

LABOR DAY WILL BE OBSERVED IN CITY BY PARADE

David M. Ellis Selected as Grand
Marshal for Pageant to Be
Staged on Monday Morning.

SUNDAY IS DAY FOR OUTINGS

Various Unions Plan Picnic at
Crystal Lake Park, Where Sing-
gle Tax Will Be Discussed.

Organized labor in Portland is in for a big time in commemoration of September 1 as Labor day, and will show its colors in what is planned as the largest and most pretentious labor parade yet attempted.

These plans, formulated through the cooperation of practically all local unions, have been turned over to a special committee of workers, which has named David M. Ellis as grand marshal, with eight assistants, who will start the parade promptly at 10 a. m.

Patriotism will be the keynote of labor's undertaking and the national colors will lend tone to the parade of several thousand workers. Each union will be in charge of a captain and lieutenants and advertising will be eliminated.

OUTINGS ON SUNDAY

But labor's sway will start on Sunday, when outings are planned by several union organizations, including the gathering of teamsters at Crystal Lake Park, where a picnic with sports, dancing and oratory to give it life, will be held.

By invitation of the teamsters the Oregon Single Tax league will hold at the same time and place an outing in commemoration of the eightieth anniversary of the birth of Henry George, the apostle of the principle of taxing the full rental value of land. J. R. Herman, manager of the league, will address the teamsters and later the league members.

ROUTE OF THE PARADE

The parade of labor unions Monday will assemble at Twelfth and Jefferson streets and will march north on Twelfth to Morrison, east on Morrison to Park, south on Park to Madison, east on Madison to Broadway, north on Broadway to Pine, east on Pine to Sixth, south on Sixth to Morrison, east on Morrison to Fifth, north on Fifth to Pine, east on Pine to Fourth, south on Fourth to Madison, west on Madison to the Park blocks, where the parade will disband.

In the afternoon there will be entertainment at the Rose City speedway under labor auspices. Frank Hannan is chairman of the committee of arrangements.

Labor day in the United States originated in New York city in 1882, when the Knights of Labor paraded on the first Monday in September. In 1884 another parade was given, and it was resolved to make them an annual event. The movement spread throughout the country. Colorado in 1887 made the first Monday in September a legal holiday under the title of Labor day. Other states quickly followed. It became a national holiday by act of congress in 1909.

Trade Unions of Klamath Falls Plan Big Labor Holiday

Klamath Falls, Aug. 30.—Labor day is to be fittingly celebrated in Klamath Falls this year, according to the local trade unions, who are getting together to make the day a big one. A tug-of-war, races, a big parade, dancing, addresses by able speakers and other entertainment are being arranged. Miss Ester Uerlings has been chosen for the seat of honor on the big labor float in the parade.

Local business men have donated many valuable prizes to be given away on Labor day. The prizes will be given by lottery at the dance in the evening. On each dance ticket is a number and the holder of the numbers chosen at the dance will get the prizes.

RED CROSS CANTEEN AT UNION STATION CLOSES OCTOBER 1

Wednesday Evening Canteen
Girls and Red Cross Band Will
Be Reviewed at Armory.

The Red Cross canteen at the Union station and the blue gown canteen girls will disappear October 1, according to an announcement of officers of the organization who have been in charge of the canteen service. The number of returning soldiers and sailors by that time will be reduced to a minimum and the need for the canteen will not exist. It is thought advisable, however, to continue the work of the canteen through the visit of the Pacific fleet.

Throughout the entire local history of the canteen the workers have given their services without pay, working on regular schedules and faithfully performing their duties during the war. The number of the war excitement had died. It is estimated that the staff of 100 or more girls have looked after the needs of more than 300,000 of the service men who have passed through the city. The men have been furnished with only with meals and theatre tickets and "smokes" and lodging, but they have received endless numbers of small personal services from the canteen staff which have made it less difficult to become reestablished in civil life once more. The canteen staff has been called upon many times for emergency service in the case of sick soldiers who have required expert and immediate attention.

Wednesday evening has been chosen for the inspection of the Red cross band and canteen girls at the armory. The mayor and city commissioners, the county commissioners and officers of the Oregon National Guard will participate in this ceremony, and the public is invited.

On Friday evening 100 sailors arrived at the canteen at the Union station and were met by the four canteen girls on duty, the Misses Vera Kaufman, Edith Woodman, Betty Grutze and Myrtle Travillon. The men were escorted to the Imperial hotel, where supper was served, and then they were taken by Ferdinand E. Reed to the Y. M. C. A. for a swim. All members of the party were to be sent to San Francisco to form a medical corps unit which will eventually be assigned to the Pacific fleet. They had been recruited in the middle states for this duty. They were under command of Lieutenant Commander R. G. Davis, formerly in the recruiting service of the Northwest.

RETURN OF SCHOOL DAYS IS NEAR FOR 35,000 CHILDREN

Portland Youngsters Soon Must
Give Up Freedom of Vacation
and Face Frowning Three R's.

SCHOOL MACHINERY READY

And, Gee, Listen Kids—There's
180 New Teachers, 37 More
Rooms and in Apple Pie Order.

On Tuesday next for some 35,000 Portland school children summer vacation days will be over. Thirty-five thousand children must wash their faces, put on clean frocks, dig their old books out of the attic, where they have reposed for the last two months, and hie them to school once more.

