

CITY FATHERS ON EVE OF STORM IN SALARY QUESTION

Disturbed Waters Already Appear In Differences of Opinion Between the Commissioners.

BIGLOW AGAINST RISES

Women Employes Asking That They Be Given a Hearing to Show Their Position.

Battle is imminent at the city hall over the salary question. Volleys were exchanged Monday night between opposing members of revision committee. It is understood, in a secret meeting held to discuss salaries, after closing hours. The report of the committee will be submitted to the council at today's meeting.

Commissioner Bigelow, dissenting member of the committee, declares that he will vote against the program. "It is not fair, inasmuch as only a few departments are considered in the schedule. Out of a total of 323 employes considered, but 29 are from the public affairs and public safety bureaus. If we are in position financially to consider all employes in all departments, all right, but out of 1800 employes, only 323 are provided for in the ordinance."

Mayor Baker declares that he hasn't seen the report, and that he doesn't know what his stand will be, although it is believed the mayor will line up with Bigelow before the ordinance passes the councilmanic waters.

Commissioner Mann is also non-committal, but he has in the past been a consistent backer of increased salaries. Barker and Pier will report favorably on the ordinance.

Women employes are demanding that they be given a hearing. They declare that stenographers have failed to receive fair treatment. Rumbling of other upheavals of the lesser paid employes is also heard about the hall. They are believed to feel that the higher salaried workers are receiving the bulk of the benefits.

SEWING CLASSES SHOW MANY REGISTRATIONS

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Oct. 1.—Sewing classes show the largest registration in the school of home economics at the Oregon Agricultural College. The number registered in freshman household arts classes alone was 209 at the close of the third day of registration.

Two new household arts teachers have been added to the teaching staff this year, Miss Lila O'Neale and Miss Lulu May. Miss Louise Schneider has returned from a leave of absence.

Miss May, whose home is in Portland, will handle several sections of the freshman work. She was graduated from O. A. C. with the class of 1918. She was an honor student, a member of the Forum, the junior-senior honor society of the college, and since her graduation has received practical experience in teaching and commercial work along the household arts line.

Membership Plan For Farm Bureau To Be Instituted

The Dalles, Oct. 1.—The membership form bureau system will be inaugurated in Wasco county, according to Paul V. Marie, chief county agent, here on a tour of inspection. It was explained that the new system had the sanction of the government and consisted of enrolling farmers and suggesting to them a given form of study. This work will be in the hands of committees, who will be held responsible for the work accomplished.

U. S. (Uncle Sam) Hampton has been engaged by Marie to speak on organization to the Wasco farmers for a week. He is one of the best known speakers on farm subjects in the Northwest and owns a large ranch in Montana. He is speaking in Oregon under the auspices of the Oregon Agricultural College.

Harvard President Denies Charge Made By Senator Borah

Cambridge, Mass., Oct. 1.—(U. P.)—President Lowell of Harvard, an ardent advocate of the League of Nations, today denied he holds Washington's farewell address in contempt as charged by Senator Borah in an address before the United States senate.

Professor Lowell said: "I yield neither to Senator Borah nor any other man in admiration of the farewell address of the great father of the republic, but I would not use them as a cover for present party politics."

After a parade of Odd Fellows and their families, with many Rebekahs in the line, a dance and social entertainment were held at the new hall.

Oregon Delegation Inquires Into Fruit Shipment Holdup

Washington, Oct. 1.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL.)—Senators Chamberlain and McNary and Representatives Simeon and Hawley and Senator Jones of Washington Tuesday called on the bureau of chemistry in regard to apple and pear shipments held up at Boston by government inspectors because of alleged excessive use of arsenate of lead in spraying. The shipments were found to have come principally from Washington and California with a small proportion from the Rogue river valley. Discussion centered over the question whether harmful results would follow from disposition of the fruit. No conclusion was reached. The bureau officials promised to have an investigation made. Members of the bureau evidently are much at sea themselves as to whether any real ground exists for holding up the shipments. The Northwest members feel certain that the fruit is perfectly good for consumption, although its appearance may cause some discount in price.

British Inspectors Hamper U. S. Trade Says Congressman

Berlin, Sept. 28 (Delayed).—(U. P.)—British agents are obstructing American efforts to establish business in Germany, Congressman Fred A. Britten of Illinois declared when he arrived here today in a sightseeing tour with Mrs. Britten and his secretary. Britten said that British inspectors at the boundary line in the Rhine valley had treated him insolently. After he had entered his compartment on the train, he said, they insisted that he must go outside for them to examine him. "America ought to awake to the business situation in Germany," Britten asserted. "The British are allowing their own representatives to enter the country freely, but are carefully obstructing Americans in an effort to obtain all the facts pertaining to their business and other affairs. German-American business relations ought to be resumed quickly."

Nations of Europe Want U. S. to Keep Order in Armenia

Washington, Oct. 1.—(U. P.)—European nations are anxious to have the United States accept the responsibility for maintaining order in Armenia, the senate foreign relations committee was informed Tuesday. Assistant Secretary of State Phillips gave confidential evidence concerning conditions in Armenia and the question of the advisability of sending American troops there.

Marshfield Is Given Plane Landing Field

Marshfield, Oct. 1.—Ground for a permanent airplane landing place has been secured in the Fernside district of Marshfield. Claude Nasburg and Peter Sogge of North Bend donated the land. The city council of Marshfield appropriated \$200 for the preparation of the ground. A scout plane is expected here Wednesday, and a fleet of airplanes will arrive Saturday, when the Shriners are here.

Veteran of Modoc Indian War Is Dead

Ipswich, Oct. 1.—Funeral services were held here Sunday for W. J. Lowell, who died Friday at the home of his daughter, Mrs. John Mobley. Mr. Lowell was born in Boston, Mass., in 1846, and came to Corvallis at the age of 19. Most of his life was spent in Oregon. He fought in the Modoc Indian war. He is survived by his only daughter, Mrs. Mobley.

Husband Is Jealous; Wife Gets Divorce
