

NINETY-FIVE MORE SHIPS FOR COAST RECOMMENDED

Cotton Growers and Shippers
Are Indignant Over Refusal
of Board to Supply Vessels.

GULF PORTS WANT BOATS

Ports on Atlantic and Pacific
Are Favored in Distribution,
Charge Made Before Senate.

San Francisco, Aug. 6.—Recommendation for 95 additional ships to be added to the Pacific coast quota of United States shipping board vessels, was made this afternoon by John H. Rosseter.

Washington, Aug. 6.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL).—Indignant protests against alleged discrimination against the southern states on the part of the shipping board in the allocation of ships were made at a meeting of the commerce committee of the senate.

Senators Fletcher of Florida, Simmons of North Carolina and Ransdell of Louisiana were especially aroused in denouncing what they termed unwarranted discrimination against the Gulf and south Atlantic ports, both in the distribution of ships and in rates.

Cotton and other southern products are piled up in the warehouses and sidetracked near the ports, they allege, and no attention was paid to their urgent requests for ships. Meanwhile, they declared, hundreds of ships are being assigned to the trade of the north Atlantic and the Pacific.

SOUTH NOT FAVORED

Representatives of the Pacific Northwest, who at times have complained of different phases of the conduct of shipping affairs, find their protests completely nullified by the charges now coming from the southern senators. Republicans, who have insinuated in times past that the administration was favoring the South, are discovering that the shoe does not always pinch in the same spot.

Senator Simmons said that the Mississippi valley, seeking a water outlet for its products through the gulf, is back of the Southerners, but their united efforts have produced practically no results.

"We found that 300 ships had been allocated to trade when we were asking for only 14, and were given only six," he said. "I am informed that at the present time the shipping board has 500 ships, and we have been able to secure only 14, all sold. One New York firm, W. R. Grace & Co., has been allotted 97. At Wilmington, N. C., the largest shipper of cotton in the South has all warehouses full and 500 cars waiting to be loaded, and it has been promised one ship by the middle of August."

SENATORS OPPOSED

The controversy arose in connection with the confirmation of three new members of the shipping board, John Barton Payne of Illinois, H. M. Robinson of California and Thomas A. Scott of Connecticut. The Southern senators were dissatisfied because their section is left unrepresented, the holdover members of the board being R. B. Stevens of New Hampshire and John A. Donald of New York.

They were ready to confirm Payne and Robinson, but wanted Scott's nomination held up, in the hope that a Southern man might be named. Scott is a Republican, and one of the new members, under the law, must come from that party. They did not contest the qualifications of Scott, whose ability and familiarity with shipping questions was amply attested. Senator Brandegee of Connecticut, Republican, paid high tribute to Scott as a man "who has built and repaired ships all his life."

RATES HELD UNJUST

Senator Harding of Ohio said he would join with the Southern senators in passing a resolution asking the shipping board to correct discrimination against the Gulf and South Atlantic, if it exists, but he was unwilling to hold up Scott's nomination on that account. If the board persists in discrimination, he said, all of the members should be thrown out.

Senator Fletcher said that the shipping board has established the same rates from Jacksonville to Havana as are paid from New York, although Jacksonville is only 200 miles away and New York over 1000 miles distant. Even then the South has no chance, he said, because it cannot obtain an allocation of ships to care for its trade, and the goods have to be sent to New York and transferred there to carry them to Cuba and South America.

The committee voted to confirm all three nominations, the action being unanimous as to Payne and Robinson. The southerners dissented on Scott.

Deschutes Timber Workers Awaiting Order for Strike

Bend, Aug. 6.—Whether the local of the International Union of Timber Workers will call a strike in all the lumber camps and sawmills in Deschutes county with but one exception remains in doubt. Although a meeting was held Monday evening here, it could not be learned whether a definite strike order has been determined upon, owing to the departure that night of Ray Canterbury of Seattle, one of the timberworkers' officials, and B. Hanson, organizer of the Bend local, for Portland.

It is thought here that negotiations are pending with state officials regarding the wage scale. It is expected that nothing will be done in the way of a strike at least before the end of the week.

Man Still Missing

Bend, Aug. 6.—The whereabouts of Walter Beasley of Bend, who left his home Sunday evening, has not been learned, according to word received from a party of searchers. Beasley left his home clad in a blue serge suit, over which he wore a pair of overalls. It is thought that he has become mentally unbalanced as a result of wounds he received while serving with the American expeditionary forces in France.

Just Prices May Be Set as Well as War Profits, Asserts Lee

Cleveland, Aug. 6.—"If the government was able to guarantee war profits, it can guarantee just prices to the consumer."

This was the declaration here of William G. Lee, president of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, upon his return from Washington where with other heads of the "Big Four" demand was made that the cost of living be cut down. "I am not an alarmist," he said, "but if action is not taken immediately there is going to be grievous suffering."

Lee advised patience on the part of union men, but said there are times when patience ceases to be a virtue.
