

SMITH WOULD LEASE MILL AT MARSHFIELD FROM ITS RECEIVERS

Hearing Is Slated for Portland
July 28 to Decide Whether
It Can Be Leased.

Marshfield, July 25.—It is reported that C. A. Smith has made application to lease the mill of the C. A. Smith company, now in the hands of receivers.

Hearing in the federal court at Portland has been set for July 28, when it will be decided whether the plant can be leased.

The receivers are now operating the East side mill of the company, and some of the camps of the Smith-Powers Logging company are operating. If the plant is leased by Smith the whole property would be operated, giving employment to hundreds of men. The Smith-Powers company is now short of men in the logging camps.

Manslaughter Trial Begins
Marshfield, July 25.—The trial of L. M. Myers of Arago, charged with involuntary manslaughter, has been started in the circuit court at Coquille before Judge Coke. It is alleged that Myers was intoxicated while driving a car which went over a grade and which caused the death of one of the occupants, Mrs. Sophia Barkdoll.

County Wages Raised
Marshfield, July 25.—The county court of Coos county has raised the wages of men and teams employed on county work to a minimum of \$4.50 for men and \$8 for teams. Patrolmen are to be paid \$5 a day.

Automobile Hits Woman and Breaks Both of Her Legs

Mrs. Sarah Amundson, who lives near Sixty-seventh street and Thirtieth avenue, suffered fractures of both legs early last night, when she was hit by an automobile of which J. J. Hershberger, Hubbard, Or., was driver, at Sixty-seventh and Division streets.

She was taken to St. Vincent's hospital.

Hershberger, according to the report of Motorcycle Officers Norrane and Scott, locked his brakes when he saw the danger of striking Mrs. Amundson, and the car skidded 90 feet, leaving a double trail of burnt rubber on the pavement.

Reduction of Fruit Juice Tax Favored

Washington, July 25.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL.)—Republican members of the ways and means committee Wednesday agreed to favorably report the Hawley bill to fix a tax of 2 cents a gallon on loganberry, apple and grape juice, in place of the present 10 per cent tax on sales, which amounts to 20 cents a gallon. Representative Hawley believes a majority of the Democrats on the committee also will support the bill and hopes it will be passed before the August recess begins.

Fund Given Widow Of Electrocuted Man

Klamath Falls, July 25.—A fund of \$185.50 has been subscribed by the Ewauna Box company and its employees for Mrs. W. L. Strickland, widow of William Strickland, who was electrocuted Friday. Mrs. Strickland was employed at the box factory at the time of the death of her husband. In addition, \$80 was given by local business men. Mrs. Strickland has gone to Sacramento to relatives.

Power Company Held Negligent in Verdict

Astoria, July 25.—A coroner's jury returned a verdict after an inquest on the death of Alfred Selms, who was killed by a streetcar owned and operated by the Pacific Power & Light company, exonerating A. L. Street, motorman, but blaming the power company, holding it did not keep its cars in proper repair. The verdict criticized the city for lack of lights at crossings.

Sawmill at Airlie Destroyed by Fire

Airlie, July 25.—The Davis & Webber sawmill, two miles south of Airlie, was burned down early Wednesday morning. The origin of the fire is unknown, but it is supposed it was caused by lightning during the storm. The loss was about \$10,000 on the mill, aside from the lumber. There was no insurance.

Peace Celebration Brings Damage Suit

Twin Falls, Idaho, July 25.—Suit for \$10,000 has been brought against the city of Twin Falls by relatives of Mrs. Dell Wright, who was killed by an automobile in Main avenue during the first armistice celebration last November.
