

IRISH PARTISANS URGE REJECTION OF PEACE LEAGUE

Say Covenant Is un-American
and Would Perpetuate British
Tyranny and Oppression.

SENATE HEARS COMMITTEE

Three Members Make Appeal for
Freedom and Self-Determination
of Emerald Isle.

Washington, Aug. 30.—(U. P.)—Senator Chamberlain today received a telegram from the American Legion post in Portland, Or., asking him to take up with the department of justice the question of preventing the publication of the Ludendorff story in the Washington Post.

The Portland post pointed out that unless the publication is officially stopped some newspapers which have bought the book but decided not to publish it might be sued for breach of contract.

Washington, Aug. 30.—(I. N. S.)—Freedom and self-determination for Ireland were urged before the senate foreign relations committee today by Justice Daniel Cohan of the New York supreme court, and former Governor Edward Dunne of Illinois and Frank P. Walsh and Michael J. Ryan of Philadelphia, the three members of the Irish independence committee.

Judge Cohan urged the rejection of the League of Nations covenant by the senate. He asserted it was "un-American" and would "perpetuate British oppression and tyranny."

Signed by many prominent Irish-Americans, a memorial urging the rejection of the treaty of Versailles by the senate "as a direct violation of the principles on which the war was fought," was presented to the committee.

"Speaking on behalf of the great bulk of American citizens of Irish blood, who number more than 20,000,000 of our population, we are opposed to the proposed League of Nations for many reasons, all of which we believe vitally affect the interests of our country," Judge Cohan said. "We are opposed to the creation of any superstate, or combination of nations that will interfere with the independence of or with the sovereignty of the United States."

OPPOSED TO LEAGUE
"We are opposed to the League of Nations because it practically turns over to England the control of all the seas of the world and puts us in a position where our right to trade and to carry on commerce with the other peoples of mankind, is subject to interference by England at any moment, so that whenever her interests or her inclination required it, our commerce would be driven from the seas and we would be unable to carry on business except in our own country."

"We are asked under the proposed plan practically, to give up the Monroe Doctrine, under which our country has prospered as has no other country in the history of the world and under which peace and security have come to all the countries of the Western hemisphere and to enter into a scheme by which we would be compelled to take part in every quarrel of the nations of the world and permit them to decide for us any question of peace affecting the nations of the Western hemisphere."

TWO BIG EMPIRES FEARED
"We are asking not only to make the king of England and his successors permanent rulers over every third person on earth, but to make the mikado of Japan in the normal development of the conditions which we guarantee to him, the practical ruler over a like number of people."

"We, who promised self-determination to all peoples of the earth, are now asked to make permanent England's premeditation for all the peoples from whom she has taken away their liberties and over whom she insists upon ruling."

Walsh offered to submit "confidentially" to the committee the names of the men and women who had been in the session what transpired between him and his associates and President Wilson and the other American peace commissioners at Versailles when the "rights of Ireland were vainly being pressed there."

JOHNSON OBJECTS TO SECRECY
Senator Johnson of California objected to "any secrecy" or to any information Walsh gave the committee "being regarded as confidential in these days of open covenants openly arrived at."

It was then decided that anything Walsh had to communicate he should relate publicly.

"We want to get at the whole truth of what went on over there and we want the American people to know all about it," Senator Johnson said.

Walsh said he would be glad to "lay everything before the public."

"We were not welcome at the Hotel Carlton at Paris," Walsh added. "Unofficially its doors were opened to us, but when we got inside those we met showed a marked disposition to dodge, to jump out of the windows, to wear out seven pairs of shoes trying to keep up with them."

For Hoarding Food**

Seattle, Wash., Aug. 30.—(U. P.)—Henry J. Mignerey, the largest exclusive potato broker in Seattle, was bound over to the federal grand jury on an alleged food hoarder by United States Commissioner McClennan at noon today. His was the first of 10 alleged food hoarding cases disposed of this week. His bond was fixed at \$500.

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**FORGERY IS ALLEGED
AGAINST CASHIER OF
STERLING, COLO., BANK**

Earl W. Hopkins Indicted for Obtaining \$350 From Ladd & Tilton on Spurious Paper.

