T ONDON .- (By Mail.) - Georges Carpentier, the French heavyweight champion and world's championship aspirant, has got to hurry up if he wants to beat Jack Dempsey, the American, or else he will

find himself in the discard. This was told the United Press today by Carpentier's latest victim, Dick Smith, former light heavyweight champion of Great Britain. Smith was knocked out by the Frenchman in the eighth round in their recent fight in Paris, but despite this, the Britisher says Car-pentier is "slipping" and that if he doesn't hurry up he will be a "has-

"Carpentier has one punch, an uppercut. But I don't think it is anything to get scared about. I felt it several times and honestly believe that if he hadn't fouled me below the belt in the seventh round I

would have beaten him," said Smith. "He has slowed up considerably on his foot work, but is still able to flash his hands. But up to the time he knocked me out his punches didn't have any great force. I believe Joe Beckett, the British heavyweight champion, will stand up to him for 20 rounds. At the same time I think Carpentier will stay the limit and get the decision. His boxing ability will win for him. However, it is an even money bet as to who will win. Beckett can knock him out, but whether he would is guesswork. Beckett is a very dangerous man. I beat him once and think I can repeat. "In my figh' with Carpentier I nearly won twice with a one-two
