

TIMBERMEN SEEK TO STOP LOWERING OF LEVEL OF LAKE

Companies Interested in Industry About Upper Klamath Lake Ask Hearing From Government.

CONTRACT EFFECT FEARED

Telegram Says Applicants Believe Same Results Can Be Obtained Without Damage to Industries.

Klamath Falls, July 22.—Modification of the contract between the California-Oregon Power company and the government, by the terms of which the former threatens to reduce the water level of upper Klamath Lake, is asked in a telegram to Secretary of Interior Franklin K. Lane, sent by the timber interests, mill owners and others interested in timber or its manufacture in this section.

They seek a hearing before the contracts for diking land, for which bids have been asked, are signed, saying that they believe the same results could be secured without damage to industries about the lake or interfering with navigability of the lake.

It is pointed out that those signing the telegram have made heavy investments tributary to the lake, in mills, box factories and log canals, relying upon the natural condition of the lake.

MUCH TIMBER TRIBUTARY
Approximately 10,000,000,000 feet of standing timber is adjacent to the lake, the message states, and the logical place of assemblage and manufacture is the upper Klamath lake. This supply, it is pointed out, will provide raw material for more than 50 years of lumber operations.

"In fact, it is the largest remaining body of white pine in the United States," the telegram said. "The future development of this great industry and the entire large area of country tributary to the lake is vitally involved in this question. The sawmills already constructed have an output of approximately 200,000,000 feet annually. More than twice this amount will undoubtedly be manufactured in the near future, if present advantages of operation remain. The box factories annually manufacture approximately 100,000,000 feet of box shooks, the major portion of which is used to box fruit and farm products grown in Oregon, California and Colorado. These factories are largely dependent upon the lumber supply furnished them by the mills located on the lake. These combined industries at present maintain a pay roll of approximately \$200,000 per month.

FEDERAL LANDS AFFECTED
"The upper Klamath lake, which although shallow, has always been and is now used for navigation for passenger steamers and United States mail boats, freight and load towing boats. The lowering of the water three feet below average low water would make a large portion of the lake unnavigable for even the towing of logs and also destroy our log storage and render useless the canals which many of the operators have dug for their industries. The maintenance of the navigability of the lake is essential for the advantageous sale of a great quantity of timber owned by the United States government and also a great body of timber lands of the Klamath Indian reservation."

Elijah Coalman, the veteran mountaineer and host at the forest service lookout cabin on the summit, won the immediate affection of the assemblage by serving them hot soup. An excellent view was obtained of the distant snow peaks, but the lower valleys were hazy, because of the numerous forest fires.

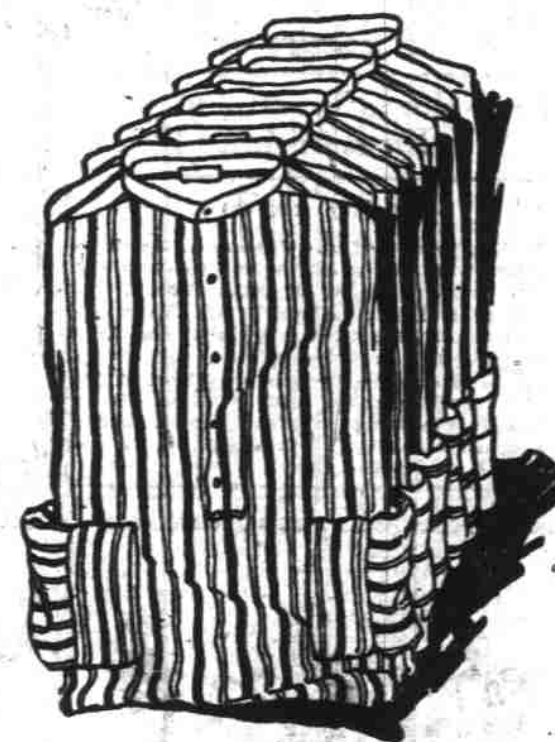
