DRESS

SOME day in the centuries that are to come some one interested in historic costume will write a learned dissertation on the evolution of the shirtwaist, just as we today, looking back at Greek or Roman costume, trace the development of the chiton or toga or in later times of the tunic. And you may be quite sure that there will be difficulties in that subject of historic research. There will be disputes as to what really constitutes a shirtwaist, anyway. And perhaps the conclusion will be drawn that it is a general term to designate all separate waists made of material differing from that of the skirt. Obviously the prototype was the man's shirt that he wore with a suit. At first the feminine adaptation was decidedly mannish. The collar was similar to that of a man's shirt and the sleeves were made with the regulation shirt cuffs. It was smart, but becoming only to those women who could wear mannish things to advantage.

OLD BREAK AT WAISTLINE GONE
Then it took on a frill or two, some extra tucks and a little embroidery and insertion. The sleeves became softened and the collar took a frill or two. It appeared entirely. Still a majority of women went on calling it a shirtwaist, using that word interchangeably with blouse. The chief advantage, as well as the greatest fault with the thing was that it parted one's raiment in the middle just where from the point of view of a good many artists a woman's figure ought never to be parted. The advantage of course was that variety might be achieved merely by the change of the blouse.

If you choose to call the present-day separate blouse a development of the old-time shirtwaist—and really it is quite impossible to say where one begins and the other ends—then you will be interested to see that there is no longer that line of division—or rather the divisional line has been robbed of all its inartistic terrors. Sometimes it is a pepum in the front and one in back that breaks the line. But the effect is just as satisfactory where it is as it is in the little blouse shown today achieved by an extended section on the side.

ONE NOW WEARS THE BLOUSE WITHOUT A JACKET
Many well dressed women have had a prejudice against wearing the separate shirtwaist ever without a suit jacket. If they have not actually worn the jacket all the time, they had had it near at hand. To appear in the street wearing the separate skirt and blouse was a bit of clothes heresy. But now we wear our suits merely with the little false fronts we call a gilet, and the separate skirt where we will, and have no feeling of being inadequately clad. Fascinating in
New Play

"Merrie Month of May" Is Splendid Comedy and an Original One; Rennie Is Superb.

RUTH-CHATTERTON, supported by an excellent cast at the Helix, gave her opening performance in this city last night to a crowded house. The play, "The Merrie Month of May," is a charming comedy of great originality in conception and of superb bits of humor that flash throughout the play from start to finish. It had its premier in San Francisco recently.

The setting of the play is in Washington and it centers about the daughter of Senator Baldwin of Arizona, who is beset with three suitors between whom she cannot choose. Miss Chatterton is the daughter, Judith, and she vests the part with every bit of the humor there is in the laughable trick she puts up on them.

To each Miss Chatterton confides the sad story of her imaginary "past," the story of indelicacy, as pasts usually are. She starts something, and she starts it fast and furious. One of the suitors tells her father what she had confided in him and he, very Arizona-like, starts something also. There is a westerner among the suitors, a returned aviator and a two-handed fighter, who is prepared to overlook pasts and it is, of course, he who wins out in the long run and wins doubly when the deception practiced on all three is disclosed.

James Rennie, as Tod Musgrave, the young westerner, is as polished an actor as the star he is supporting. Throughout the play he gives a splendid rendition of the hero part. By curious coincidence, he is a returned aviator, and it is, as stated, the part of a returned aviator that he plays.
