

WHEAT MOVEMENT IN NORTHWEST TO BEGIN THIS MONTH

Whether Most of Crop Comes to
Coast or Goes East Depends
on Water Tonnage Available.

COMMITTEE WILL CONTROL

Only Such Portion of Grain as
Can Be Adequately Handled at
Pacific Ports Will Be Allowed.

Sixty million bushels of wheat in the Pacific Northwest will begin moving either to the east coast or to Pacific ports this month. Possibility of a car shortage during this movement depends altogether on whether the majority of the grain moves east or west, in the opinion of railroad traffic men and grain handlers.

"Whether the movement will go east or west depends in turn on the number of ships available on the Pacific Coast for transportation of the grain and flour to the east coast and Europe," says R. W. Pickard of the S. P. & S. traffic department and one of the Columbia river grain control committee.

"PEAK" NOT CERTAIN

The peak of the annual grain movement usually comes about September, but according to the car experts in this district it is impossible to determine whether the principal movement will come at the same season this year.

Several months ago when the grain congestion was acute in this district, the United States food administration announced that only about 15,000,000 bushels of the 1919 crop would move to Portland and Puget Sound. Since normal conditions have been restored grain men believe it highly probable that about half of the crop will come to the Pacific Coast.

"If the greater movement goes east," says Pickard, "railroad equipment in this district will probably be insufficient because of the length of time it takes to have cars returned that are dispatched to the east coast."

A SHORTAGE NOT EXPECTED

"On the other hand, if the majority, or even a fair portion of the grain moves to the west, we believe there will be sufficient equipment. It is impossible to say definitely whether there will be a car shortage, but the railroads are not anticipating a serious tie-up."

Serious congestions of ports of the northwest have occurred for the last four years. Beginning last year, and continuing until the summer of this year the congestion was the worst. In the opinion of grain handlers and millers, the permit system of assigning cars for grain movement is in effect now, and should do a lot to relieve congestion.

S. A. Hering of the railroad administration car service department of the O-W. lines, S. P. and Pacific Coast railways, and Pickard are the committee in charge of issuing these permits for the Columbia River district. The plan of the committee of Puget Sound is composed of J. C. Rolf of the district directors' office at Seattle and M. J. Conello, assistant traffic manager of the Great Northern.

PERMITS ARE NECESSARY

All shippers of grain must obtain permits from one of these four men for shipments to Pacific ports. The plan of the two committees is not to allow more shipments west than can be billed out of Pacific ports or handled at the mills in this district at one time. "Formerly farmers shipped their crop to the coast or east as fast as cars were available," says Pickard. "The permit system shuts them off from shipment until their crop can be handled, and thus prevents congestion, acute car shortage and demurrage problems."

Lumber Mill Bought By Mitsui Company

Chehalis, Wash., Aug. 5.—The Mitsui company has purchased a sawmill plant near Seattle. It owned the Newaukum River Lumber company sawmill plant, recently destroyed by a fire believed to have been incendiary. H. M. Jones, superintendent for the company here, will have charge of the new mill.

Packing Bill Hearing Set

Washington, Aug. 5.—(I. N. S.)—Hearings on the Kenyon and Kendrick bills to regulate the packers will open on August 18, the senate committee on agriculture decided this afternoon after considerable discussion.

Logs Pinch Off Top Of Brakeman's Head, On Car at Astoria

Astoria, Aug. 5.—Frank Anderson, a brakeman on the Western Coeurage company's logging train, was instantly killed while at work Monday.

A trainload of logs was being hauled from the California Barrel company's camp when one log dropped down and displaced the load on the two cars behind. Anderson was caught between two logs and the top of his head was pinched off. Anderson was 23 years old.

His parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Anderson, reside at Bandon and his sister, Mrs. Edith Hollenbeck, lives at the Western Coeurage company camp. It is expected the remains will be shipped to Bandon for interment.

Gifts Received to Help in Building of New Women's Hall

Willamette University, Salem, Aug. 5.—Historic Lausanne hall, the woman's dormitory at Willamette university for many years, has been condemned and can no longer be used as a home for the students. The building was named for the ship which brought the missionaries and pioneer settlers to Oregon. A new Lausanne is in prospect. President Honey having announced several recent gifts, one a pair of horses. Others are a library of law books, a Salem lot and a quarter section of timber land. The donor of the latter contributes \$500 also and a Portland man subscribed \$1300 dollars to provide two rooms and to furnish them as memorials. The timber land is to make provision for an equine infirmary in the new dormitory. The trustees have authorized construction to begin when \$10,000 additional has been secured.

Young Auto Thief Is Sent Back to School

Salem, Aug. 5.—Two automobiles stolen from the streets of Salem Sunday were both recovered and Clinton Young, a paroled inmate of the Boys' Training school, who was found in possession of one of the cars, has been returned to the school for violating his parole. Young was picked up in Portland Sunday night while driving a car belonging to a farmer named Roberts, living near Salem. The car was stolen while Roberts was attending church Sunday morning. The other car, belonging to L. Walfman of near Gervais, was found near Chemawa, where it had been abandoned.

Division of School District Is Sought

Chehalis, Wash., Aug. 5.—Alleging that an agreement made when school districts 81 and 108 were consolidated five years ago, Mike Dokter has filed suit against the consolidated district and directors and County School Superintendent Z. May Meighan, asking for return to the two district status. Bad roads, he alleges, have made it necessary to discontinue transportation of pupils, agreed to at the time of the consolidation.

Boy of Three Stows Away on Motor Car

Sharon, Pa., Aug. 5.—"Billy" Burns, 3, can lay claim to being one of the country's youngest joyriders. A machine drove up in front of the Burns home recently and little Billy got aboard the running board and clung on to the extra tire. When the driver started away he failed to notice the child and carried him five miles. Meantime the Burns family had the police hunting for a supposed kidnaper.

U. S. Could Leave League Any Time

Washington, Aug. 5.—(U. P.)—The United States can withdraw from the League of Nations at any time it sees fit, David Miller, adviser to the American peace commission, declared in an official memorandum on the withdrawal provision presented to the senate committee by Senator Swanson, Virginia, Monday.
