Christmas Ship for Roumanians—According to Samuel Hill, who has just returned from Europe, the ship "Christmas" of Seattle is soon to be named honorary consul general for the Pacific coast for Roumanians. Mr. Hill also said that five special Roumanian commissioners now in Washington, D. C., would soon pay a visit to the Northwest and that shortly after the visit a movement would be launched to send a "Christmas" ship to the Balkan country.

Officers Transferred—Captain Eldridge G. Watkins has been ordered to proceed from Seattle, Wash., to Vancouver, B. C., to take up his duties for duty in connection with the disposal of surplus property and the promotion of boxing programs at the two posts. Chaplain William W. Meredith has been ordered to Portland on temporary duty in connection with the employment of discharged soldiers.

Steamers to Load for Europe—The steel steamers West Isata, Aska-Wake, Yakokol and the Colorado Springs have been assigned by the shipping board to load flour cargoes at Portland and Seattle for Europe. The Pacific Steamship company will act as operator and manager for the Aska-Wake and Yakokol. W. R. Grace & Co. for the West Isata and Struthers & Dixon for the Colorado Springs.

The Labor Situation—The latest estimates of labor shortage, according to the local office of the United States employment service, is placed at 1000 men for logging camps and lumber yards. The local situation is satisfactory so far as supply and demand are concerned, the shortage coming from outside districts. Demand for farm help is about equal to the supply.

Was on the Tuscumia
To be startled by a tremendous explosion while eating supper, to run to the deck, to jump overboard, to be blown and have a 200-pound man fall on top of him, knocking him into the boat sooner than he expected and then before he had recovered his breath from the fall to have the boat capsized and find himself immersed in the icy waters of the Atlantic ocean, was the experience that befell Freeman Chilton, clerk at the Seward, when the steamer was blown up. Chilton was only five minutes in the lifeboat before it upset and for five hours he swam for his life in the biggest swimming tank in which he had ever attempted aquatic sports, being finally picked up by a sub chaser and landed off the north coast of Ireland. For two months Chilton was in a hospital fighting pneumonia as a result of his long swim and after his recovery he was sent on to France with the 20th forestry engineers to furnish lumber for the use of the armies. He later became ill from the effects of his long swim and was sent home in a convalescent. Nothing too good can be said for the Red Cross, declares Chilton, who from his hospital experience, feels that he knows. Chilton began work at his old job behind the desk at the Seward this morning.

Canal to Be Built
Guy Byrkit of Joseph is in the city arranging for the purchase and shipment of machinery for the construction of a canal leading from the Wallowa lake to the irrigated district adjacent to the towns of Joseph and Enterprise. The plan also calls for a dredger with the Col. Henry Byrkit of the lower end of Wallowa lake in order that a greater storage capacity may be had. The present arrangement is such that though there are millions of gallons of water in Wallowa lake, the supply available for the present canal system is limited, and during a dry season like the present hundreds of acres of otherwise fertile land becomes unproductive. The plan will remedy this condition, he says. Cars are now being loaded with the machinery and actual construction work will begin at once.

It is proposed to transport apples direct from orchard packing houses to Portland fruit stands by motor trucks over the Columbia river highway. Vancouver Ship Reaches England—Word is received at Vancouver from Stephen Smith, captain of the Butte, that the Vancouver built vessel which sailed early in June, stating that it had arrived in England. The ship is expected to arrive in time to celebrate the Fourth of July, and from there sailed directly to Hull, England. The vessel carried a cargo of ties from the DuBois Lumber company.

Water Transportation Planned—Article of opinion have been filed with the Northwest Transportation company of Portland. The capital stock has been fixed at \$50,000 and the incorporators are L. E. McFarlane, M. W. Kellogg, and C. D. Kellogg. It is the purpose of the corporation to conduct a general water transportation business.

Veterinary Hospital Formed—G. H. Huthman, Elsie Huthman and A. F. McGreevey have incorporated the Rose City Veterinary hospital, with headquarters at Portland. Incorporation papers were filed at Salem last week, the capital stock being \$10,000.

Decrease in Capital Stock—Resolutions have been filed with State Corporation Commissioner Schulerman by the Union Meat company of Portland showing a decrease in capital stock from \$20,000 to \$5,000. It is said the company has been taken over by Swift & Co., and that this is the reason for the decrease.

Chinaman's Body Found in River—The body of Louis Tung, Chinese, aged 40 years, was found floating in the Willamette river, near the city of Portland, on Sunday afternoon. The body was taken to the city morgue. It was identified by friends who said that the dead man had recently come here from Seattle and that he had been missing since Tuesday.
