

GREATEST FAIR IN OREGON'S HISTORY TO OPEN MONDAY

All Departments Will Have More and Better Exhibits Than Ever Before; 20 Counties to Show.

HORSE SHOW BIG FEATURE

Government Exhibits Promise to Be Interesting and Racing Card Will Be Best Yet Staged.

For the convenience of readers who desire headquarters and a meeting place at the state fair, the Journal has secured booth 22, in the main building, in charge of J. F. Langner and Miss Louise Heuser. Visitors to this booth will see an interesting exhibit of the "make-up" of a daily newspaper.

Salem, Sept. 20.—In announcing the special days that are all in readiness for the fifty-eighth annual Oregon state fair, which opens here Monday, A. H. Lea, secretary for the state fair board, declared today that the fair this year will be the greatest and best state exposition ever held in the West.

"All of the departments will have more and better exhibits than ever before in the history of the fair," he said, "and the fair as a whole will easily surpass all previous shows. More than 20 counties will be represented by agricultural exhibits, and the livestock show will be both greater and better than any in the past."

The agricultural section of the large government exhibit will be a special feature in the agricultural department. It will be accompanied by expert demonstrators and lecturers and will be exceptionally educational. There will be an immense machinery exhibit. Twenty tractors are entered, and each day demonstrations in plowing, harrowing, seeding and rolling will be given. Every bit of space in the old machinery pavilion has been appropriated by the automobile show, and a colossal display of industrial exhibits is promised.

HORSE SHOW TO BE BEST

For lovers of horses the horse show, which will be held on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday evenings, will be the leading attraction. Horses have been entered from California, Washington, Oregon and British Columbia, and it will be the greatest display of horse-flesh ever shown in the Northwest. The Portland Hunt club will take a leading part in the show. It is expected that record for high jumping will be shattered.

"The state fair this year should surpass anything that the state has attempted in this line in the past," declared Governor Withycombe, "and Oregon is having a most prosperous year. In every line of industry this prosperity is felt. This applies to agriculture, horticulture and livestock development as well. Oregon farmers have been paying more and more attention to the scientific development of their products. The same may be said of horticulturists and livestock men. Oregon's purebred livestock has attained an international reputation."

"VICTORY SHOW" FEATURE

"With these conditions existing, people who are interested in these various lines of endeavor should find bigger and better exhibits in every department at the fair this year, and as educational features these departments should be of immense value. I understand that the general program for amusements and entertainments will be of a high standard and I believe in every way our great show will warrant as heavy an attendance as may possibly be given."

One of the big features of this year's fair will be the "Victory show" of the United States government, which is composed of trophies captured on European battlefields by American soldiers, and exhibits from the departments of agriculture, war, navy, commerce, interior and labor.

Of transcendent interest will be the exhibit of the war trophies. These trophies, which include hundreds of articles, from a big trench motor to a German mess kit, have just arrived in this country, and have never before been on exhibition. The captured enemy equipment include machine guns, anti-tank guns, hand grenades, helmets of several kinds, trench periscopes, smoke pots, and many other articles used by the Germans. By their side will be shown the tools used by the Americans. A remarkable set of 32 enlarged photographs will be shown by the war department, selected as being the best of 20,000 taken by the army photographers in France.

NAVY DISPLAY IS BIG

Prominent in the navy display will be

complete exposition models of fighting ships of the navy, as well as five small models showing the application of camouflage. The exposition models were never out of Washington until last year, and this will be the first year of the display of the camouflage models. The navy will show hundreds of articles of equipment including the Y-gun for the launching of depth charges, big torpedoes, and their trucks, projectiles of various sizes, radio telephones, clothing worn in submarines and machine guns. The marine corps will also have a large display.

The forest service will show the best methods of lumbering and forestry; the bureau of public roads will demonstrate how modern improved highways are constructed; the bureau of markets will show marketing by parcel post, grading fruits and vegetables; the bureau of raising cattle, swine, poultry and other livestock; the bureau of plant industry, the production of corn, the various cereal crops, forage crops and fruit; the bureau of entomology will deal with destructive insects and methods of preventing damage from them; the bureau of soils will exhibit specimens of the more common soils found in the United States, and the weather bureau will deal with its work in forecasting the weather.

