

OREGON COOPERATIVE ASSOCIATION BACKED AT GRANGE MEETING

Indorsement Through Resolution Is Made by Committees, Urging Support.

The new Oregon Growers' Cooperative association received an effective boost Tuesday when the executive and co-operative committees of the Oregon State Grange, at a joint meeting held in Portland, passed a resolution indorsing the Oregon Growers' Co-operative association and urging its support by every member of the Oregon State Grange.

The resolution reads: "We, the members of the executive and co-operative committees of the Oregon State Grange, heartily indorse the aims and purposes of the Oregon Growers' Cooperative association and urge every member of the Oregon State Grange to give the Oregon Growers' Co-operative association his or her support."

The members of the executive committee are C. E. Spencer, master of the state grange; B. G. Leedy and C. L. Shaw; the members of the co-operative committee are M. M. Burns, chairman, C. H. Bally and John D. Collier.

Representatives of several co-operative organizations at present operating in Oregon were invited to appear before the joint committee to suggest methods whereby the state grange could co-operate with active organizations or organize a marketing association limited to members of the state grange.

CAREFUL PERUSAL
The action of the committee in indorsing the association was taken only after careful perusal of the by-laws of the new organization, an examination into the board of directors and the proposed method of handling the fruit through the new association.

R. C. Paulsen of Salem, gave the members of the committee full information regarding the new association, which he said, proposes to market a large percentage of the state's fruit crop in every market in the country under an Oregon brand and label.

WARNING ON CONTRACTS
Mr. Spencer issued a warning to growers not to be too eager to sign contracts at specified prices for a fixed term of years until he had first served full information from an accredited representative of the Oregon Growers' association and further that if he did sign any such contract to be sure that every stipulation made appeared on the face of the contract.

Statistics on Troops In Russia Given Out

Washington, July 23.—American troops at Archangel, Russia, totaled on July 1, and those at Vladivostok, Siberia, aggregated \$477 on July 15, the war department announced this afternoon. Among the troops in Archangel there was a total of 189 deaths from August 30, 1918, to June 23, 1919, of which number 30 were killed in action, 28 died of wounds and 11 from disease and other causes. In Siberia there was a total of 110 deaths from August 13, 1918, to July 8, 1919. Of these 23 were killed in action, 27 died of wounds, while 59 died of disease and other causes.

Insurance to Cover Cyclops Crew Asked

Washington, July 23.—An amendment to the war risk insurance law to provide relief for dependents of those who were lost on the collier U. S. S. Cyclops, was introduced in the senate Tuesday afternoon by Senator Harding of Ohio.

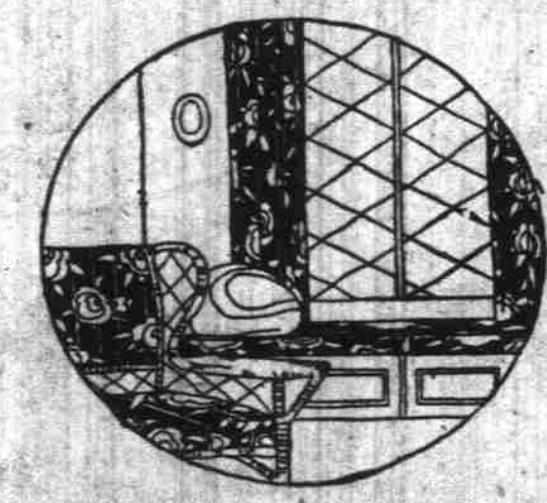

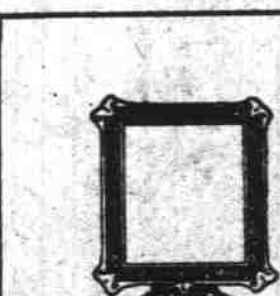

—Step 5—Add boiling water (salt for vegetables, syrup for fruits). —Step 6—Screw on cover with thumb and finger—not too tight. —Step 7—Cook per receipt, using wire rack. —Step 8—Remove when finished and not upside down.
