

RED CROSS WORK IN FOREIGN FIELD NOT YET FINISHED

Needs Will Require Activities to Continue for Nine Months, Says Dr. Farrand.

ROLL CALL TIME NEARS

Buttons Bearing the Date 1920 to Be Given to All Those Who Buy Memberships.

November 2 to 11 inclusive are the dates for the annual membership roll call of the American Red Cross and the general plan and purpose of this roll call were given in detail at the conference of Red Cross workers held Monday at Central Library with Dr. Livingston Farrand, head of the American Red Cross, as the principal speaker. It was estimated by the speaker that not before June 30, 1920, can the work of the American Red Cross in foreign countries be relinquished.

At the time of the signing of the armistice the foreign countries were practically without means of caring for their children and refugees.

GOVERNMENT IS AIDED
By intervention with the government the vast army supplies valued at \$10,000,000, then on the other side, were turned over to the Red Cross, which in turn distributed them among the hospitals and other relief institutions. The Red Cross itself had \$15,000,000 worth of supplies and these are being used for the benefit of the war-stricken people of the allied countries of Europe.

To complete this task \$20,000,000 is needed. The raising of the additional \$15,000,000 is not expected to be difficult. The quota for the Northwest is \$250,000, of this sum \$25,000 has already been paid from the war funds of the various chapters, leaving only \$115,000 to be raised.

Red Cross buttons bearing the date 1920 will be given to all buying a membership and there will be the usual flags for windows, stickers, posters and 100 per cent signs for stores.

WORK IS REVIEWED
In summing up the campaign and its purpose, Earl Kitchin, division manager of the Red Cross, made these five points: First, the war task of the Red Cross is not fully completed; second, the Red Cross is the disaster-relief agent of the American people; third, in time of epidemic a nation-wide community organization of Red Cross is essential; fourth, the peace program of the Red Cross calls for the sympathetic cooperation and support of all forward movements of a social nature; fifth, the league of Red Cross societies is the torch from which other countries have lighted their torches and should be upheld as a leader in its line.

A conference between Dr. Farrand, Dr. David N. Hooper, state health officer; A. L. Smith, secretary of the Oregon Tuberculosis Association; and Earl Kitchin followed the afternoon meeting and in the evening the directors of the Portland chapter met with Dr. Farrand before he left for California.

Baby Home Is Given Funds Deposited in The Disputed Bottle

Dispute as to who is entitled to money in a contribution bottle taken Saturday from police headquarters was settled Tuesday, when Amedee M. Smith, chairman of the Portland chapter of the Red Cross, said he would turn it over to the Albertina Kerr nursery.

Ferdinand E. Reed, a Red Cross representative, took the bottle, said to contain between \$25 and \$30, claiming that inasmuch as the bottle was first placed in police headquarters by the Red Cross, the money in the bottle belonged to that society. W. G. MacLaren, chairman of the Buy-a-Brick campaign for the nursery, claimed that the bottle had not been used by the Red Cross for two months and that contributions were made under a sign stating that all money would go to the nursery.

Elliott Ellertson Dies
Baker, Oct. 1. — Elliott Ellertson, Rock Creek, homestead and extensive Haines property owner, died here Monday morning, following a short illness. Ellertson is survived by two brothers, George H. Ellertson, who lives in Washington, and a sister, Mrs. A. Stokers of Milwaukee, Wis. He was a member of the I. O. O. F., L. O. O. M. and Eagles lodges. Funeral arrangements will be made upon the arrival of a brother now on his way to Baker.

CLEMENCEAU GIVEN VOTE OF CONFIDENCE BY FRENCH CHAMBER

Clemenceau's Majority Cut Down, but Ratification of Treaty Now Appears Assured.

Paris, Oct. 1. — Premier Clemenceau and his government received a vote of confidence in the chamber of deputies Tuesday, 262 to 138.

The vote of confidence means another important victory for the "Tiger of France," this time in his fight for ratification of the peace treaty. The figures show nevertheless a marked dwindling in his support, though they put to naught all predictions of the radicals that "the next vote" would topple him from power.

Tuesday's confidence vote given the premier a majority of 74. The last time when he insisted on a test of strength, July 22, the vote was 289 to 176, a majority of 113, and it was the result mainly of a fiery patriotic appeal by the aged statesman, who begged that since he had admittedly "won the war" he be allowed to conclude peace.

On December 17 he received a confidence vote of 310 to 175, a majority of 135.

This latest test of strength was provoked by a controversy between Clemenceau and some of the parliamentary leaders over a resolution introduced by Andre Lefevre looking for a renewal of negotiations among the powers for the purpose of securing additional guarantees of Germany's disarmament.

Premier Clemenceau fought the Lefevre resolution on the ground that while the principle was entirely proper the measure was badly conceived.