An indictment charging forgery of a letter of credit was returned by the grand jury Saturday against Earl W. Hopkins, formerly assistant cashier of the Logan county national bank of Sterling, Colo.

Hopkins came to Portland July 1, and presented a letter of credit at the Ladd & Tilton bank purporting to be drawn on the bank of Sterling, in which he had been employed. He was allowed to draw a check for \$350 against it. The letter of credit turned out to be a forgery, and Hopkins was arrested in Chicago through operatives of the W. J. Burns International Detective agency. He will be returned to Portland for trial.

**Stock Range Short;
Many Selling Stock
No Cause for Panic**

Pendleton, Aug. 30.—The continued dry weather has made range stock short, and complaint is heard from stock men in many parts of the country that they fear shortage of feed for the fall and winter. The larger stock men, however, do not see in the outlook cause for panic for the selling of stock is being done by some.

In the Camas Prairie section south of Pendleton it is said there will not be harvested more than a 40 per cent crop. This estimate is probably too low, however. The same condition as to range and hay holds in the country south of Camas Prairie in Grant county.

MULTNOMAH CO. GRAND JURY MAKES JUNE TERM REPORT

Returned 115 True Bills; Two
Cases Referred to Incoming
Jury; Examined 384 Witnesses

REPORT ON INSTITUTIONS

Recommends New Quarters for
Frazier Home and More Home-
like Surroundings for Kiddies.

Operation and management of county institutions are highly praised in the final report of summer term of the Multnomah county grand jury, submitted Saturday to Presiding Judge Gatens. The condition of the county farm is made the subject of especial commendation in the report of the jurors, who extend their congratulations to Mrs. Singleton, the matron, on the excellent appearance of the patients and the institution.

The county farm was subjected to a rigid investigation due to the charges of neglect of one of the patients which had been presented to the jury by Attorney John W. Kaste.

Attention is drawn to the shabby condition of the Fraser home and recommendation made that as soon as funds are available new quarters be provided for that institution. It is pointed out that the children have neither playgrounds, libraries, workshops or any other means of furnishing amusement, and that the main building is old, bare and unhomelike.

The report, signed by W. W. McAllister, foreman, is as follows:

"We, the members of the grand jury for June, 1919, term of court, respectfully submit the following report:

"We have carefully examined all matters that have been brought to our attention and have returned 115 true bills and 17 not true bills. We have made eight investigations in which we found no cause for indictment and have referred two cases to the incoming jury for consideration. We have examined 384 witnesses.

COUNTY INSTITUTIONS
We have also visited the county jail, the Multnomah farm, the Cedars and the Fraser Home for Juveniles. With regard to the three institutions mentioned, we find that the buildings and equipment are modern and that the management is everything that could be desired. At the county farm were between 200 and 300 indigent persons, 60 of whom were bedridden and entirely helpless. We found them all cleanly and well cared for, and wish to congratulate the matron, Mrs. Singleton, upon the splendid appearance of the institution. We were also gratified to find the county farm, consisting of 197 acres, intelligently and successfully operated by County Farmer Smith.

"We found the Cedars managed in an orderly and competent manner, as was the county jail, which is under the direct supervision of Sheriff T. M. Hurlburt.

NEEDS OF FRAZER HOME
The Fraser home was found scrupulously clean, so far as paint and soap and water could make it, and we are satisfied that the material wants of the children are taken care of. However, we most earnestly recommend that new quarters be provided as promptly as possible.

Whipped at the county farm we found verandas, libraries, lounging rooms and a grove several acres in extent for the inmates, at the Fraser home we found absolutely nothing for the entertainment or instruction of the children. There is no a tree, nor a patch of grass, not a workshop, nor a gymnasium; not a library, nor a playground; nothing but hot sun, dust and a dull cresscut saw for exercise. Most of these children are detained through no fault of their own, but because broken homes have cast them adrift in the world. We sincerely hope that the county can provide more homelike surroundings for them and suggest that the Big Brothers club or similar institutions could do a good work by providing means of entertainment and instruction which these children need badly."

FERN HOBBS IS BACK HOME AFTER ONE YEAR SPENT IN WAR WORK

Duties Were Connected With the
Casualty Service of the Amer-
ican Red Cross in France.

