NEW STATE ROAD CONTRACTS TO BE LET OCTOBER 10

More Than 174 Miles of Grading and 35 Miles of Macadamizing to Be Provided For.

LIST OF JOBS NAMED
Nineteen Counties Are Included in Program; Construction of Six Bridges Planned.

Salem, Sept. 25.—Contracts for the grading of 174.5 miles of state highway and the macadamizing of 35.5 miles of highway will be awarded by the state highway commission at its next monthly meeting in Portland, which is scheduled for October 10. Six bridges and several crossings and trestles will also be awarded to contractors by the commission at this meeting. The list of jobs to be considered at this time includes the following, segregated as to counties:

Baker county—Baker-Cornucopia highway, Baker-Middle bridge section, 7.9 miles of gravel surfacing.
Clatsop and Douglas counties—Myrtle Creek-Hoehling highway, Remote-Camas valley section, Unit No. 1, 6.1 miles grading; Unit No. 2, 8.1 miles grading.
Work in Klamath
Klamath county—Algonia section, 8.9 miles grading and macadam; Klamath Falls-Dairy section, 13.9 miles grading and macadam; Klamath Falls-Merrill section, 14.7 miles grading and graveling; Merrill-California line section, 12.8 miles grading and macadam.
Lake county—Lakeside-Crooked Creek section, 11.1 miles grading and graveling; Lakeside-south section, 1.8 miles grading and graveling.
Marion county—Pacific highway, 4 miles south of Salem; Bonner Hill and Wain Hill section, 1.2 miles grading.
Grading for 25 Miles
Morrow county—Oregon-Washington highway, Heppner-Gilliam county line section, 25 miles grading.
Wasco county—Columbia river highway, Mosier-Howers section, 8 miles grading; Bowas-The Dalles section, 8 miles grading.
Wheeler and Grant counties—John Day highway, Unit No. 2, Service creek-Valdes ranch, 12.5 miles grading; Unit No. 3, Service creek-Valdes ranch, 12 miles grading; Unit No. 4, Service creek-Valdes ranch, 11.5 miles grading.
Clackamas county—One 180-foot reinforced concrete arch over Sucker creek on the Oregon City-Dawson section of the Pacific highway; one wooden trestle 240 feet long over Tryon creek near Oswego, requiring approximately 40 cubic yards class "B" concrete and 100,000 feet lumber.
Bridges to Be Built
Gilliam county—One bridge over Willow creek near Heppner Junction; one crossing over the O.W. R. & N. at Heppner Junction.
Morrow county—One crossing over the O.W. R. & N. near Messner.
Jackson county—One crossing over the Southern Pacific railway near Toledo.
Polk and Yamhill—Three bridges and two culverts on the Amity-Holmes Gap section of the west side highway.
Douglas county—One reinforced concrete bridge on the Pacific highway over Sand creek near Lewis.
Lincoln county—One timber trestle over Depot slough on the Corvallis-Nemah highway near Toledo.

SALEM PHEZ COMPANY TO CONSTRUCT MODERN COLD STORAGE PLANT

Work to Be Commenced Soon as Materials Can Be Obtained; Completed in Spring.

Salem, Sept. 25.—A modern cold storage plant, to cost approximately \$165,000, will be erected on property adjoining the present Phez plant on South Commercial and Trade streets, according to an announcement made by the Phez company of this city. The building will be three-story, concrete affair, fireproof and one of the largest cold storage plants in the entire state. Work on the structure will be started as soon as material can be secured and it is expected to have the plant in operation by early next spring. This plant is expected to provide storage space for the various canneries now operating in Salem as well as for the fruits and berries handled by the Phez company in the production of their fruit juices and jams.
The importance of the industry developed by the Phez company since its organization five years ago can best be realized when it is understood that between 250 and 300 people are now employed in the plant here, as against 25 five years ago.
Stop Crossing Proposed
Salem, Sept. 25.—The Southern Pacific Railroad company has filed with the public service commission an application for permission to create a stop crossing at Helman street in the city of Ashland.

