

SINN FEIN AND UNIONISTS CLASH, NINE ARE INJURED

Crowds at Londonderry Dispersed
During Day by Soldiers With
Fixed Bayonets.

MARTIAL LAW IS DECLARED

Irish Members of Parliament
Hurry Home on Learning New
Developments in Island.

Belfast, Aug. 16.—Nine persons were injured here today in a clash between Sinn Feiners and Unionists. Crowds at Londonderry were dispersed during the day by soldiers with fixed bayonets, and additional troops have been rushed to the city.

London, Aug. 16.—By following the declaration of martial law in County Clare, Ireland, similar action is expected in Tipperary, Limerick, Cork and Kerry. The declaration of martial law followed a series of reports from disaffecteds from districts similar to those that preceded the Easter rebellion in 1916.

Today for the first time since the siege of Derry, British troops manned the wall of the historic city as a result of the series of disorders that marked the celebration of "Lucky Day." Many prosecutions for the drilling and unlawful assembly are taking place in North Kerry and in Tyrone and many Irish members of parliament, including Messrs. Devlin and McVeagh, have left England for Ireland.

T. P. O'Connor, discussing the increase of disorder in Ireland today, said: "It is only another stage in the policy, or perhaps I should say lack of policy, which is reducing Ireland to an inferno. The story is so old in Irish history that I cannot understand how anybody can fail to realize what it means. It is placing Ireland in the center of a vicious circle, where repression aggravates repression."

"This system has produced the same disastrous results many times, and it will continue to produce such results until the government finds time, vision and courage—and all seem for the moment absent—to strike at the roots of the turmoil by satisfying the national aspirations of Ireland by giving to her own representatives the management of Irish affairs."

Ennis, Ireland, Aug. 16.—Guns broke loose in this county during the past week and police huts in various railroad junctions were scenes of thrilling battles. The constabulary at one hut in the northern section of the county withstood an attack by men mounted and afoot for several hours.

The strain of the prolonged battle was such that the sergeant in charge of the hut became insane and tried to kill himself by slashing his throat.

A sergeant and a constable were ambushed and killed near Lisbon St. Anna. These and many other raids and shootings have brought the county into a state bordering on revolution. Suspension of constitutional rights has resulted in more hostility on the part of the people. Thousands of troops with all the paraphernalia of war have been thrown into the borders of the county, and troop trains are still moving in this direction. Meetings, public meetings, games and assemblies of all kinds have been prohibited.

London, Aug. 16.—The Sinn Fein movement has been strengthened by the reception accorded to De Valera in the United States. This is the view prevailing in parliament and elsewhere in government circles, according to the parliamentary correspondent of the Express.

The manifestations in Londonderry, Belfast and County Clare have resulted in a general forecast that Lloyd George will have to face the Irish question in his speech Monday, which was scheduled to deal only with labor and industry.

From official quarters, the word comes that the government will not adopt any new policy of repression, but is ready to back up Dublin Castle in any action considered necessary to restore law and order. The government's attitude is reported continuing in Clare and renewed outbreaks are feared in Londonderry.

The damage to Londonderry is estimated at \$50,000. Lord French is prepared to extend the proclaimed areas if deemed necessary. Responsible opinion holds the view that the situation prevailing in Ireland is at the lowest ebb. It is declared that if an election were held in Ireland today Joseph Devlin is the only nationalist who would be returned to parliament.

The Star declares that the Sinn Feiners, "owing to the folly of our misrule," has ceased to be a faction and become almost a nation. The paper attacks the policy of drift plus repression and expresses the opinion that the government is likely to attempt repression of the Sinn Fein throughout the whole of Ireland.

Pershing Will Visit Italian Battlefield

Rome, Aug. 16.—(U. P.)—General Pershing, after visiting Rome Sunday, will leave for the Italian battlefield. The American commander will receive an extremely cordial welcome in Rome, the Popolo Romano said today, welcoming him as "the representative of a great and friendly nation."

RATIFY TREATY, WICKERSHAM PLEA

now nine in number, and by a majority of the members whose representatives compose the assembly.

Recognizing that while the constitution of the United States was adopted to form a more perfect and perpetual union of the states, and has resulted in the creation of a nation, the covenant of Paris proposed merely a league of sovereign nations, from which any member might withdraw at will. It was also provided that no amendment should bind any dissenting member, but one who should not accept an amendment duly adopted should cease to be a member of the league.

The opposition to the constitution of the United States finally crystallized into the objection that it failed to provide a bill of rights safeguarding the fundamental guarantees of life, liberty and property against abuse of powers by the new government.

"But the friends of the constitution," as Justice Brandeis once wrote, "believe that the failure to accept it would destroy all hope for permanent union among the people of the original states, and following the advice of Washington, who was the leader of the constitution forces, met this objection by showing that when the constitution had been accepted by the constituent states and had thereby become the supreme law of the land, such amendments could be adopted as would relieve the apprehensions of those who deemed it necessary by express provisions to guard against the infringement by the agencies of the general government of any of the essential rights of American freemen."

