

FORESTER HERE TO MAKE PLANS FOR GRAZING LANDS

Extension of Forest Service Regulations to Other Portions of Public Domain Is Sought.

NORTHWEST STOCKMEN HELP

Elimination of Poison Plants, Which Cost Lives of Millions of Cattle Annually, Is Desired.

Will C. Barnes, assistant forester in charge of grazing of the forest service, arrived in Portland this morning from Washington, D. C., for his annual inspection trip and to lay plans for the extension of forest service grazing regulations to other public domains.

The stockmen of Oregon and Washington have shown more enterprise in following our methods of handling land than anywhere else in the country," declared Mr. Barnes, "and we have had better cooperation from them. They have accepted our ideas and gone into them with a lot of enthusiasm. Through the efforts of T. P. MacKenzie, formerly of the Portland office, who is now in British Columbia, who was an enthusiast at organizing, we have been able to work through the stock organizations in doing remarkable things in

the way of better stock, fencing up the area, eliminating poisonous plants and other things. This work is being continued by E. N. Kavanagh.

HEAVY LOSSES OF CATTLE
"Do you know that 10,000,000 head of cattle die annually from poisonous plants? We feel every bit of that could be eliminated by the grubbing out, but this costs money. We asked congress for \$100,000 for this work, but it didn't get passed, and what grubbing is done must be done by the stockmen."

"Stockmen at a meeting we had in Salt Lake in July said they desired the same control of the public land as was given the national forest lands, which resulted in a committee being appointed to further such legislation and to secure its passage in congress."

"Through regulation we have increased the number of stock on the national forests by more than one million head of sheep during the war. We thought we had overdone it, but later found by adjustment we are able to care for them all."

WILL VISIT GRAZING AREAS
Mr. Barnes expects to visit the grazing areas of the northwestern national forests, going by pack horse and camping outfit. He has been in Colorado and Utah for the last two months.

"Until three days ago we were spending \$30,000 daily in fighting forest fires," declared Mr. Barnes, "with no idea of how the money was coming to pay it. The vetoing of the appropriation bill left us entirely without money for a month. Fortunately, none of the men laid off or we would have had no money to pay them and it is against the law to give a promissory note in the forest service."

Mr. Barnes is staying at the Imperial.

Girl Flies to State Capital Was Like Floating in Air Best of Ride, She Says

Airplane rides are no longer unusual, but to everyone there is always a first experience, and when I learned that an opportunity was to be given me to fly to Salem Thursday afternoon, with the forest patrol planes being sent from Camp Lewis by the war department to Governor Olcott, I bolted my lunch, ran for a car and reached Eastmoreland to find the matter of my going still far from being settled.

Sergeant Frank McKee's plane was ready, and McKee was being himself up for a big to eat. Lieutenant E. C. Kiet of the other plane was in the air. Forest Examiner R. H. Chapin was the other passenger. For more than two hours we waited patiently upon the green sward of the aviation field while Sergeant McKee dispatched queries to scores of Washington towns to get track of the lost bird.

MUCH RED TAPE
Then came Lieutenant Kiet himself, sawing through the air and swooping gracefully down near the companion plane. He had lost Sergeant McKee in the fog. Red tape was a long time for him and in so doing had lost all sense of direction, had found a railroad but followed it the wrong way—hence the delay.

Came the disheartening information that passengers could not be taken up without the permission of the commanding officer, but finally, with the good work of Milton Klepper, president of the Aero Club, Associate District Forester A. F. Potter, who is visiting in Portland:

We landed and after delivering messages to those in waiting, were taken by State Forester E. A. Elliott to Governor Olcott's office where the state executive and aviator fan greeted us cordially.

PLAN TO DISTRIBUTE ARMY FOOD BY POST IS NEARLY MATURED

Housewife Will Order From Carrier and Orders From Each City Will Be Bulk.

Washington, Aug. 1.—(U. P.)—Complete plans for the sale of surplus army food by parcel post, as authorized by a house resolution, will probably be complete early next week, officials in charge of the work said today.

Assistant Postmaster General Blacklee, in charge of the work for the post office department, conferred today with Postmaster General Burleson and war department officials.

The food administration will work like this: The price list, when completed, with descriptions of the food for sale, will be put into the hands of the housewives by the postoffice, through postmasters and carriers. With the list will go an order blank.

The housewife who wants some of the army food will fill out the blank and hand it to the carrier. She will pay the carrier.

The postmaster will bulk all the orders and send them to the sales division of the war department. In large cities these orders in a single day may total a carload or more, officials here believe.

The war department will ship the food consigned to the postmaster who will distribute it through the local carriers. While the official price list will not be completed until Monday, an unofficial list obtained today shows that the meats and other food will be sold at about the following figures:

Corned beef—No. 1 cans, containing about 12 ounces, 50c; No. 2 cans, containing about 24 ounces, 58c; 6 pound cans, \$2.00.

Roast beef—No. 1 cans, 20c; 1 pound cans, 40c; 2 pound cans, 60c; 6 pound cans, \$2.50.

Corned beef hash—1 pound cans, 23c; 2 pound cans, 40c.

Bacon—in crates, 34c a pound.

Bacon—in 12 pound tins, 36c a pound.