From the seashore and the mountains they are coming home to join the vast influx of the schoolrooms, to talk over what they have done during their vacation and where they have been and about their new teacher and whether they will like her or not.

The school machinery is all in readiness. Never since the beginning of the war has everything been in such apple pie order for the reception of teachers and students as this year, school officials declare.

300 TRANSFERS

Nearly 300 new teachers will be on the job and the transfers involve about 200. Thirty-seven new rooms will be available through the building of portables, one at Laurelhurst, eight at Dixon place, one at Jefferson, one at East, five at Edna, eight at Hawthorne-Buckman, eight at Hosford, one at Mount Tabor, three at Rose City Park and one at Kellogg. Modifications have also been made at Jefferson high school, Franklin high, High School of Commerce, Vernors and Hawthorne schools, besides extensive improvements at Benson Polytechnic and the Girls' Polytechnic school.

Supplies, both general, janitors', sewing and cooking, have been delivered, and manual training supplies will be completed within a week. Furniture will be in readiness with which to equip the new portables as soon as it is seen what sized children will be housed in them.

TEACHERS MEET SATURDAY

The first teachers' meeting will be held Saturday, September 6, at 10 a. m. in Lincoln high school, following the custom of last year of not calling the teachers together previous to the opening of school. At this meeting teachers will be given opportunity to meet the superintendents and the work for the year will be outlined.

Tuesday will be devoted solely to enrollment in the schools, actual class work not commencing until Wednesday. With war activities ended and with a minimum of outside interests to detract from the main work of the school room Superintendent Grout looks forward to one of the most productive years in the school history.

Rural schools will not open until a week later, September 8, but the rural teachers' meeting will be held Saturday the same day as that of the Portland teachers, in the courthouse, when a course of study will be worked out and distributed among the teachers, together with an outline of the first months' work. All the positions in the county have been filled and there are no vacancies in the rural schools.

Chicago Landlord Lets Tenants Fix Own Rental Rates

Chicago, Aug. 30.—Max Baumgartner, Chicago landlord, refuses to be classed as a profiteer and is putting the question of rents for his apartments squarely up to his tenants—letting them fix their own rent rates—thereby satisfying themselves and keeping him out of the profiteering class. The following letter sent by Baumgartner to each of his tenants presents his solution of the high cost of living:

"To my tenants: Dear Sirs—Having gone over the matter carefully I have come to the conclusion that the premises you are living in do not return me a sufficient income to insure me a fair return on my investment. In order not to be called a profiteer I will not raise your rent, but have decided to let the public decide what the flats are worth. Therefore I wish to inform you that I want possession of the premises not later than October 1, 1919. In the meantime I shall invite bids from responsible flat seekers and intend to rent to the highest responsible bidder. I realize

that this procedure is unusual, but at present conditions are unusual, so I think it best for all concerned to let the public set the price of my flats. In case you should not be one of the successful bidders I will pay for the removal of such coal as you have at present on hand, not to exceed \$1 per ton. Not a tenant has kicked so far on this offer, according to Baumgartner.

Winlock Soldier Wins D. S. Cross

Winlock, Wash., Aug. 30.—Walter W. Wall, member of the famous second division of the A. E. F., has returned to Winlock from overseas, wearing a distinguished service cross, and bearing a citation for extraordinary bravery in action. Wall went through the thick of the fighting at Chateau-Thierry, St. Mihiel, Rheims and Sedan campaigns and escaped without a wound. Moreover, he never once had to answer to sick call. He won his citation and cross as a result of his volunteering to go for water, returning to his own lines through a veritable hail of machine gun fire, which he escaped by dodging from one shell crater to another.

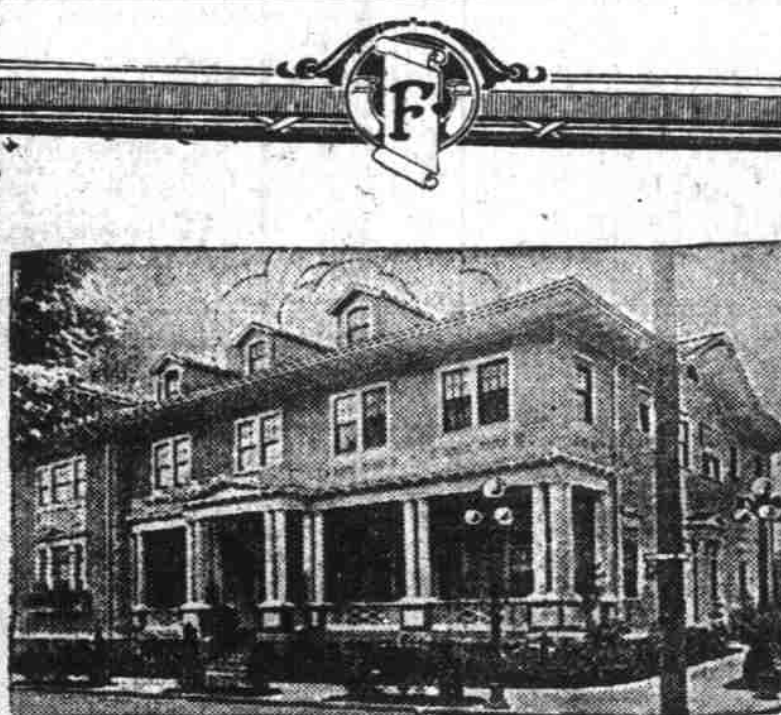
