

JEKVILL AND HYDE BATTLE IN LODGE MADE MANIFEST

Suave Massachusetts Senator of 1915 Shown to Be Different From Cynical Lodge of Today.

WIDE GULF FOUND TO EXIST

One Sincerely Espoused League of Nations; Other Slurringly Derides Such an Effort.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 20.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL.)—The speech of Senator Henry Cabot Lodge attacking the League of Nations last week brings him into sharp conflict with the Senator Henry Cabot Lodge of 1915, who delivered an earnest speech that year in his home state at the commencement of Union college.

The Lodge who spoke last week was cold, cynical, suspicious, and offered no hope for the betterment of the world as the result of the world war. The Lodge of 1915 spoke with generous sympathy and told his hearers that the time had arrived for a union of nations to promote world peace.

The Lodge of 1915 seems even to have warned against the Lodge of last Tuesday, for he then said:

"We must begin the work with the clear understanding that our efforts will fall if they are tainted with the thought of personal or political profit, or with any idea of self-interest or self-glorification."

The tenor of the two addresses is best shown by a comparison in parallel of selected passages from each:

There is no escape from the proposition that the peace of the world can only be maintained by the force which united nations are willing to put behind the peace and order of the world.

Nations must unite as men unite in order to preserve peace and order.

The great nations must be so united as to be able to say to any single country, "You must not go to war," and they can only say that effectively when the country desiring war knows that the force which the united nations place behind peace is irresistible.

In differences between nations peace can only be maintained by putting behind it the force of united nations determined to uphold it and to prevent war.

No one is more conscious of the enormous difficulties of such a scheme, but I am certain that it is in this direction that we can find hope for the maintenance of peace and the avoidance of useless wars.

Even if we could establish such a union of nations there might be some wars which could not be avoided, but there are certainly many which might be prevented.

It may seem utopian at this moment to suggest a union of civilized nations in order to put a controlling force behind the maintenance of peace and international order, but it is through the aspiration for peace that the search for Utopias, that the advances have been made.

We may not now succeed, but I believe that in the slow process of the years others who come after us will reach the goal.

The effort and the sacrifice which we make will not be in vain when the end in sight is noble, when we are striving to help mankind and lift the heaviest burden from suffering humanity.

Woman Companion Is Charged With Aiding In Bombing Outrage

Los Angeles, Aug. 20.—Oscar W. Lawler, victim of the recent bomb explosion, now being investigated by the grand jury, has demanded the arrest of a woman now under police surveillance, who, he charges, was an active partner with Charles H. McGwire in the destruction of Lawler's home August 3. Lawler charged that with McGwire a suicide, the police still allowed at liberty the woman who "directly and actively aided McGwire in the plot to destroy my home and murder my family."

Indian Allotments Bought by Bidders At Umatilla Agency

Pendleton, Aug. 20.—Seven of 12 Indian allotments offered for sale at the Umatilla Indian agency were sold to the highest bidders. On the remaining five tracts there were no bids.

The Isaac allotment of 160 acres brought \$50,000 and was appraised at \$15,000. Thomas Thompson was the successful bidder.

D. C. Bowman of Mission got the Mrs. Joe Allen tract. On the Peter allotment Harvey Horn was the successful bidder. Horn also got the Cosh-Cosh allotment of 40 acres. The Mary Ann allotment of 40 acres, on the Umatilla river, went to Ben F. Martin of Meacham. Michael F. Umbarger of Pendleton got the Howtenonmi 40 acre tract on Tutuilla, and J. T. Owen of Pendleton purchased the Kammani tract of 40 acres.

Mayor Baker Sees Value of Highway In Central Oregon

Bend, Aug. 20.—"If the people of Portland knew the conditions of the highways in central Oregon, the needs of your country and what the improvement of the highways would mean, I am sure that they would back a good roads movement for a better north and south highway to a man," said Mayor George L. Baker of Portland, who stopped in Bend for the day en route home from Klamath Falls.

"The central Oregon route is the natural outlet from the Columbia river for tourists going south and leads the tourist northbound directly into the Columbia river highway and Portland."