The department of commerce will show on different circuits the work of the bureau of standards, the bureau of fisheries, the steamboat inspection service and the bureau of lighthouses. On one circuit the thrilling work of the coast guard service of the navy department will be demonstrated. The new Coliseum will be dedicated on Monday evening at 8 o'clock and special services will be held, in conjunction with the dedicatory exercises for the late Governor Withycombe and the soldiers who helped win the war. Luring his lifetime Governor Withycombe probably did more for the agricultural and livestock industries than any man in the state, and it was at the suggestion of Governor Olcott that Monday, the opening day of the fair, was set apart in his honor. Soldiers in uniform will be admitted free to the grounds on Monday.

The services will be of a patriotic character. Governor Ben W. Olcott, Judge Wallace McCamant and Judge George A. Stapleton of Portland; Chester Moore, private secretary of the late Governor Withycombe; F. L. Campbell, president of the University of Oregon, and W. J. Kerr, president of the Oregon Agricultural college, will deliver addresses.

WOMEN TO HAVE DAY

Tuesday, the day set apart for the women's organizations and the dairy-men of the state, will be observed by special programs arranged by organizations representing each. Wednesday, Salem's population will pay homage to the fair. Portland's people and the Elks will hold sway Thursday, and Friday will be the day of the Willamette valley and the Good Roads enthusiasts will hold forth. Saturday, the closing day, will be celebrated by the manufacturers and the grangers of the state.

An excellent racing program has been prepared for the week. Probably the

feature of the program will be the 2:08 pace, for which there is a purse of \$2000. It is scheduled for Wednesday afternoon, and the fast horses that will participate in the event are: Valentine Jr., Daisy D, Little Bernice, Mack Fitzsimmons and Tillamook Maid. Other fast horses that will race during the week are Dr. Dyre, Lou Hal, May Day Hall, Great Ella, Surety, Bonkin, James Oliver, Lady Tango, Vesta Vernon and Bull Hale.

Running races are scheduled for Monday afternoon and auto races Saturday afternoon.

Besides Tomasin's famous Italian band of New York, which will be the official band this year, music will be furnished by the Elks, Shriners and Multnomah Guard bands.

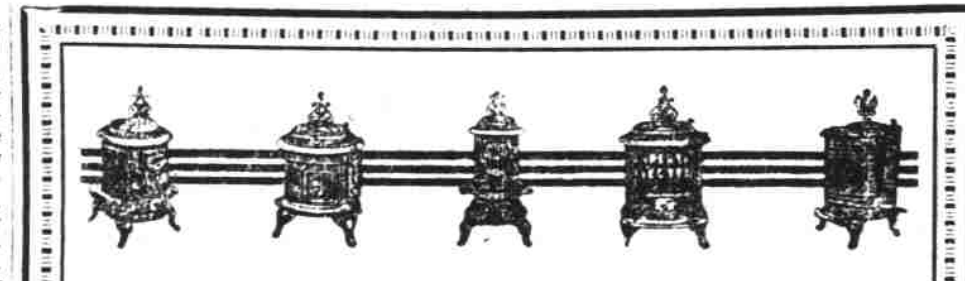
Captain Pederson and Sons Found Guilty of Abusing Ship's Crew

New York, Sept. 20.—(I. N. S.)—Captain Adolph C. Pederson, master of the American barkentine Pucko and his two sons, Adolph E. and Leonard R. Pederson, mates on the same vessel, were today found guilty by a jury in the United States district court of mistreating the crew and imprisoning them without just cause. Last Monday the captain and Adolph were acquitted of a murder charge. The trio will be sentenced Monday.

Captain Pederson is known to a number of pilots and shipping men of Portland, with whom he became acquainted during visits of the barkentine Pucko to this port in the lumber trade. The vessel was in port the last time about two years ago. Pederson's home is at San Francisco.
