Oregon Day Set—Oregon day at the Southwestern Washington State fair at Chehalis has been set for August 26, according to a letter received by the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce this morning from Secretary G. Welfare Hearing Tuesday—A public hearing will be held at 2 p. m. Tuesday in the rooms of the industrial welfare commission in the courthouse on the recommendations submitted by the conference on wages and hours. The minimum wage will be raised if the report is adopted, from \$11.10 and \$11.61 weekly to \$13.20 for all industries, and the hours will be made 48 a week for all industries in the state, not to exceed nine hours in one day.

Farmer Comes Into His Own

Deference has replaced the charitable attitude of former years to the farmers of Idaho, asserts Dr. T. D. Forren of Caldwell, formerly a railroad surgeon and now retired and living on a farm himself. The change has come within the last six years, says Dr. Forren, and now the farmers are reaping enormous harvests, hay is abundant with a big demand for it and stockmen from Montana are shipping their cattle in to graze, finding it cheaper than to bale the hay and transport it. Blind Addresses

Many people do not understand the use of blind addresses in "want" ads. Those who do understand their use and purpose frequently use them on the wrong class of advertising.

For the convenience of our patrons The Journal maintains a postoffice department and answers to advertisements may be directed to this department under addresses furnished by the advertiser. These addresses are called "blind numbers." No information of any kind is given out by The Journal concerning advertisements using blind numbers and answers to such advertisements can only be obtained by presenting the duplicate number given out at the time the advertisement is inserted. The only exception to this rule is in the case of out-of-town advertisers whose answers are mailed to them regularly.

The question of when blind addresses should be used is sometimes a vexing one. Generally speaking, we advise against the use of blind addresses where it can possibly be avoided. The reason is the same we have advanced before: making it just as easy as possible for the reader to understand how to answer a large number of people there are who do not understand how to answer a blind advertisement. It is surprising, however, that thousands of people who do not understand the trouble of making a blind advertisement, will send some issue giving telephone number and address, thereby making it easy to get in touch with the advertiser. For some reason many people are suspicious of an advertisement to which the advertiser will not attach a name. It is necessary for the reader to go to the trouble of answering blind advertisements. "Real Estate to Exchange," "Livestock," "Homes and Vehicles," "Paul Brown and 'Pet Stock'" are other poor places to use blind addresses.

"Help Wanted" advertisements under blind addresses will usually secure plenty of applicants, but here again it is doubtful whether they always secure applications from the most competent class of help. "Situations Wanted" advertisements, however, are usually answered by phone numbers and addresses because when help is wanted it is usually wanted in a hurry.