Miss Fern Hobbs, looking quite military in her uniform with two service stripes on her left sleeve, a little thinner after her year of Red Cross work in France, returned to Portland Saturday night.

The sight of Portland once more and the members of her family who availed upon her immediately after her long trip, kept Miss Hobbs from any interview beyond expression of her happiness at being home again.

Miss Hobbs, who was formerly secretary to Governor Oswald West, had been in France for a year where she had been in the casualty service of the American Red Cross, helping to locate relatives of wounded soldiers, notifying them of the condition of their boys, and straightening out the Red Cross records of the war casualties.

After closing up her work in Paris, Miss Hobbs visited Italy before returning home, stopping at Genoa, Naples and Ancona. She also went to Washington, D. C., after landing in the United States to deliver over the Paris records of the Red Cross.

STRIKE IS OVER; TRAINS RUNNING

Los Angeles Trainmen Heed Gov-
ernment Warning and Opera-
tion of Traffic Resumes.

San Francisco, Aug. 30.—(U. P.)—California's rail strike had ended today. Action taken in Los Angeles a scant seven hours before the government's ultimatum expired made it unnecessary for the government to put into effect its threat to operate the trains beginning at 7 a. m. today. Every preparation had been made by the railroad administration, however, to run the trains and hundreds of deputies

had been sworn in to protect property. Governor Stephens had come to the assistance of the rail administration and had called upon all mayors, sheriffs and other peace officials to aid the government.

The Los Angeles strikers voted reluctantly to return to their posts. The mass meeting lasted three hours and was one of the most stormy labor sessions in the history of the state.

At the office of William Sproule, district manager for the rail administration, it was said that every effort would be made today to move perishable freight. Passenger service will be normal within a few hours, it was said. The Shore Line Limited left for Los Angeles at 8 o'clock. Seven trains will make the run today from San Francisco and Oakland to Los Angeles.

The strikers on the Pacific Electric out of Los Angeles have not returned to their work. It was to support these men that the sympathetic strike of rail men was called without sanction of their international officers.

A report received in Paris says that the Serbians are mobilizing their forces in Banat and Temesvar.

CAPITAL STRIKE IS SUGGESTED

S. Davies Warfield Utters
Warning on Behalf of Rail-
road Owners.

Washington, Aug. 30.—(U. P.)—Railroad capital as well as labor may "strike," unless congress makes provision for it in planning for the future of the roads, S. Davies Warfield suggested today in a statement supplementary to a recent testimony before the house interstate commerce committee. Warfield is author of the railroad plan sponsored by the

National Association of Owners of Railroad Securities.

Representing large numbers of banks, trust companies, insurance companies and individual investors that own railroad securities, Warfield said that unless congress makes the railroad investments sufficiently attractive, capital will desert the railroads for more profitable fields and leave the roads without the credit necessary to their operation and development.

Warfield said his statements were in advocacy of his plan to guarantee a return of 6 per cent on the amount of money they have actually put into the properties. This, he pointed out, will mean reasonable returns for the lines without watered stock, and a small dividend for the over-capitalized lines. All returns above 6 per cent are to be divided between the public in the form of lower rates, labor and capital equally.

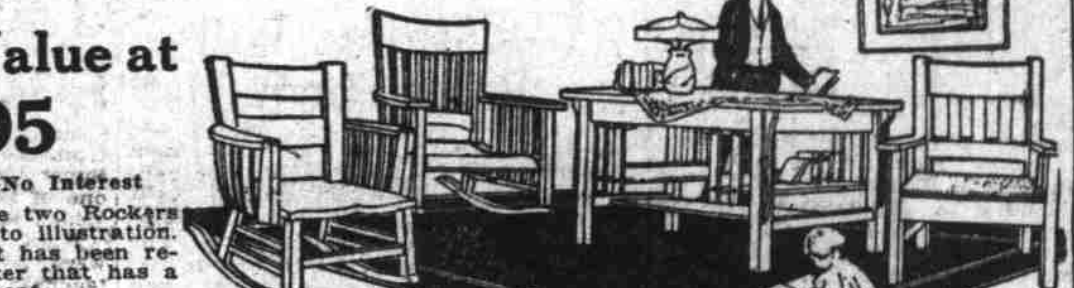
