There are two reasons for the late advances in the price of eggs, not only at Portland but igenerally along the Pacific coast. There is to be sure, an actual shortage of freshly laid stock, and as the public is demanding the best there is, not a sufficient supply is available to fill requirements, and this forces values upward. Cold storage men are withdrawing their supplies with eagerness at this time. Little is being sold as storage goods; the nominal sales of what are really called storage being from 54 @ 58c a dozen, the latter for selected stock. The big interests have much to gain by reason of the advances being forced in fresh stock, in fact, they were the first ones to quote such advances. They stand to make millions of dollars more out of their icehouse speculation. more out of their icehouse speculation.


