

STATE CONVENTION OF ELKS ARRANGED AT KLAMATH FALLS

Plans Being Completed for Great Three Day Festivity; Big Delegations Coming.

Klamath Falls, July 21.—As the state Elks convention dates, August 14, 15 and 16, draw near the local lodge is making active preparation.

R. T. Smith, divisional passenger agent for the Southern Pacific company, has made arrangements for the side-tracking here of Pullmans. He said enough Elks from California will be here to make up a special train.

Half a dozen or more automobile loads of Elks from Susanville, Cal., are coming, besides five cars from Reno, Nev. The delegation from the baby lodge of Oregon, located at Bend, has wired to W. O. Smith, chairman of the committee on accommodations, asking for ground on which to erect a large tent, where the whole delegation may live together during the three days of festivities.

Besides the entertainment in Klamath Falls, a monster barbecue and open air high jinks on the shores of Upper Klamath lake, near Pelican Bay lodge, the summer home of the late E. H. Harriman, is planned.

Legion Branch Formed Klamath Falls, July 21.—Service men in Klamath county will receive a charter for a local branch of the American Legion as soon as the national organization acts upon the application of posts throughout Oregon, according to word received from E. J. Elvers, Oregon state chairman, with headquarters in Portland. Klamath county sent about 600 men to the service, most of whom are now in civil life again. They are anxious to form a branch of the Legion and made application some time ago.

Tourists From Many States Register at White Salmon Park

White Salmon, Wash., July 21.—About 700 persons have enjoyed the hospitality of White Salmon at the auto camping park in this city this season. Among the states represented on the camp register are Pennsylvania, New York, North Dakota, Oklahoma, Nebraska, Ohio, Kansas, Tennessee, Wyoming, Idaho and Montana, and every part of the states of Oregon, California and Washington.

The rest house, with its comfortable, cool porches, chairs, couches and current paper and magazines, has proved most welcome to travelers. The park covers three-fourths of an acre, is electrically lighted, provided with an abundance of fuel and water, benches, tables and cooking outfits. Many motorists have camped in the local grounds for a week or more, resting and enjoying the scenery.
