REPUBLICANS **BUNGLING OF PLAN**

Mistake Seen in Robbing Democrat of Credit of Suggesting Pershing Reception.

FUMBLE SOLDIERS' MEASURE

Another Example of Misleadership That Rank and File Provoked at Is Appropriation Bill.

Washington. July 26.—(WASHING-TON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL.)—Some Republican members of the house are disgruntled over what they declare the blundering of their leaders, the latest instance being the manipulation of plans for a congressional welcome to General Pershing into a party measure. Representative Caldwell of New York, who has been a student of military affairs and won distinction during the war period by informing addresses of military questions, has disclosed that he went to Speaker Gillett and asked if the speaker would recognize him to ask unanimous consent for passage of a resolution for a joint session of congress in General Pershing's honor.

The house does everything by program, and preliminary arrangement with the speaker is necessary before a member can secure recognition for a motion of this sort.

"The speaker told me he would be giad to do so." said Mr. Caldwell. "but as I am a Democrat, he thought it better to refer the matter to the Republican steering committee before deciding what should be done. The next day I asked him if he had referred it, and he said he had not, but was glad I had called it to his attention. The following day he informed me he had taken it up with the steering committee, but it had been decided to have the matter passed on by the rules committee."

By this means the Republican organization will be able to "point with pride" to having decided to welcome Pershing. Mutterings are heard, however, from Republican members who believe the speaker and the whole putfit of leaders made a mistake, and that the suggestion should have been accepted as it came without a lot of committee foolery, even though it was first proposed by a Democratic resemble. Another example of misleadership, in the estimation of many, was the manner in which the Republicans fumbled the appropriation for rehabilitation of disabled soldiers, sailors and marines, Under the plea of economy this appro-priation was fixed at \$6,000,000, which resulted in the veto of the sundry civil

resulted in the veto of the sundry civil bill by the president.

The president asserted that at least \$5,000,000 is needed for this work, declaring it a matter of grave concern that when men are coming in increased numbers to receive the benefits of this act, vocational education should be re-stricted by insufficient funds. Chairman

stricted by insufficient funds. Chairman Good of the appropriations committee wanted to pass the bill over again with \$6,500,000, but was finally overridden and \$8,000,000 inserted.

Thus, while the Republican leaders have talked of their resolve to aid the returning soldiers, the intervention of the president was necessary to uphoid the appropriation for vocational training, and the house, with its big Republican majority, voted to discontinue support for the federal employment service, which has done so much to help soldiers to secure jobs. This service was continued only after Henators ice was continued only after Senators Robinson of Arkansas and Ashurst of Arizona, Democrats, assisted by Pro-gressive-Republican senators, made s

sharp issue in the senators, made a sharp issue in the senate.

Now some of the leading Republicans are preparing to fight the soldier settlement bill. Every few days a statement in opposition comes from Senator Harding, Senator Wadsworth, or some other majority leader. There is still plenty of talk of aiding the soldiers, but practical measures seem to have hard sledtical measures seem to have hard sled-ding under existing auspices.
