICTURE OF KEG PROHIBITED IN LIQUOR LAWS

Drastic Dry Measure Certain to
Pass House and Will Be, if
Possible, More Stringent.

ENFORCEMENT IS PREPARED

Care Taken to Keep Drug Stores
From Selling Strong Drink;
Prescriptions Are Limited.

Washington, July 19.—(U. P.)—The drastic prohibition enforcement laws suggested by the "dry" now seem certain to pass the house, practically without amendment, except possibly to make them more stringent.

Despite warnings from several prohibitionists that the laws will prove "oppressive, irritating and incapable of enforcement," the radical drys have maintained supreme control in the house all during the consideration of the bill, repeatedly voting down by safe majorities any attempt to modify it.

COMPLETE READING

By a session tonight, the house was expected to practically complete reading of the bill for amendment and so far it stands practically the same as it came from the committee. A final vote is not expected until next week.

Representative Igoe, Missouri, "wet," has prepared a new enforcement bill in three sections. In place of the present sections of the Volstead act, and will submit it to the house just before the final vote is taken. It carries no definition of intoxicating liquors. Drys today refused to admit manufacture of beer, light wines and other personal use, and spent hours trying to find loopholes in the provision allowing doctors to prescribe liquors.

EXAMINE PRESCRIPTIONS

To prevent drug stores from becoming saloons, an amendment by Miller of Washington was adopted, providing that physicians may not make liquor prescriptions in drug stores, nor have their offices in the stores. Examinations of persons with the view of prescribing liquor is prohibited in drug stores, and the limit a sick man can obtain is one-liquor prescription every 10 days.

The section of the bill prohibiting the advertising of liquor was passed without amendment. All electric signs and billboards advertising liquor must be torn down as soon as the bill is approved. Signs can no longer print the "picture of the brewer's distillery, bottle, keg, barrel or box or other articles represented as advertising liquor."

SAVE FOR SACRAMENT

Provision will be made, some dry leaders said, for safeguarding the use of sacramental wines. The present bill, Representative Igoe claims, will prohibit it.

"Uncle Joe" Cannon scored the drys in their efforts to stop the manufacture of home drinks that will not be intoxicating, but which have been considered harmless.

"You cannot enact a law that will keep a man, after he makes a barrel of cider, from putting it in his cellar, letting it 'harden,' and then drinking it," Cannon said.

Advocating strict limitations on flavoring extracts, Representative Tichenor, Kansas, told of men getting drunk on lemon extract. Wets claimed no flavoring extracts can be made without the use of alcohol.

35 SENATORS PLEDGE OPPOSITION TO LEAGUE

President Wilson is greatly pleased with his talks with Republican senators and believes his conference will bring up the situation. It was the first tangible evidence of claims made in several days by league opponents, that the anti-league were firmly united.

WOULD THROW TREATY AWAY

Opposition senators are convinced, they declared tonight, that the situation has undergone a change since senators have been seriously studying the official text of the treaty. Senator Moses, New Hampshire, a leading member of the opposition, said tonight:

"There is a growing feeling in the senate that the whole 'treaty' should be thrown out of the window. I am surprised to discover the increase in the belief that the wisest way to deal with the treaty is to throw the whole thing away."

There was every indication that the fight was entering a new phase, as one senator declared "any compromise that is arranged will be on our terms, and not on the president's."

Some Democratic senators, it was learned, have advised President Wilson to cancel or hold up for the time being his speech making trip. They have urged that he remain in Washington where he can more quickly meet the strategy of his opponents with effective counter measures.

SUPPORTERS STILL CONFIDENT

An air of confidence today continued to pervade pro-league circles. Administration senators believe that President Wilson is succeeding in impressing his Republican callers, particularly respecting Shantung. One of the president told some of the Republican senators with whom he talked that he fears a Japanese alliance with Germany if a reservation regarding Shantung is put into the treaty by the senate. At any rate, the president is reported to have said the United States would lose Japan's friendship for years to come. He also assured his callers, it was said, that the Japanese envoy made such definite commitments in the pres-

ence of the "big four" at the Paris conference, regarding the return of Shantung to China, that Japan is pledged beyond escape to a definite date for the return. These commitments, it was stated, were not put in writing simply because Japan said that would be humiliating, and that her word was enough.

League advocates today pointed out that the enabling act which congress must pass after the treaty is ratified, to provide for appointment of American representatives to the league, will offer an opportunity of reservations in the form of limitations upon the power of these representatives to act without congressional approval.

Next week is to see a veritable drum-fire of oratory by league supporters. Nine senators have announced speeches in favor of the league, beginning Monday with Senators Beckham, Kentucky, and Harrison, Mississippi. The foreign relations committee, said tonight he expects the treaty will be in committee until the second week in August at least.

The map accompanying the treaty, which are being printed in Paris, will not arrive until August 7, Moses said. Committee members have been hampered in tracing boundary lines by the lack of the map, he said.

The committee will resume its sessions Monday. There was no meeting today, a weekend recess having been taken at the request of Senator Hitchcock.

