

RAGE HAIRED LAD TO REPUBLICANS

Japanese Diplomat Says Outbreaks Against His People Are Inspired by Politicians.

Tokio, Sept. 20.—(U. P.)—"Keep cool!"

That was the advice given his countrymen by Kenzo Adachi, the "Colonel House" of Viscount Kato and credited as one of Japan's shrewdest politicians, when he returned from a tour of Europe and the United States.

Outbreaks against Japan now occurring regularly in the United States, he said, were merely for political effect, with the presidential election in mind. The Republicans in the senate, he said, do not represent the majority of Americans, and the senate foreign relations committee's Siantung amendment will not be accepted by the senate.

Adachi reminded the Japanese that Americans do not speak frankly. He said for Irish independence, Adachi said for the Japanese government to consider it "would be diplomatically preposterous."

City Officials Flee From Drumwright to Escape Fury of Mob

Cushing, Okla., Sept. 23.—(I. N. S.)—Mayor Nicodemus and several of the officials of Drumwright, Okla., fled to this place to escape the fury of a mob which late Monday took possession of the town. All wires to Drumwright, according to the telegraph companies, have been taken over or cut by the mob.

The mob organized in sympathy with telephone strikers, and after a picket line had been struck by an officer, threats of lynchings were made. The mayor and other officials were given until 10 o'clock Tuesday morning to resign. Before that hour, however, they had escaped from the town, and were a part of the night in jail for their own protection.

Portland Men Fined Following Wild Ride

Salem, Sept. 23.—R. Bailey, II. A. Field and Tom Poley, all of Portland, were arrested on charge of disorderly conduct, making vinegar when they ran wild in a red automobile at the State Fair grounds camp, endangering the lives of campers. They pleaded guilty in justice court this morning and were fined \$25 each. This was the only upward incident in the first day of the state fair.

Portland Attorney Is Admitted to Bar

Salem, Sept. 23.—Edgar Freed of Portland was today permanently admitted to practice of law in Oregon on an order issued by the supreme court. Permits to practice in Oregon for the probationary period were granted to Oscar G. Larson of Silverton, who comes in on a Montana certificate, and Ansel C. Jones of Portland, admitted on a certificate from Indiana.

CHICAGO ROBBERS GET \$234,000 Intended for Payroll of Standard Oil Co. of Indiana, on Whiting Platform.

Chicago, Sept. 23.—(U. P.)—Three Chicagoans, accidentally trapped, confessed today to a robbery of \$234,000 from the mails. Officers recovered \$93,620 of the loot and went in search of the remainder when the prisoners told where it was cached. With the aid of a postal clerk the men exchanged pouches at Whiting, Ind. last Thursday, taking the pouch containing \$234,000 to meet the payroll of the Standard Oil company of Indiana.

The men held are Leo and Walter Filipkovich and John S. Weljak. Weljak is a mail clerk and is implicated in alleged confessions of the men who prepared the fake mail pouch and arranged matters so the one containing the money could be identified by Philip Kovack when tossed from the train at Whiting.

Automobile Thieves Get Jail Sentences; Parole Ineffective

In the future automobile thieves are going to be demanding \$10 as the minimum sentence. Judge James Monday, as he sentenced George Davis and C. W. Whitlister to 20 days each in the county jail. Both men had pleaded guilty to theft of several automobiles.
