

Roosevelt Memorial Association Drive For \$37,500 Coming

Form of Campaign Used in Liberty Loan and Red Cross Drives Will Be Adopted.

"A standard form of campaign as established during various Liberty Loan and Red Cross drives was recommended Wednesday to the executive committee of the Roosevelt Memorial association, which will shortly organize a drive to raise \$37,500 in the state of Oregon."

According to the judgment of Edward Cookingham, Guy W. Talbot, Emory Olmstead, John L. Ethridge and others who met with the executive committee, the campaign for the Roosevelt Memorial should be conducted to reach as large a number of people as possible. It would be advisable, they said, to appoint workers to take full charge of the activities in each county.

The matter of raising the amount named in the state of Oregon would be simple, according to Dr. Henry Waldo Coe, chairman of the state executive committee, but the effort of the whole organization should be directed toward popularization. "The number of people contributing rather than the amount subscribed," he said, "will determine the success of our campaign."

The addition of a campaign organization for the county of Multnomah and the city of Portland will be made very shortly. Judge Jacob Kanzler having been chosen as its director. He will name the members of his organization and direct the plans for the campaign here.

The choice of directors for the campaign in separate counties will be made by a committee which was named yesterday. Robert E. Smith, John L. Ethridge and Edgar Piper, Jr., are its members.

Portland Printers Attend Smoker for National Officers

Portland printers to the number of 200 attended a smoker given at the Press club Wednesday night in honor of Walter W. Barrett, first vice president, and J. W. Hays, secretary-treasurer of the International Typographical union.

The officers are on a tour of inspection of the unions of the Pacific coast and left today for San Francisco. Barrett, as first vice president, represents the printers, while Hays represents the interests of the allied printing crafts.

Unionism is gaining steadily in strength in the Pacific coast states, according to Secretary Hays. The danger of radicalism in this country is past, he says, and this is due in a great measure to the stabilizing influence of the American Federation of Labor.

Chamber Will Assist In the Entertaining Of County Officials

Directors of the Chamber of Commerce at their regular meeting Wednesday afternoon decided to assist in the entertainment of county judges, commissioners and other officials during the convention of county judges and commissioners and affiliated officials in Portland, September 10, 11 and 12. They have requested the state chamber to assist in this work. Automobiles will be provided and several special features will be arranged for the visitors. Washington state county officials will hold the convention in Vancouver the same week and it is believed many officials from both states will be in Portland then.

Car Injures a Man And Another Auto Few Minutes Later

The person of M. J. Dillon and the automobile of Mrs. Tom Richardson, superintendent of the Portland surgical hospital, suffered from the misfortunes of C. G. Olson, 174 East Water street, in a series of odd accidents shortly after noon Thursday.

As Olson was crossing Tenth and Everett streets, Dillon was struck by the Olson machine and dragged for 15 feet. Slightly injured, he was bundled into the Olson car and headed for St. Vincent's hospital. At Fourteenth and Olson streets Olson collided with Mrs. Richardson's car, forcing it to the curb, where it was badly damaged and where it narrowly missed a group of young women. Dillon was removed from Olson's car and continued on his way to the hospital in a more safe vehicle.

RECEPTION PLANS FOR FLEET ARE DISCUSSED AT OFFICE OF MAYOR

Free Admission to Theatres and Baseball Games and Big Dance Tentatively Mentioned.

Harbormaster Jacob Speier left Wednesday evening for San Francisco so he could be present at the conference with Admiral Rodman and Secretary Daniels upon their arrival at that port and determine the number of vessels which will come to the Columbia river next month.

Speier will meet Captain Nolan, the bar pilot sent to San Francisco several days ago by the Astoria port commission, and because it is impossible to send a river pilot at this time owing to heavy business on the Columbia, he will present the latest figures and charts on the river. The river pilots will send a message to Admiral Rodman explaining the local situation.

Chairmen of the various committees working on fleet reception work met in Mayor Baker's office Wednesday afternoon and discussed general plans for the reception.

Free admission to theatres, baseball games, amusement parks and free trolley rides are some of the features which the committee expects to arrange. It has also been decided to give every visiting sailor and officer a ride over the Columbia river highway, a lunch at Bonneville and a grand ball.