PRESIDENT SATISFIED WITH INTERVIEWS WITH SENATORS
Washington, July 19.—At the White House today it was officially announced that the president is entirely satisfied with his interviews with the seven Republican senators who have invited to the White House yesterday and Thursday. It was stated that the conferences have done a great deal to clear up misunderstandings as to the purposes of the league.

This view is not shared by opposition senators, who point to the fact that all but one of the seven senators told the president that he intended to support reservations to the treaty. The exception was Senator McNary of Oregon, who has been for the treaty and against reservations from the beginning.

CURTIS STANDS PAT
Senator Curtis of Kansas, the Republican whip, declared today, after a careful study of the situation, that not one vote has been changed by the president as a result of his conferences with the Republican senators. He further stated that word had been carried to the president that he might have a copy, if he cared to have it, of the list of the 35 senators, who will stand out to the last against ratification of the treaty unless reservations are made. The offer was not accepted.

A bill to create the machinery for the League of Nations has been prepared by administration officials and has been given to Senator Hitchcock for introduction. This bill provides that the American officials in the league shall be appointed by the president "by and with the advice and consent of the senate."

Opponents of the league assert that the purpose of presenting this bill is to attempt to shut off some of the opposition by showing that the senate is to have a voice in the selection of the American representatives of the league organization.

SHANTUNG CASE MUCH ALIVE
The Shantung case is very much alive in the senate, and it is likely to be the subject of more surprises. Senator Moses, discussing it today, said: "Does anyone think that private conversations with Baron Makino at Paris are going to hold against the written word in the treaty? Is there anything in the treaty which says that Japan must return Shantung in six months? Not a bit of it. The treaty language is that Germany renounces all her rights in favor of Japan, and it is well known that Germany was there to stay. Therefore, so far as the treaty is concerned, Japan may stay as long as she likes and nobody believes that she will not."

REPORT EXPECTED TO BE FAVORABLE ON SOLDIER BILL

Proposed Advancement to Set-
tlers Is Advanced; Legion to
Bring Influence on Measure.

SOLDIERS' HELP WELCOMED

Lukewarm Attitude of Republican
Leaders Somewhat Discour-
ages Friends; Many Opposed.

Washington, July 19.—(WASH-
INGTON BUREAU OF THE JOUR-
NAL).—The house public lands com-
mittee has finished consideration of
all but one section of the Lano-Mon-
dell soldier land settlement bill, and
a favorable report is expected to
place the bill on the house calendar
early the coming week.

Few substantial changes have been made in the committee. Proposed advanced loans to settlers for improvements are increased to \$1500 and loans for livestock to \$1200. The amendment to divide funds among states by the proportion in which they furnished soldiers, which would have concentrated benefits in the large eastern states, was voted down, but may be revived in the house with some danger of success.

The legislative committee of the American Legion has written to Chairman Sinnott its indorsement of the measure and word has been received that Lieutenant Colonel Theodore Roosevelt will be here next week to use his influence in its behalf. This help from the leaders of the returned soldiers is welcomed by friends of the bill, who have been somewhat discouraged by the lukewarm attitude of the Republican leaders.

Mondell of Wyoming, Republican floor leader and introducer of the bill, seems to be the only aggressive friend it has among the dominant leaders, several of whom promise to fight it at every step.

Nolan, Major General Squier, Brigadier General Reese, Brigadier General Burt, Brigadier General H. O. Smith, Major General Konny, Brigadier General Barrum and General Craig were reported on the ship.

Benedict Crowell, Assistant Secretary of War Sir George Parley, high commissioner of Canada, Dr. Thomas A. Le Breton, Argentine ambassador to Washington, and other notables were also on the transport.

REPUBLICAN LEADERS SAY THEY OBJECT TO FEDERAL RAILROADS

Senate Sub-Committee Is Fram-
ing Bill to Restore Con-
trol to Owners.

Washington, July 19.—(U. P.)—Congress is definitely set against government ownership of railroads, it appeared tonight.

Republican leaders in both houses, who have legislation in charge, announced themselves as against either federal control or government ownership. They are directing the shaping of legislation for return of the roads along this line, it was stated.

In the senate, a sub-committee is framing a bill which will provide for restoration of the roads to their owners. Although the form of the bill has not been worked out, its main features will include:

—Return of railroads to their owners.

—Extension of interstate commerce commission powers.

—Fixed guaranteed return to investors.

—Unification of competing roads as to terminals and service.

These principles, embodying the views of Senator Cummins, chairman of the committee, are being used as the guide in working out details. Some form of regional administration probably will be considered to coordinate the larger transportation systems. But this plan will not require merging of systems, it was stated. It will affect operation only.

Backing up the attitude of senate leaders is the announced policy of Chairman Edwards of the house committee, which has the railroad question under consideration.

Although the senate committee is in daily session, members do not expect to have a bill formulated before another month.