DANGER PRESENTED
The present situation of the peace treaty presents a similar danger and a like avenue of escape.

The failure to accept the peace covenant would destroy the most practical plan for the preservation of the world's peace ever submitted to the acceptance of the nations. It is a plan for an alliance of the powers for purposes which peculiarly involve the application of principles of American origin and growth. The peaceful settlement of international disputes by arbitration or friendly counsel; agreements for the limitation of armaments; the ending of the hideous competition of nations in preparations which inevitably must end either in war or financial ruin; the development of imperfectly developed peoples in their own interest under the jurisdiction of the allied powers, instead of their exploitation by the selfish aims of rival nations; the establishment of a permanent machinery for the exchange of opinions and the taking of counsel concerning matters of importance to two or more nations—these have been advocated by America from the time of the Jay treaty to the second Hague conference.

UNDUE ENCROACHMENT AVOIDED
Very carefully has the covenant of Paris avoided undue encroachment upon the sovereignty of any of the states which may become members of the league. Obviously, those who framed its provisions recognized that it must be a great experiment. Therefore, they provided means of growth through amendment and of retirement in the event of failure. The objections made by members of the senate—for objection almost exclusively has originated among, and has been propagated by, senators—aside from that character of opposition which is unalterably opposed to the entire project and will have none of it, however framed, finally has come down to about half a dozen points which it has been sought to express in reservations not amounting to a conditional ratification of the treaty which would require resubmission to Germany and the other powers which should have ratified it. But there is no agreement among the ratifiers of these reservations, and some of them obviously amount to amendments, while others present serious question concerning the effect to be accomplished.

TIME FOR ACTION HERE
Has not the time come for action inspired by the wisdom and the example of the framers and those who promoted the constitution of the United States? Let the senate ratify the treaty, and thus avert from America the reproach of depriving the world of the great hope, the radiant promise of a world allied for the preservation of peace. Then let those measures for the improvement of the instrument, for the better safeguarding of the national traditions and institutions of America be formulated by the senate, or by both houses of congress, and transmitted to the American representatives in the assembly and in the council of the League of Nations, with instructions to present and press them upon assembly and council for adoption as amendments to the covenant. The prestige and power of America are so great that it scarcely can be doubted that any such amendments thus recommended would fall of adoption, save for demonstrably convincing reasons. This course of action would end the period of doubt and uncertainty created by our continued inaction. It

PORTLAND AGAIN IS GIVEN "GO BY"

Government Allots 23 Steamers
to San Francisco, 15 to
Seattle and Portland 4.

Portland has again been passed up in shipping matters as being less than the proverbial "white chip."

San Francisco has been allotted 23 steamers for permanent trade routes of the Orient and Seattle 15 for the same trade by the United States shipping board. Portland gets four.

In addition to this general recognition of these two ports, 10 vessels have been allotted these highly favored ports for other routes, and 15 more ships have been guaranteed for tramp service. Alongside this allotment, Portland is promised four ships for the Orient. No service whatever with Australasia or the West Coast and no direct connection beyond Manila has been provided for Portland has been permitted to take a share in loading 14 steamers for the North Pacific-North European service.

CHAMBER IS STIRRED
These facts are stirring the Chamber of Commerce more than any other question of the day and W. D. B. Dodson, secretary of it, says that, says that the entire strength of the community must be employed if any additional vessels are to be placed here pending final sale of the shipping board steamers.

"Portland is placed in the same ship category as Los Angeles, which had no off-shore commerce before the war," says Dodson. In covering the situation the chamber has summarized the following reasons why Portland has a just ground for complaint:

"The fact that we have built more than 80 steel steamers for the government during the war period, and more wooden ships than any other port of the whole country, counts for nothing. The fact that we had a fortnightly service to the Orient prior to the war is, passed as negligible. ALL IS OVERLOOKED

"The fact that we could be handling eight or ten ships on the Oriental run, and increase this business, is passed up, and the fact that this is one of the greatest cargo producing districts of the coast, has a channel and harbor as good as any, has spent millions in facilities and has a general business, is overlooked.

"The fact that the Japanese ships swarm in Puget Sound and a heavy service also exists at San Francisco, and the needs for carriers in both places is much less than here, is counted against us instead of in our favor.

"All the facts must be presented to the powers that be. Portland must enter the fight to win. It is now a question of forcing the issue."

The chamber intends to present these facts immediately to H. H. Ebel, coast manager of the shipping board through C. D. Kennedy, Portland agent for the division of operations, and see if some provision cannot be made for Portland immediately.

Will Electrify Roads
Paris, Aug. 16.—(U. P.)—It is proposed to electrify the Paris-Lyon-Mediterranean railway line, and to end the hideous competition of railroads—5500 miles of track—thus saving 3,000,000 tons of coal annually. It is claimed.