Steel Baron Favors Granting of Parley In Strike Situation

New York, Oct. 1. — (I. N. S.) — That Samuel Untermyer, believed to be the largest individual stockholder in the Bethlehem Steel company, sent a message to President E. P. Grace of the corporation, urging that conferences be granted to the American Federation of Labor for a parley, was disclosed Tuesday afternoon.

Mr. Untermyer's message said in part: "As representing, perhaps, your largest individual stockholder with an investment of about \$5,000,000 in your company, I urge you at least to arbitrate this preliminary question of a conference. Any other position is purely arbitrary no matter how just your cause may be. In these days labor's right to collective bargaining through its own agencies can no longer be successfully denied, no matter how successful you may appear to be for the moment. Capital is thereby simply adding fuel to the fire. I urge your company to act independently of other agencies that may have ulterior purposes to serve."

Portland Man Will Open Two Canneries

Marshfield, Oct. 1. — A. Rupert, canneryman of Portland, left for home Tuesday, after making arrangements for opening fruit canning factories in Coos county. He plans to build a factory in Coquille and another in Myrtle Point. He negotiated with the local company recently with a view of taking over its contracts with the farmers and berry growers. Rupert plans to have a third factory on Coos bay.

Dentist Is Fined
Baker, Oct. 1. — Dr. S. L. Petersen, dentist, and Frank Griffith, were fined Monday \$20 on conviction of disorderly conduct. Alvie Gardner pleaded not guilty to the charge of selling liquor and John Adams, Harvey and George Gardner also entered pleas of not guilty to disorderly charges.

Mrs. Cordelia Chapin, Native of Michigan, Is Dead at Dallas

Dallas, Oct. 1. — Mrs. Cordelia Chapin died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. William P. Miller, in this city, Thursday. She was born in Michigan, April 22, 1827, and came to Oregon in 1889. Mrs. Chapin is survived by the following children: Frank S. Chapin of Ellensburg, Wash.; Mrs. Grace Muller of Dallas; Luther J. Chapin of Salem and Mrs. Alice Dunn of Portland.

John Van Buren Lyons Dies
Dallas, Oct. 1. — John Van Buren Lyons died at his home in this city Saturday. He was a native of Illinois, where he was born October 26, 1854. He came to Oregon in 1905, settling in Dallas, where he has resided ever since. He is survived by three sons and three daughters, Mrs. A. S. Swain, H. W. Lyons, W. P. Lyons, T. E. Lyons, Mrs. D. C. Crider and Mrs. F. J. Coad.

FOOD BLOCKADE OF GERMANY TO BACK ALLIES' ULTIMATUM

Failure to Withdraw Baltic Troops to Meet Prompt Economic Punishment.

Washington, Oct. 1. — The state department has made public the text of the drastic ultimatum delivered to Germany by the allies and the associated powers on September 27, demanding that she forthwith withdraw all of her troops now under the command of General von Goltz from the Baltic provinces. The ultimatum was sent by Marshal Foch.

Since that time Germany has answered evasively so that it became necessary Tuesday to carry out the threat in the ultimatum. Although not stated in the ultimatum, it is understood that the economic blockade of Germany is already under way.

It is evident from the statement that the United States is a party to the plan of coercion against Germany, as the United States is one of the associated powers.

In brief the terms of the ultimatum are that failing the evacuation as demanded the allies and associated powers will prevent any foodstuffs or raw materials from entering Germany, and will refuse all financial facilities which the German government is enjoying, which it proposes to seek from the allies and associated powers.

National Banks Show An Increase in Gross Deposits by Report

Gross deposits of 32 of the leading national banks throughout the United States, as of the last complete report on September 32, amounted to \$5,066,404,000. This compares with \$5,042,272,000 of June 30, 1918, and \$5,296,724,000 as of November 1, 1917.

From these figures it will be seen that the deposit gain of these institutions since June 30 amounts to about \$24,000,000. Compared with November 1, there is a decrease of about \$210,000,000. The largest gains in gross deposits are reported by the western banks. The Continental & Commercial National bank of Chicago reports a gain over June 30 of \$32,000,000. The First National of Chicago shows an increase of \$23,000,000. Bank of California, San Francisco, \$18,000,000; First & Old Detroit National of Detroit, \$11,000,000; Anglo-London-American National of San Francisco, \$12,000,000, and the First Securities National of Minneapolis a gain of about \$9,000,000.

She dropped about 30 feet to the jagged gulch below, and the report is that her skull and hips were crushed. The animal belonged to J. Hopson, a Myrtle Point cattle buyer, and was one of the herd being driven to the stock yards. Miss Knight is the daughter of T. L. Knight of Myrtle Point.

Admiral Kolchak Issues a Call for Omsk Assembly

Washington, Oct. 1. — (I. N. S.) — Referring to the "great success achieved" by its armies and calling upon all the people to rally to the support of the Russian government at Omsk, Admiral Kolchak on September 16, issued a proclamation for the convocation of a national assembly. It was announced at the Russian embassy this afternoon.