Captain Cabell Is In Portland After 'Service in France

Captain Henry Failing Cabell, son of Colonel and Mrs. Henry C. Cabell, arrived in Portland Saturday night after a visit of several weeks in the East following his return from France. Captain Cabell has recovered from the wound in the foot sustained while heading his company in an attack in the Meuse-Argonne on October 4.

Captain Cabell went to France as a first lieutenant in one of the companies of the 18th infantry, Eighteenth division.

When he was wounded he was in command of the company. He was taken to a hospital in the rear and remained there till after the armistice was signed, his wound, which was made by a machine gun bullet, becoming infected and causing some trouble. After leaving the hospital he rejoined his company for a short time and then was transferred to the Ninetieth division and was made an aide to Major General Charles H. Martin who is now in command of the local recruiting office. With this division Captain Cabell spent several months in Germany and travelled about some, visiting the headquarters of the French army of occupation at Mainz and the British at Cologne. Flood Warnings Sent to Farmers On Trinity River

Dallas, Tex., July 19.—Flood warnings were sent to farmers along the Trinity river bottoms north of Dallas tonight. The weather bureau predicted a rise of 25 feet here—30 feet above flood stage. Property damage on the upper reaches

of the Trinity already was reported at thousands of dollars. Fields were reported flooded. Ten inches of rain fell at Gainesville between 3 a. m. and noon. It was said, sending three small streams out of their banks. There was no reliable reports of property damage in the Gainesville district early tonight, but it was said damage to buildings and mills in the city will amount to many thousands of dollars.

Santa Fe and Kally passenger trains, stalled by the flood, were reported safe tonight. Damage to railroad property will be considerable, it was said.

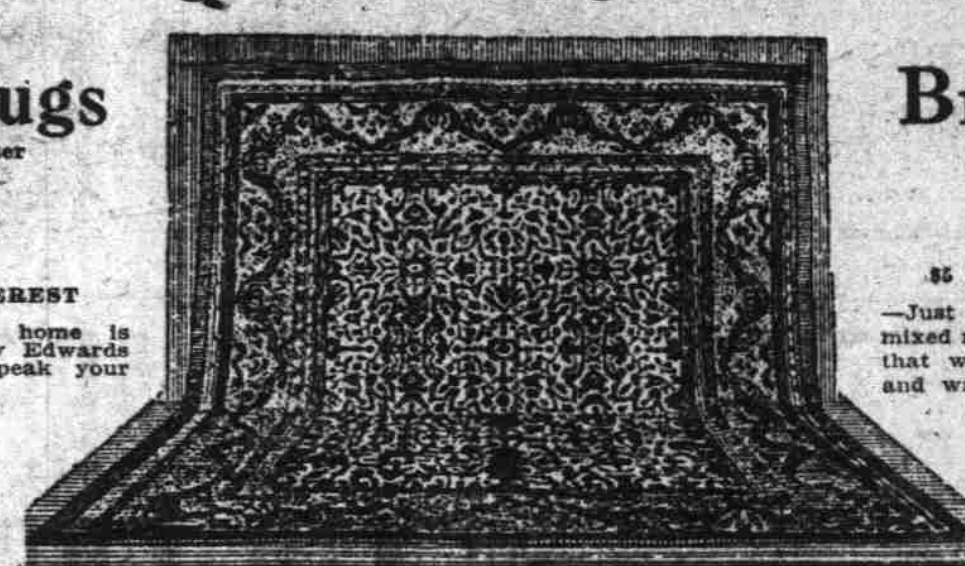

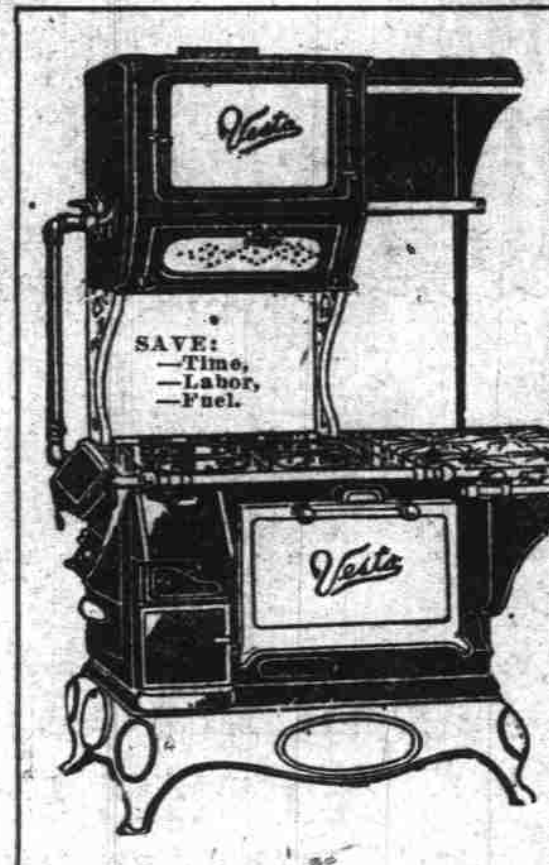
