

U. S. ARMY STORE TO BE ENLARGED; BUSINESS GROWS

Additional Space Needed to Care
for New Stocks Which Have
Been Received Recently.

SOME PRICES ARE LOWERED

Bargains in Staples Continue to
Attract; Mail Orders Being
Filled Each Day.

Twenty carloads of quartermaster stocks, most of them consigned to the army store, are en route to Portland, after being tied up behind a wreck in California Monday morning, according to the announcement of Major Tingley.

To accommodate incoming shipments of surplus army wares and edibles, Major Frank P. Tingley, zone supply officer in charge of the United States army quartermaster store at Fourth and Pine streets, has arranged to lease the remainder of the first and mezzanine floors of the Marshall-Wells building between Fourth and Fifth streets on Pine.

As soon as the present tenant vacates the building shelving will be set up and the army stock spread out, permitting more buyers and salespeople in the store, as well as additional stocks which are coming in each day. That the store will operate indefinitely was Major Tingley's statement this morning. He declared that the extent of government stocks permits of no present contemplation of a closing date.

MAIL ORDERS FILLED

Major Tingley estimated the business of the store since it was opened Saturday morning at approximately \$30,000 in cash. Some of this represents mail orders from throughout the state. Wares sold by the government store will be shipped on mail order at exactly the same price as is charged over the counter and parcel post charges will be paid by the government. Shipments are limited to 125 pounds, however, and purchasers by mail order must insure at their own expense any purchase valued at more than \$2. Shipment is made by parcel post only.

Several thousand army blankets were received this morning after the first supply had been exhausted in one day. New army blankets of varied weights are selling at \$6 each, and reclaimed blankets, washed and sterilized thoroughly, are for sale at \$3.50 each, with sales limited to two blankets to each purchaser.

STAPLES IN DEMAND

Solid pack tomatoes, No. 2½, are at the store in great quantities and are selling rapidly at 9 cents a can or \$2.15 a case of 24 cans. Bacon in slabs as well as in tins, took another decided drop in this morning's quotations, the former selling at 50 cents a pound in whole slabs with the sale limited to four slabs to a customer. This is a drop of 9 cents a pound under the original price and a drop of four cents under Tuesday's price. Canned bacon in 12 pound tins is offered today at \$2.75 a can, as compared with an original price of \$4.15 and Tuesday's price of \$3.50. The supply is practically unlimited, 10,000 cans being on hand with 40,000 cans more en route.

A throng of buyers was awaiting the opening of the store, as early as 7:30 this morning and before the doors were opened about 9:15, several hundred persons were crowded near the entrance.

The supplies of baked beans, canned corn and peas are temporarily exhausted, but will be replenished in quantity as soon as shipments now on the road are received.

Canned tomatoes, several thousand cases of them, were disposed of Tuesday to the thousands who crowded into the store throughout the day. The tomatoes that found special favor were the "2½ solid pack" cans the army is selling at 9 cents a can. Each purchaser is limited to one case of tomatoes or other canned goods. Two blankets are the limit for each customer, and buyers are limited to one case of dried fruit. There seems to be no limit to the stock of bacon, and the sale is therefore not carefully abridged.

Volume of business at the army store on Tuesday was at least three times as

great as that of Saturday, the first day the store was open. Major Tingley estimates. Each day's business has shown a marked increase. Thousands of cans of edibles, including beans, peas, tomatoes and meats were delivered to buyers. And the throng awaiting the opening of the store this morning indicated further additions to the business records of the store.

Household supplies, tools and clothing will be added to the stocks of the government store as soon as these articles are received from district warehouses.

CASH BASIS IS FOLLOWED

Major Tingley is anxious that customers of the army store understand that the sales are transacted on a strictly cash basis, that there are no deliveries in any case other than over the counter, and that there are to be absolutely no exchanges. Patrons of the store must make and pay for their purchases at the counter, inspect and accept or reject the purchase at once and remove it.

Several inquiries for army raincoats have been directed to Major Tingley, but that officer declares no such articles will be on sale. Other clothing, such as underwear, will be received soon. Towels, soaps and other toilet articles are expected daily.

EMMANUEL HOSPITAL CAMPAIGN WORKERS TO SEEK \$250,000

Quest of Funds for Addition to
Hospital Being Received Heartily; Leaders Meet Today.

Portland's hospital needs were discussed today at a luncheon of the general committee of the Emanuel Hospital association in the dining room of the Portland hotel. Conrad P. Olson presided at the luncheon, and the principal speakers were Mayor Baker and the Rev. William A. Waldo. About 100 members of the clergy and men and women prominent in social, business and civic affairs were present.

Committees were appointed to handle a campaign to raise \$250,000 for an addition to Emanuel hospital. Reports by Finley Bell, manager of the campaign, indicate that the movement is meeting ready response from the public. The hospital facilities of Portland are altogether inadequate, according to Mayor Baker, and he said the city officials would gladly support the efforts of the Emanuel association.

Emanuel hospital was organized eight years ago and the present hospital building was erected in 1915, a wing being added in 1918. The hospital provides 90 beds and is strictly modern in equipment and management. The hospital association owns practically a whole block at Stanton and Commercial streets, the site of the present hospital, and plans have been outlined for the erection of a million dollar building on this ground. The proposed addition, for which funds are now being secured, will constitute the first unit of this plan.

Jugo-Slavia Is Talking of War

Rome, Oct. 1.—(I. N. S.)—It was "authoritatively reported" from Belgrade today that Jugo-Slav military circles are "talking of war with Italy."

Rival claims for territory on the Adriatic littoral are being made by both Italy and Jugo-Slavia, but the chief dispute is over Fiume, now occupied by armed Italian forces under Captain Gabriele d'Annunzio.

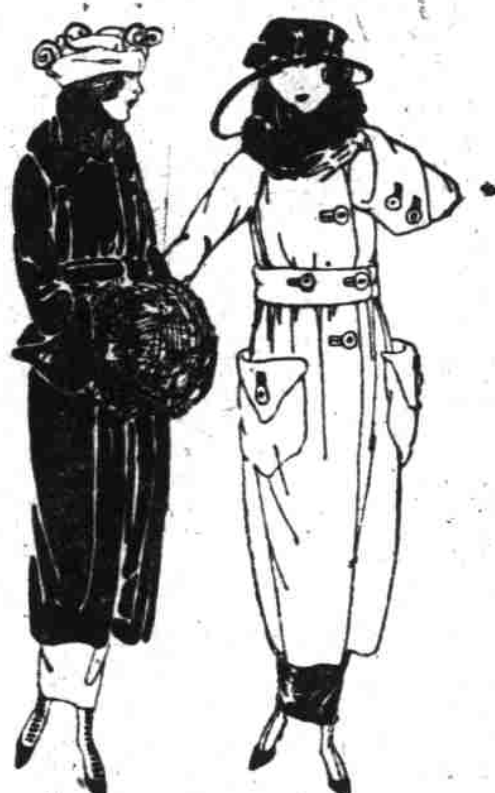

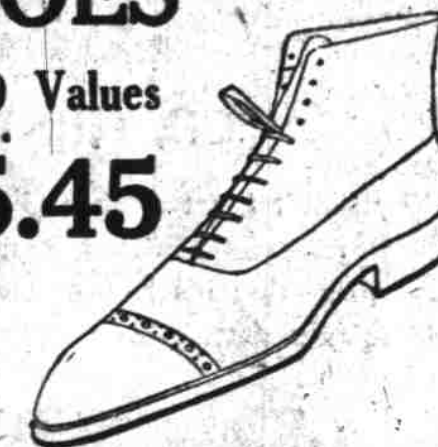