The company is capitalized at \$100,000.

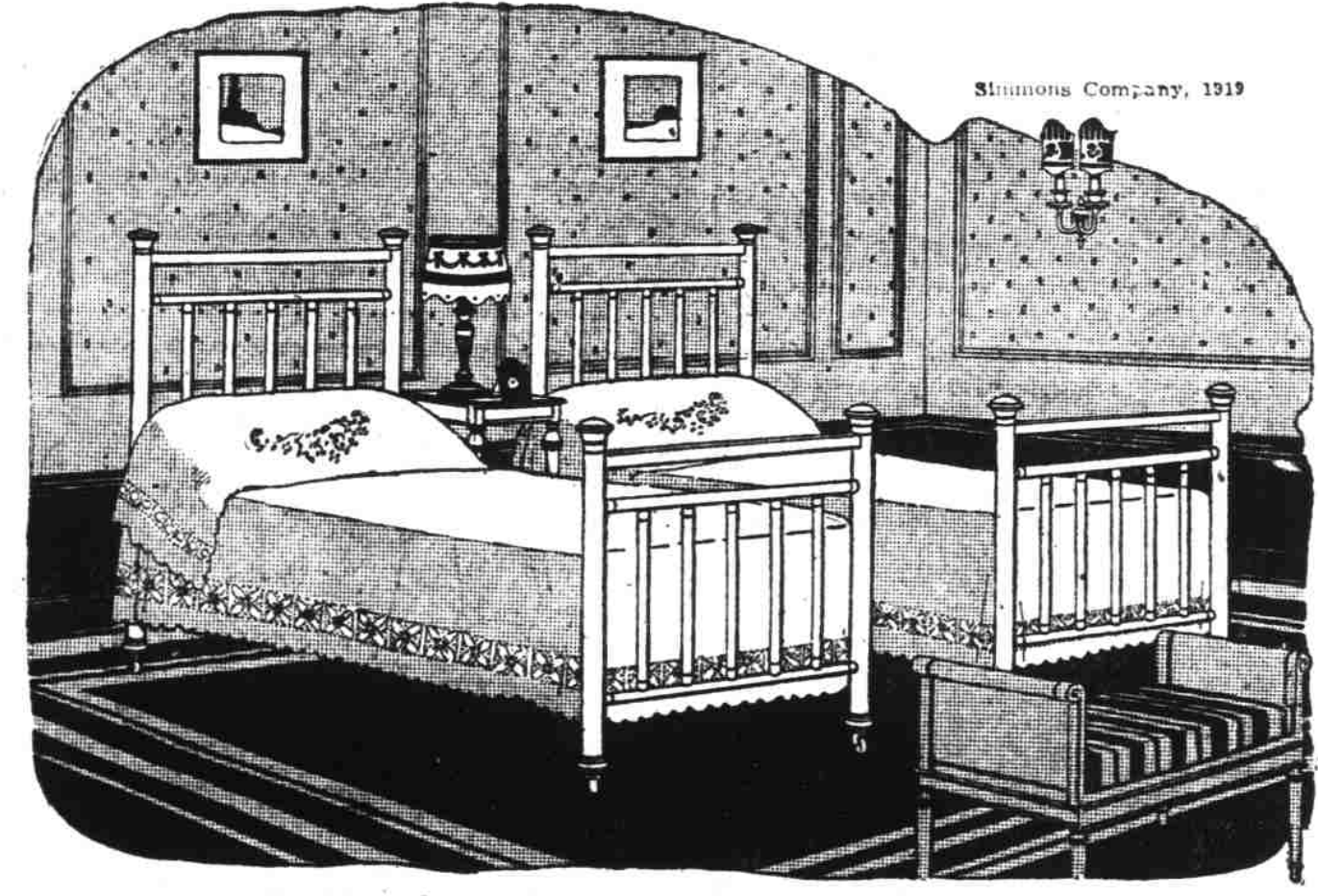
