

WAY CLEARED FOR SUITS TO RECOVER HYDE-BENSON LAND

Secretary of Interior Sustains Revocation of Letters of Approval Involving Two Tracts.

ACTION WILL SERVE AS GUIDE

Attorney General Brown Asserts Ultimate Recovery of 15,000 Acres Is Now Made Possible.

Salem, July 22.—After three years of delay the secretary of the interior has at last sustained the action of the commissioner of the general land office in revoking the letters of approval issued by the government in the instance of two tracts of land involved in the famous Hyde-Benson land fraud case. This information, which came to Attorney General Brown, Monday, is said by Brown to open the way to the ultimate recovery of these lands by the state of Oregon and will serve as a guide in the recovery of approximately 15,000 acres of Hyde-Benson land by the state.

One of the tracts in question is in the Roseburg land district. The other is in Clackamas county. Both are 320 acre tracts.

The letters of approval, whereby the federal government sanctioned the trade of Oregon school lands for federal lands, were revoked by the commissioner of the land office on application of Attorney General Brown, some three years ago. The Western Lumber company of Montana, transferees of F. A. Hyde, appealed the revocation order to the secretary of the interior, who has sustained the action of the commissioner.

The state will institute suits to recover these tracts, Attorney General Brown stated.

"LUMP SUM" SETTLEMENT LAW IS APPLICABLE IN OLD CASES

Salem, July 22.—The "lump sum" settlement law, enacted by the recent legislature, applies to workmen injured before the law became effective on May 29, but who are still drawing compensation from the state industrial accident commission, as well as to workmen injured since the enactment of the law, according to an opinion prepared by Attorney General Brown at the request of the commission.

This law, which is designed with a view to enabling injured workmen or their beneficiaries to engage in business in order that they may become self-supporting, permits the accident commission to make a lump sum payment to the amount of one-half the present value of the monthly installments. The remainder of the compensation is to continue in monthly installments, reduced, however, in proportion to the amount of the lump sum settlement. The commission resolves many hardships from workmen who are incapacitated, because of injury, from engaging in their former occupations, but who could, with some financial assistance, engage in certain lines of business.

TWO IRRIGATION DISTRICTS ASK CERTIFICATION OF BONDS

Salem, July 22.—The state irrigation securities commission has been asked to certify an issue of \$45,000 worth of bonds of the Talent irrigation district in Jackson county. This money is to be used on new work in the project. Bonds to the amount of \$175,000 have already been approved for this district, which embraces 8000 acres.

The Squaw creek irrigation district in Deschutes county has applied for the certification of \$15,000 worth of bonds on new work on its project. This district, which covers approximately 8000 acres, has already issued \$28,000 in bonds.

ATTORNEY GENERAL HOLDS COMPROMISES ARE LEGAL

Salem, July 22.—The state industrial accident commission may, at its discretion, compromise with employers who are delinquent in their contribution to the workmen's compensation fund, in an effort to bring their payments up to date, according to an opinion prepared by Attorney General Brown.

"Where there is a dispute in good faith as to whether or not under the facts of the case contribution is due for a certain period or whether interest or penalty has accrued, it would be a legitimate act of administration for the commission to compromise the case rather than become involved in expensive and protracted litigation," says the opinions.

BOARD OF CONCILIATION IS FINDING SERVICES NEEDED

Salem, July 22.—The recently created board of conciliation is finding its good offices in great demand, according to W. F. Woodward, chairman of the board, in a letter to Governor Olcott.

Aside from its efforts towards a settlement of the telephone strike, the board has been asked to assist in reconciling the controversy between the grain handlers and longshoremen and their employers, and to officiate at a hearing of the dispute between engineers and truck men and paving contractors, Mr. Woodward states.

USE OF FOREST ROAD FUNDS FOR PARK HIGHWAYS OPPOSED

Salem, July 22.—That Oregon delegation in congress is urged, in a letter sent out Monday by Governor Olcott, to oppose the move, fostered by Senator Smoot of Utah, to transfer \$1,000,000 of the \$9,000,000 fund for national forest roads from the secretary of agriculture to the secretary of the interior for use on roads in national parks. Such a move, the governor points out, would greatly reduce Oregon's proportion of the appropriation and would seriously interfere with forest road projects in this state.

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OLCOTT THANKED FOR HELP IN GAINING ARMY RECRUITS

Salem, July 22.—Newton D. Baker, secretary of war, in a letter to Governor Olcott, thanks the Oregon executive for his recent proclamation calling attention to the benefits to be derived from service in the army and appealing for recruits.

"Such proclamations as yours, calling attention to the educational advantages of the army, as well as the physical benefits and opportunities for learning a profession or trade, cannot fail to bring about the desired results," the letter states.

Aircraft Concern Formed

Salem, July 22.—The Medford Aircraft association, capitalized at \$5000, filed articles of incorporation with the corporation with Commissioner Schulerman, Monday. The incorporators are: F. P. Farrell, Seelye Hall and Floyd Hart, all of Medford. The Northwestern Transportation company of Portland capitalized at \$25,000, also filed articles of incorporation. The incorporators are: L. LeFelle, M. Watson and C. D. Kellogg.

Salt Clouds for Rain

Salem, July 22.—A fleet of state-owned aerial salt shakers is suggested by J. J. Boyce of Portland in a letter to Governor Olcott as a means of providing rain to end forest fires. He would drop salt in the clouds, believing the condensing properties of the salt would cause the rain.

"Love Stuff" Is Protested

Salem, July 22.—Mashing and spooning joyriders who use the Capitol highway, had better beware. Mrs. Ned Burke of Multnomah has appealed to Governor Olcott to put a stop to the "disgraceful action." The governor has taken the appeal under advisement.

Drs. Ben L. Norden and Louis J. Wolf Resume Practice

Two Portland doctors who entered the naval service the day a state of war was declared between the United States and Germany, and who are both former public officials, have returned to private practice. One of them is Lieutenant Ben L. Norden, U. S. N., and the other is Lieutenant Louis J. Wolf, U. S. N., who with Carl Proudfoot, D. D. S., have opened offices in the Medical building.

Dr. Norden is former coroner of Multnomah county. During the war he served in the transport service and in South America.

Dr. Wolf, former chief medical inspector of Portland, and at the outbreak of hostilities acting city health official, was in the transport and cruiser service in American and European waters and later surgeon in the Puget Sound naval hospital at Bremerton. While medical inspector Dr. Wolf's chief duty was inspection and examination of school children.
