

ENGINEER READY FOR SUBMITTING CHANNEL REPORT

Portland's Request for 35-Foot Channel From City to Sea is to Be Sent to Washington.

Colonel Slattery, in Charge of Work, Says He Has Treated Project With Fairness.

Report of Colonel J. R. Slattery, U. S. engineers, on the request of Portland interests for a 35-foot channel from this city to the sea, will be ready for submission to Washington by the end of the present month, it was announced today.

For several months the engineering department of this district has been making a thorough investigation of the channel conditions, and the field notes on the survey are now nearly ready. The investigation of maritime commerce conditions is also being featured by Colonel Slattery in his report.

Letters have also been written to some of the leading shipping firms of the country, requesting their opinion on the project for a deeper ship channel. Among the larger firms to reply to the inquiry is the Blue Funnel Line. The first statement to arrive at a just conclusion is that it is a 35-foot channel to Portland would not doubt tend to increase the shipping business of the Columbia river district by attracting to it vessels of heavy tonnage.

It is my desire to treat the channel improvement project in a manner which will be fair to the people of Portland and fair to the government," said Colonel Slattery. "To arrive at a just conclusion I am making an exhaustive study of all material factors entering into the question, such as extent of service to be rendered and cost which the study should be assessed per ton to justify the government in the improvements."

"To get at these figures I have made up a chart which shows shipping conditions from the year 1914 up to the present time. All costs which have been incurred by the government in building jetties and maintaining channels are accordingly charged to the government's account in order to arrive at a conclusion on the government's viewpoint."

"My investigations have shown that there are some real advantages in favor of the port. It is our desire to carry on harbor improvement rather than abandon it."

Colonel Slattery says that rebuilding some of the south jetties at the mouth of the Columbia river will be necessary in the not distant future. The north jetty will also have to be extended. "Channel conditions at the mouth of the Columbia river, where there is 42 feet of water, are ideal, however. In fact, they are so good at this time that even if the powerful dredge Chinook, now at Charleston, were here there would be nothing for it to do in the way of channel work at the mouth of the Columbia," said Colonel Slattery.
