

ADVANTAGES OF O. A. C. BEING PLACED BEFORE FORMER SERVICE MEN

State College Makes Use of List of Men Eligible Under Educational Aid Law.

Salem, Aug. 7.—Using the list of 35,000 names of Oregon ex-service men compiled by State Librarian Cornelia Marvin, as a mailing list, representatives of the Oregon Agricultural College are busy this week sending out information relative to the soldiers' educational aid law and incidentally mentioning the educational advantages afforded by the Corvallis institution. A corps of women of honor are engaged in addressing envelopes to the service men and enclosing the O. A. C. literature. In this way practically every service man in the state, who is eligible to receive aid under the provisions of the act, will be reached by the agricultural college.

Miss Marvin, who is in charge of the records which are being compiled at the expense of the state, declared that the list would be open to the use of the other institutions in connection with this bill, the University of Oregon already having applied for permission to use the list.

Six private institutions have so far submitted data to Sam A. Koser, deputy secretary of state, and signified their desire to receive applications from ex-service men under the provisions of the act. These are the Babbs-Walker Business college, Portland; Pacific university, Forest Grove; Eugene Business college, Eugene; Philomath college, Philomath; Capital Business college, Salem; and Willamette university, Salem. These are in addition to the state institutions, which are recognized as coming within the provisions of the law without the necessity of making any further showing.

THIRTY-FOUR OF 563 WIDOWS DRAWING COMPENSATION REWED

Salem, Aug. 7.—Thirty-four of the 563 women who have drawn compensation as widows of fatally injured Oregon workmen have remarried during the five-year period since the act became operative July 1, 1914. Of this number 10 remarried within a year from the time of the death of the husband, 14 others remarried within the two-year period, seven within three years and three within four years.

Under the provisions of the compensation act, when a widow of a fatally injured workman receives her compensation ends with a lump sum payment of \$300. Her children, if any, however, continue to draw their monthly compensation until they have reached the age of 18 years. In this connection it is noted in a report compiled by Commissioner Will T. Kirk that in 11 cases of remarriage there were no children, in eight instances there was but one child, in seven instances there were two children, in four instances three children, in three instances four children and in one instance seven children subject to compensation under the provisions of the act.

PERMANENT HANGARS FOR USE OF FOREST PATROL ARE URGED

Salem, Aug. 7.—The erection of permanent hangars for the accommodation of the army planes, assigned to Oregon for forest patrol service, is urged by Colonel H. H. Arnold in charge of the army air service of the western department, in a letter to Governor Ofcott. Such a move, Colonel Arnold states, would not only obviate the necessity for shipping tent hangars to Oregon for housing these planes, but would greatly encourage the use of planes by civilian enthusiasts and "would bring aviation to Oregon much sooner than is possible in any other way."

TALENT IRRIGATION DISTRICT BOND ISSUE GIVEN APPROVAL

Salem, Aug. 7.—Forty-five thousand dollars worth of irrigation bonds were certified by the state irrigation securities commission, Wednesday, for the Talent irrigation district and the certification of an additional \$75,000 worth of bonds has been authorized by the state commission. The total issue of the district amounts to \$600,000, of which \$175,000 has been certified heretofore. The district embraces 8000 acres in Jackson county.

Astoria Company Formed

Salem, Aug. 7.—The Astoria Stationery company of Astoria, capitalized at \$5000, filed articles of incorporation with Corporation Commissioner Schulerman, Wednesday. The incorporators are Charles F. Bollinger, N. Ray Albers

Nearly All Food Necessities Take Jump in Chicago

Chicago, Aug. 7.—(U. N. S.)—Here are some of the increases in food prices in Chicago during the past week: Sugar, 1 to 3 cents; coffee, 14 to 20 cents a pound; potatoes, 11 per hundred pounds; fresh milk, 1 cent a quart; condensed milk, 1 cent a can; cheese, 3 cents a pound; bacon, 1 to 2 cents a pound; pork chops, 1 cent a pound; berries, 2 to 15 cents a quart. The one decrease was in the price of a popular brand of package biscuits reduced from 10 cents a package to 7½c.

Girls Will Make Money and Have Good Time in Camp

The girl's summer camp for pickers of 138 acres of beans for the season of from four to six weeks will open near Clatskanie August 15, Mrs. W. S. Deighton, camp supervisor, has announced. Excellent accommodations in either houses or tents with well cooked food of the best quality will be furnished, says Mrs. Deighton, the girls paying merely for the cost of the food. The girls will furnish their own bedding and personal equipment. The camp is being organized under the direction of Mrs. L. V. Scott, superintendent of the women's division of the United States employment bureau.

About 800 girls are needed and, while the rate of pay has not been definitely decided, it is said that a good adult picker should make from \$5 to \$8 a day. After the day's work the girls will be free and a nearby stream with a swimming hole will offer one of the numerous diversions.

"The camp affords an excellent opportunity to have an outing as well as to make good money," said Mrs. Deighton. "The girls in the evening have no responsibility whatever concerning their meals."

Girls should register at 809 Lewis building where Mrs. Deighton will give all details of the camp on Friday, Saturday, Monday and Tuesday.

Misfortune Hits Family Third Time Within Few Weeks

Brownsville, Aug. 7.—A series of misfortunes has befallen the Swank family, residing on a farm three miles from Brownsville. Members of the family lost two dwellings during the recent fire. All were at the farm during the conflagration and their belongings in the city were destroyed. Mrs. Augusta Swank died Friday and while the members of the family were attending the funeral their horses engaged in a free-for-all kicking engagement and several were injured, one fine young animal becoming entangled in a barbed wire fence, and its leg so cut that it will probably be necessary to shoot the animal.

Brownsville, Aug. 7.—Samuel McQueen, 22 years old, of Holley, was killed Monday at Gates, where he was employed by a logging company. He was a son of Perry McQueen of Holley.