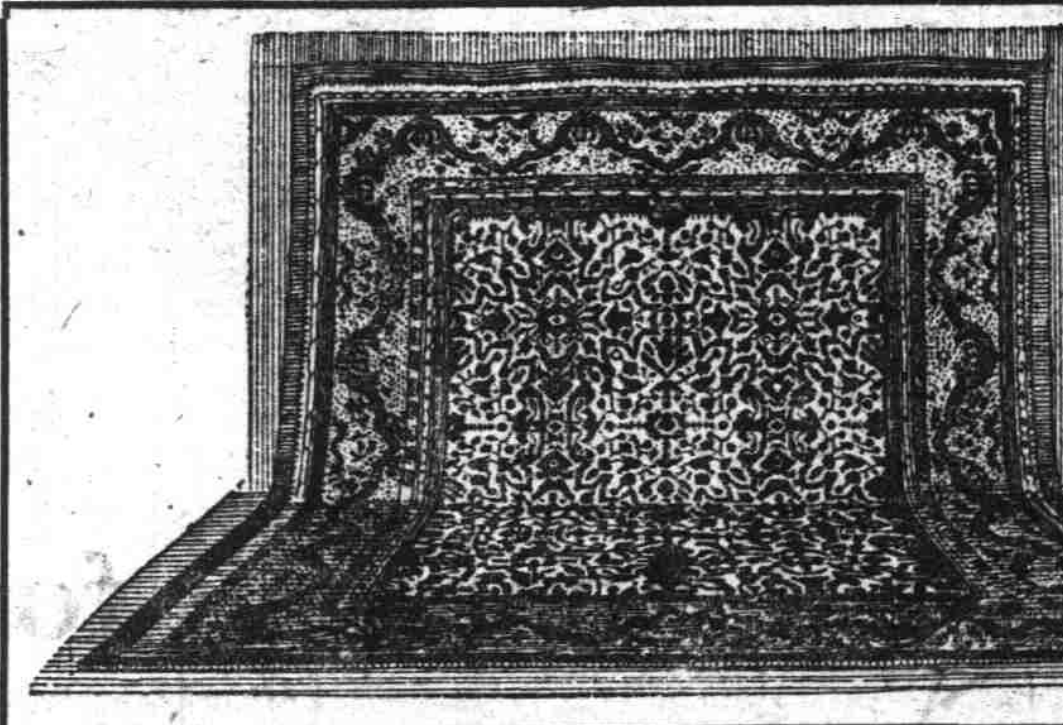

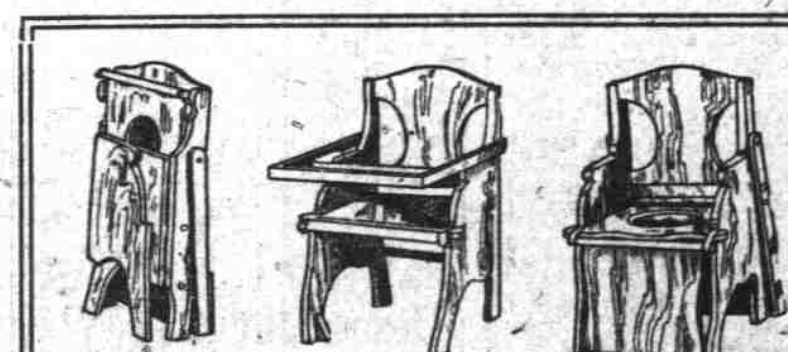

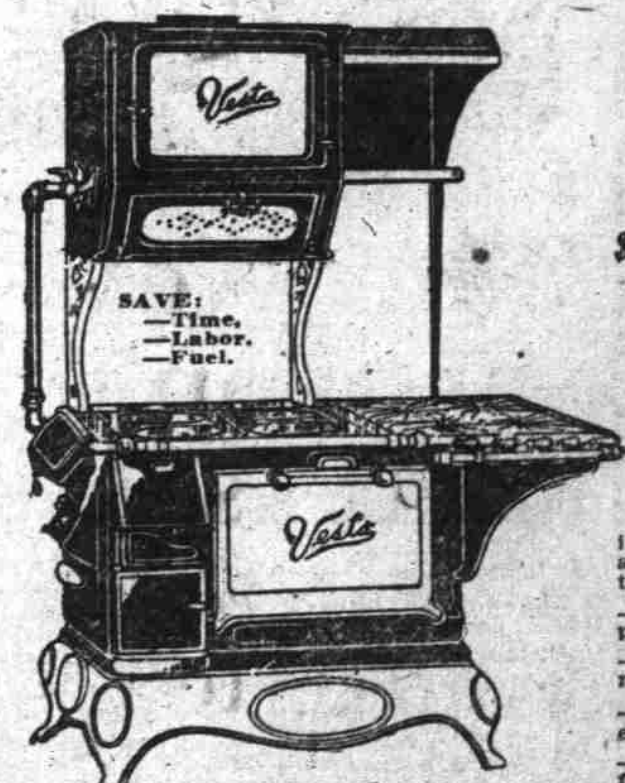
