

SOLDIER BONUSES SOUGHT BY BAER

Reintroduces Bill to Allow Boys Year's Pay; Points to Dakota \$25 a Month Provision.

Washington, July 28.—Representative Baer of North Dakota has reintroduced his bill providing for a bonus of a year's pay for every man that served in the war.

The Baer bill provides that the revenue to meet this expense be raised by sur-taxes on incomes of \$25,000 annually. He estimates that \$2,400,000,000 will be required to pay the proposed bonuses.

Baer said Sunday that he will ask a hearing on his bill soon after the recess of the house.

"There are a number of similar bills pending," Baer said, "and I will support any one the military committee decides to report out."

"North Dakota has passed a compensation act which gives to each soldier, sailor and marine who went to the war from that state \$25 for each month served, provided the money is invested in a farm, home or education. "Taken together with the new home-building act, which gives the laboring man and returned soldier an opportunity to build a home or buy a farm on a payment of one fifth down, it makes available a real opportunity to the working people and war veterans to become home owners. "I think that is the best way to make loyal American citizens."

He Cannot Harvest His Wheat Without Trespassing Farm

Moscow, Idaho, July 28.—The producer of a good crop of wheat, but unable to harvest it, with wheat worth \$2 per bushel, K. C. Qualey, pioneer farmer who has lived in Latah county 40 years, appealed to the prosecuting attorney and the county commissioners, then the highway commissioners in vain. He is in consultation with a well known firm of attorneys.

Qualey says that he has owned 80 acres of land 17 years. Nine years ago he bought an additional 40 acres which corner with his original 80 acres. He says he asked permission of the man whose land adjoins him to make an opening and put in a gate so that he could get into his 40-acre field. This, he says, was granted, and for nine years he has been doing this. He planted wheat this year, and it is now "dead" ripe, to use his own words, but the neighbor has fastened up the gate and forbids him to go through the fence to his grain.

"The only way I can cut the grain is by crawling under the fence and cutting it with a scythe, but I cannot haul it out or get a threshing machine in there to save it," said Qualey.

Binders Find Ready Sale at Kelso; Car Of Them Purchased

Kelso, Wash., July 28.—The rapid development of the farming community around Kelso was evidenced last week by the purchase by J. S. Robb, local farm implement dealer, of a carload of binders and two additional binders, which were not shipped in the carload.

Eight binders were sold by Robb last week. Seven foot machines were delivered to Al. Gray, William Lahti, John Gunnary and Arthur Gunnary, and six foot machines to the Kelso Farm company of La Du, G. J. Poykiv, John Michelson and Jacob Rietala. All these farmers live in the diking districts.

Robb also delivered a 10-18 tractor to William Lahti last week.

LARGE WHEAT YIELD ABOUT PASCO FILLS VOID OF LAST YEAR

Farmers to Recover From Setback of Crop Failure Through Monster Harvest.

Pasco, Wash., July 28.—Several million dollars of wheat funds will be handled in Franklin county this season, according to the reports of wheat growers.

In the Connell district alone, which is the center of the wheat growing portion of the county, it is expected that more than \$2,000,000 will be handled. Fall wheat is averaging about 20 bushels an acre and spring wheat 16 bushels.

Wheat growers may recover losses sustained in last year's crop failure, and has surplus upon which to start next season.

Other sections of the county also report very satisfactory yields. The average to the acre being scarcely less than in the Connell section. Near Kahlotus some of the ranchers report even higher yields, a few fields returning 40 bushels an acre.

Alfalfa is proving profitable in the immediate vicinity of Pasco. The alfalfa acreage is greater this year than ever before, and with the assurance of an abundance of water for next season many farmers are planning to seed more ground to this crop.

The fruit crop this year has been very satisfactory. Berries and small fruits have brought the growers fancy prices. Red raspberries are now selling at \$4.50 a crate and blackcaps at \$5 a crate on the local market. Apricots are bringing seven cents a pound, although very plentiful.

There will be an abundance of peaches, and this fruit will probably be the cheapest for canning purposes that can be secured. Many growers are making a specialty of canteloupes, and this crop promises to be abundant.

Woman's Division of Employment Bureau Cared for Thousands

Submitting her annual report to the department of labor, Mrs. Bruce Scott, superintendent of the woman's division of the federal employment bureau in Portland, states that since July 1, 1918, a total of 19,083 employees and employers have been cared for at her office. A total of 8516 women have been placed in permanent positions by the office, and about three fourths of this number have been placed since Mrs. Scott became superintendent on January 1, 1919.

There have been until the recent cut caused by lack of funds, three women serving in the women's division here who have handled this large number of applicants. Mrs. Scott reports that less than one person in 25 sent to a job by her office has been refused employment. The office is now trying to maintain its standard in spite of the cut in the funds allowed for operation. The rooms in the Lewis building will be kept, however, so that women will have no hesitancy about going to the office for help. For a time it was planned to consolidate the office with the men's division at Third and Oak, but it was felt that women would not be as ready to apply if they had to mingle with a great number of men in order to secure a position. The office now has on hand numerous calls for cooks in positions in which the pay is said to be very good. There are many calls for women for factory positions, and more women are needed for picking crops.