Lester W. Humphreys, chairman of the general reception committee, has decided not to go to San Francisco unless he is actually called upon, because he believes the coming of the fleet to Portland may be delayed several more weeks by the intended tour by President Wilson.

Coos Bay Committee Is to See Daniels Regarding Sub Base

Marshfield, Or., Aug. 29.—A. L. Martin, president of the Marshfield chamber of commerce, has named three Coos Bay men to meet Secretary of the Navy Daniels at Portland and interview him regarding the possibility of establishing a base for some portion of the Pacific coast branch of the navy. It is believed that Coos Bay would be a suitable place for a base for sub chasers or airplanes. The three men who will see Secretary Daniels are L. J. Simpson of North Bend, Postmaster Hugh McLain of Marshfield and Dr. E. E. Straw, former mayor of Marshfield, who recently returned from army service in France.

STRANGE DISEASE ATTACKING TROUT

Fungus Growth Destroying Small Fish at Bonneville Plant; Eats Away the Tails.

A strange tale of little trout without their tails was told by State Senator John Gill, Professor H. B. Torrey of Reed college and Richard W. Price, president of the Multnomah Anglers' club, following an inspection trip to the Bonneville hatchery Wednesday afternoon.

That disease is destroying thousands of the tiny trout and that it attacks them with a fungus growth which eats away the tail fins, is the substance of a report which is to be offered formally to Governor Olcott. The findings were confirmed by an inspection trip made by Price and H. B. Van Dusen, vice president of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, on the preceding day.

CAUSE OF DISEASE UNKNOWN
Although the cause of the disease is unknown, it is feared that the water of Tanner creek, which supplies the Bonneville hatchery, becomes too warm for the trout fry after the middle of summer and that the consequent sluggish condition of the little fish makes them easy prey to disease.

"We found that many of the 56,000 rainbow fry taken to the Nehalem watershed were infected, with little probability that more than a few would live," said Price. "Some 112,000 rainbow trout taken a month ago to Salmon river for planting were said to have had fewer infected fish, but as both the Nehalem and Salmon rivers are streams natural to cut-throat but not to salmon trout, it was feared few of them would survive."

MAY ABANDON HATCHERY
The inspecting committee has not reached a conclusion Thursday as to the desirability of recommending that the Bonneville hatchery be entirely abandoned for trout propagation and be used exclusively for the propagation of salmon, for which it is excellently adapted. It was said that a hatchery exclusively for trout fed by a colder stream than Tanner creek would, no doubt, be productive of larger results from the state game fund, which is created by license fees paid by the anglers of Oregon. To propagate the trout under adverse conditions that results in

the loss of a large proportion of them renders excessive the cost of maintaining the supply of trout in the much fished streams of Oregon, it was said.

Advertising Offices Of Local Firm Open At Chicago, Seattle

The movement for more extensive national advertising of Oregon and Northwest products in the eastern markets has prompted the Hall & Emory advertising agency of Portland to open offices at 440 South Dearborn street, Chicago, and the Times building, Seattle, according to an announcement made by George E. Hall this morning.

"Our firm," said Hall, "is the first advertising agency on the Pacific coast to open an eastern office. We realize that with constantly increasing production in all lines of merchandise and food products, and the desire on the part of many manufacturers and producers, to

reach the eastern market that Pacific coast agencies have been under a severe handicap, and unable to give advertisers adequate representation in the East."

The joint organization has been further strengthened by the services of Robert Armstrong of Chicago, who for years directed the policy of marketing of an Armour company product. Hall announced that Armstrong's services would be at the call of any Oregon manufacturer or producer who desires to reach the eastern market through advertising and merchandising campaigns.

Discontinue Sale of Tickets
Supplementary notices, asking that the sale of tickets be discontinued to points south of Santa Barbara on the coast line and Merced and Kerman on the Valley line of the Southern Pacific, were issued this morning by John M. Scott, general passenger agent of the Southern Pacific lines north of Ashland. Normal service has been restored to and from Oakland via the Shasta and Ogden routes.
