

ONE KILLED, ANOTHER HURT WHEN TRUCK GETS IN FRONT OF ENGINE

Victor C. Wallett Meets Death in Railroad Crossing Accident at Albany.

Albany, Aug. 29.—Victor C. Wallett, son of Mrs. Charles Wallett of Wells, was instantly killed late Wednesday when the wood truck he was driving was hit by the Yakima-Albany train at the North Albany crossing. His brother-in-law, J. R. Morley, escaped with slight injuries.

The train struck the rear wheel of the truck and knocked and drove it through a cattle guard north of the track. Both men were thrown off and three ribs were broken just above Wallett's heart, causing his death on the way to the hospital. Pieces of the truck were scattered 50 feet up the track. Morley said he did not see the train coming until they were fairly upon the track.

College Faculty Increased
Albany, Aug. 29.—(Special.)—A new school of commerce, embracing a two years' course, leading to the state examination for certified public accountants, will be opened up at Albany college this fall. Prof. J. J. McKnight, a member of the Ohio state board of accountancy, has accepted the chair of commerce and moved to Albany. Rev. O. T. Morgan, Ph. D., a graduate of Chicago university and holder of a master's degree at Drake university, will teach philosophy here this year.

Albany, Aug. 29.—The grand jury returned a "not true" bill against Mr. and Mrs. Jack Phillips, accused of stealing currency and Liberty bonds amounting to \$170 from John A. Carlson. Judge P. R. Kelly sentenced Henry Cole, 20, to a year in the penitentiary, but paroled him on recommendation of the district attorney.

Shoots Off Two Toes
Albany, Aug. 29.—Louis Berger, a young farmer working near Brownsville, lost the second and third toes from his left foot when a gun he was about to shoot was accidentally discharged. Young Berger was standing in the wagon, had his finger on the trigger of the gun and was about to draw up to shoot at a mark, when the horses jerked their heads.

Young Companion of Oregon Boy Guilty Of Killing An Officer

San Luis Obispo, Cal., Aug. 29.—(U. P.)—Seth Burt, 22, was convicted of first degree murder early today, following trial on charge of murdering David Morehouse, night watchman at Tamo Robles. The jury recommended life imprisonment.

The youth admitted, in a confession, that he shot the officer when Morehouse interfered while he and Hugh

Moore, 19 years old, Rogus river, (Oregon) boy, were robbing a store.

Trial of Moore as Burt's accomplice is to start Monday. The parents of the Oregon youth are here to fight for their son, declaring he is the victim of bad company, and that until he met Burt in Medford and ran away with him to California, he never showed criminal instincts.

Burt, in his confession, declared that he alone was responsible for the death of Morehouse.

O. A. C. Expects an Enrollment of 1000 Freshmen This Year

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Aug. 29.—Entrance credentials have passed the 400 mark at O. A. C. With few exceptions they are for freshman matriculation.

Credentials received one year ago were 135 and these were followed by a registration of 700 freshmen for the year. The number this year is 247 per cent increase over the number last year.

"It is almost certain," says W. A. Jensen, executive secretary, "that the freshman class this year will number at least 1000."

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Aug. 29.—One hundred free scholarships for veterans of the war have been offered by the Knights of Columbus committee on war activities, and O. A. C. is listed as one of the 41 institutions in which the scholarships may be used.

Elma, Wash., Aug. 29.—The tract of timber in the west end of Grays Harbor county was purchased by the new lumber company which incorporated in Elma last week. It will build a mill at Copalis Crossing. The new company is called the Hemlock Lumber company, and the incorporators are: Z. A. Toy of Aberdeen, president; M. H. Washington of Whites, vice president; J. E. Pinkham of Elma, secretary-treasurer.

Oakville, Wash., Aug. 29.—Alva Wolfe, an Oakville boy, has received his discharge and is now a guest of his sister, Mrs. Willis Bell. Young Wolfe volunteered on August 4, 1917, and was sent to France in May the next year. The first time he went over the top

was on June 4, and he was fighting the day the armistice was signed, after which he served in the army of occupation.
