"This document brings out all the principles for which America stands. America's principles were written into ples were written into this treaty that never were written into another treaty before. In spirit and essence this treaty is an American document. FINDS WAR SUBSTITUTE

"One of the things that America has had most at heart has been to substitute for war discussions of peace. The extent and purpose of the document are expressed in the member states agreeing not to go to war until they have either arbitrated or discussed their matters in controversy.

That is the central principle of some treaties, all of which were confirmed by the senate of the United States. We have these treaties with Great Britain. and many other sovereign nations."

The president said this principle of arbitration is a sovereign American principle. Carried out as it is in the League of Nations covenant it will absolutely prevent war, the president said. He then outlined at length the manner in which any nation would be boycotted if it went to war.