Service Held for Accident Victim In White Salmon

White Salmon, Wash., July 28.—Funeral services for Fred Pinn, who died in Portland Thursday as the result of injuries caused when he came in contact with a high voltage power wire Wednesday at the Northwestern electric plant, were held Friday in White Salmon. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Pinn of White Salmon, and was also survived by wife and sister, Mrs. A. C. Kesteven. All stores of the city were closed during the services. While Pinn, who was 25 years old, was serving as first electrician on a federal ship he was selected for training at Annapolis.

THREE NEW FACULTY MEMBERS SELECTED BY DEAN LANDSBURY

University School of Music Heads Announced Following Trip Through the East.

University of Oregon, Eugene, July 28.—The selection of three new members of the faculty of the university school of music has been announced by Dean John J. Landsbury, who has just returned from an extended trip through the east in search of talent.

To take the place of Robert Louis Barron, head of the violin department, who has been transferred to the university school of music in Portland, Rex Underwood of Chicago, who has had seven years of study and concert work abroad, has been contracted.

Albert Sukken of Chicago, specialist in glee clubs, choral work and opera coaching, will head the vocal department.

Ross Hickernell of Warren, Ohio, a widely known cornetist and band leader, will succeed Albert Perfect as director of the university band. Mr. Perfect will specialize in instruction in wind instruments. Mr. Hickernell was manager of the Innes concert band and has been soloist in many famous bands in the country.

No one has been selected to fill the place of John Stark Evans, who will spend next year studying in New York. Mr. Evans will return the following year.

GENERAL PERSHING WILL BE HONORED

Congress to Present Sword and Thanks to U. S. Commander Upon Return From Europe.

Washington, July 28.—General Pershing will be presented with a sword and the thanks of congress upon his return from France. This plan has been tentatively decided upon by Republican leaders in the house as a result of the controversy precipitated by the resolution of Representative Caldwell (D., N. Y.), providing for a joint session of the senate and house to welcome the commander-in-chief of the American expeditionary forces.

Announcement of the plan to present General Pershing with a sword and the thanks of congress was made tonight by Representative Royal C. Johnson of

South Dakota, who was designated by the rules committee to confer with officials of the war department with regard to their plans for welcoming the general.

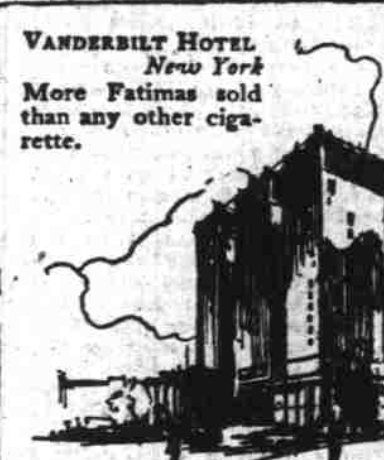
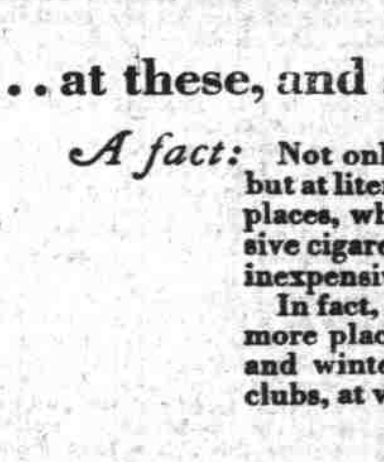
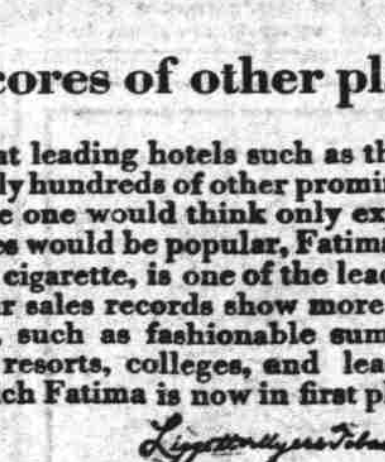
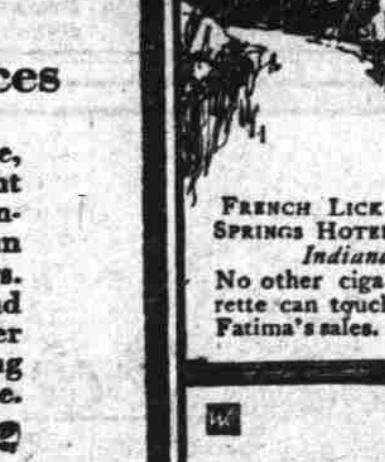
