

FORMATION NEW LAND AND LABOR PARTY UNDER WAY

Portland Central Labor Council
Takes Initiative in Organiza-
tion of New Political Party.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE NAMED

Preliminary Plans Call for Affil-
iation With the Metal Trades
and State Grange Organization

Organization of a new state polit-
ical power, which may be known as
the Land and Labor party, appeared
as an early possibility at the regular
meeting of the Portland Central La-
bor Council on Thursday evening,
when resolutions providing for such
an organization were referred offi-
cially to the council's legislative com-
mittee.

Preliminary plans for the new party
provide for a special central council
committee to work in conjunction with
a metal trades committee, and later,
perhaps, with a state grange committee.
Radical labor representatives in the
council were appointed on the special
committee by President Harry Ander-
son, including C. A. Strickland, R.
Geist and Carl Hammer.

TO OVERCOME HANDICAP
To overcome what the introductory
resolution declares to be the handicap
placed upon the efforts of organized
labor by judicial and executive officials
now in power the proposed labor party
would be ready for a big part in the
next general election, according to the
plans outlined for it.

Efforts to oust C. M. Ryerson, editor
of the Labor Press, reappeared at the
meeting Thursday night in very mild
form, and incidentally there were sub-
mitted protests of the vote to oust the
editor from the locals of the electrical
and sheet metal workers' unions. These
protests were tabled by vote of the
meeting.

PROTEST OXMAN CONTRACT

Frank C. Oxman, one of the leading
witnesses in the case against Thomas
Mooney, convicted San Francisco bomb
plotter, has recently been awarded a
road building contract by the state high-
way commission. This fact roused the
council to a protest and the commission
has been asked to revoke the contract.
The council approved a plan to hold
at the Auditorium a debate on the ques-
tion of Irish liberty, with Miss Kathleen
O'Brien opposing James Robertson on
the rostrum.

DEFENDS CANADIAN MEMBERS

P. MacDonnell, vice president of the
British Columbia Federation of Labor,
spoke on behalf of organized labor mem-
bers in Canada under charges of treason,
and told of the causes leading up to the
great Winnipeg strike and the method
of its suppression. He denied that it had
any connection with the Russian Bol-
sheviki, and predicted the next time
there was a general strike in Canada
something would happen from the At-
lantic to the Pacific, and predicted the
giving up of every industry in the Do-
minion.

MacDonnell will give a public address
upon labor conditions in Canada at the
Auditorium soon.

A resolution was indorsed and the dif-
ferent unions have been asked thereby
to assess each a dollar to provide a
revolving fund for the State Exchange
cooperative store to operate on a more
extensive scale in making wholesale
purchases.

Arthur Hubbs Weds Miss Zoe R. Frazier At Hotel Multnomah

Medford, Aug. 22.—News has just
leaked out of the marriage at the Mul-
tnomah hotel, Portland, last Monday
noon, of Arthur W. Hubbs, manager of
the May company's drygoods store here,
to Miss Zoe R. Frazier, of Oskaloosa,
Iowa. They are spending their honey-
moon at Crater Lake Park. The wed-
ding is the culmination of a friendship
begun when Mr. Hubbs was employed
in Oskaloosa several years ago.

Money Accounted For

Medford, Aug. 23.—Because of the gen-
erally wrecked condition of the county
roads and consequent criticism arising
therefrom, the county court has just
made a report of where the road money
was spent and how it has been spent
so far this year. According to this re-
port, there is approximately \$200,000 in
the road fund and about \$51,000 has been
expended on roads since January 1.

Prospect Safe

Medford, Aug. 23.—Reports received
here from Prospect today are that the
forest fire which has been raging there
since the latter part of last week and
which is now 12 miles long and two miles
wide, is eating its way towards Butte
Falls and that unless a gale arises and
the wind changes, Prospect and imme-
diate vicinity is safe, including the big
power plant of the California-Oregon
Power company.

Girl Falls Through Awning, Fatally Hurt; Two Faint

Jeanette Blackburne, 18, received
fatal injuries, and two witnesses to
her fall fainted, when she fell through
a glass awning at First and Alder
streets early Thursday afternoon.
The young woman, who lived at
Fifty-eighth and East Gilliam streets,
was a member of the auditing staff of
the P. R. L. & P. company and was at
work above the street car company's
waiting room. Staring before a win-
dow it is thought she dropped a
knitting needle and in an effort to
recover it fell through the awning to
the street. Miss Blackburne was re-
moved to St. Vincent's hospital, where
she died.
